C&G President Finally Resigns

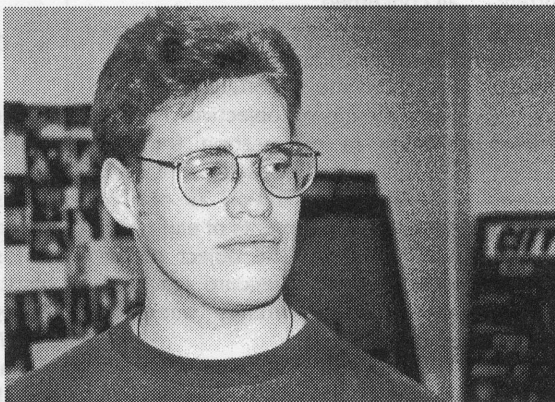
An emergency meeting of the City & Guilds Union Officers & Members Council met on Tuesday to decide the fate of C&GU President Vivake Bhalla.

The meeting had been called at last week's O&MC when a motion of no-confidence in Mr Bhalla was presented, but as the President was not present, the decision was delayed. However, the motion was not debated this week either as the meeting began with the reading of a letter of resignation from Mr Bhalla.

In his letter, Mr Bhalla explained that he felt he had been unable to fulfil his role as Guilds President. "Both this term and last I have had to take long absences for family reasons. I had hoped that Guilds was capable of continuing for this period without my daily presence...this appears not to have been the case...My absence from College is set to continue, meaning that I am no longer able to offer C&GU the

direction it needs."

Mr Bhalla's resignation has been widely accepted as the best way to safeguard C&GU for the future. Speaking to Felix, Andy Heeps, IC Union President, described the move as "the only sensible step for-

ward...I'm glad Vivake jumped and wasn't pushed". Looking to the future, Mr Heeps sees tough times ahead for Mr Bhalla's successors "It's vital to ensure the hole isn't dug any deeper...it's time to stop digging and find a way out".

Having accepted Mr Bhalla's resignation, the O&MC meeting then moved on to elect his successor, a temporary President who would act until 3 March, when the C&GU election results will be announced, and a new President will take-over. One candidate, Alex Tylee-Birdsall, stood from the floor, with the endorsement of the current Guilds Executive, and was unanimously elected. Mr Tylee-Birdsall, who is at present Motor Club Captain, says that he hopes to bring his three years of experience in C&GU, and particularly in the financial side of the Union, to the Presidency. "I know how everything works, and I know everyone in Exec, so hopefully we can start to work together more successfully as a team".

Despite his short term of office, Mr Tylee-Birdsall still has a comprehensive set of goals for C&GU. Emphasising the need for a thorough re-writing of the C&GU

Two New Bars for ICU

Plans have been unveiled this week for the expansion of dBs, the Union Ents Room, to take advantage of the space that will become available in Beit Quad once the Biology Department move into the new Biomedical Sciences building this summer. The intention of the design is to increase the total capacity of the Union facility, to accommodate the new medical students, and to turn dBs into a stand-alone facility, with its own food outlets, bar and increased stage area. The design also incor-

porates a second bar to be located in the basement of Beit Hall.

The full plan has yet to get the final go-ahead, pending a detailed costing by the designers - a team from the IC Estates Department - but the basic concept has been agreed and building work is set to begin in mid-June, allowing the full renovation to be completed by the start of the new academic year.

The plan, as it presently stands, involves knocking down the walls separating dBs from the Felix office and Print Unit, to create a much larger space which stretches into the back corner of the Union build-

ing. Also included are the necessary extra toilets and fire exits which an increase in capacity will require.

The development forms the first phase in the forthcoming overhaul of the Union Building outlined last year by Eric Allsop in his master plan.

A final decision on the development, together with detailed plans should be made by the end of March for presentation to union officers and staff.



'Teacher Training' for Lecturers

There is a glimmer of hope on the horizon for those who leave lectures more confused and worried than when they entered. Plans to put new lecturers through a scheme of what is effectively teacher training are at a developmental stage within the college, and students are being encouraged to give input in order to enhance the standards of education.

The requirement for a standardised system of training lecturers has been identified worldwide, with many countries currently designing national programmes. The UK campaign has come about as a result of Sir Ronald Dearing's inquiry into higher education. A body known as the 'Accreditation on Teaching in Higher Education' consisting of 'key stakeholders' such as the NUS and the Chancellor's Committee, has been formed to put a workable system in place.

There already exists a course of workshops and training sessions run by Prof Sinclair Goodlad for probationary lecturers at IC, but at present not all departments consider it mandatory. Preceding Government proposals, the college is now planning to construct a scheme that all new lecturers will be required to take part in, and students are being asked to put their views across.

The scheme will be a system of accreditation, including an assessment and a longer course than is presently the case. The College's two education development lecturers, Dr Caroline Baillie and Dr Rita

Van de Vorst, will be instrumental in the implementation of the programme. Dr Baillie emphasised that "Lecturers have got to think about why they're teaching the way they're teaching and how effective they will be in getting students to learn". She spoke of the 'world-wide realisation' that new lecturers needed to be given instruction and time to contemplate their approach to education. Dr Baillie feels it vital that students take responsibility for their own learning and channel their creativity into the building of a system that benefits all concerned.

The college's Pro-Rector for Educational Quality, Prof Tim Clark, described the importance of positively identifying objectives for the training in preparation for any Government proposals. He sees extensive consultation as one of the essential elements of early talks and surmised "The object of the exercise is to safeguard teachers, and most importantly safeguard students".

Students are able to get involved through the Student LINK group (London Imperial Network) for education development who will begin plans with the staff LINK group at a meeting on 9 March. It is hoped that the issue will strike a chord with students and they will take full advantage of this opportunity: The student LINK group requires a student representative from each department. constitution, he commented, "We need to completely re-structure the Union. This year has shown that the present system just doesn't work." In addition, Mr Tylee-Birdsall highlighted the need for a thorough assessment of C&GU's current financial position, "We need to know what we're doing and where we're going". Finally, he pointed to communication between officers as one of Guilds' biggest failures this year, "Exec try to stick to their own jobs

and don't work together as a team... I don't even know who half the Dep Reps are, and I didn't see them at O&MC yesterday... we haven't a clue what's going on half the time".

Hamish Common, Guildsheet Editor, sees Mr Tylee-Birdsall as the ideal candidate; "He's someone who's not interested in politics and image... who doesn't sound-off or shout 'I want X, Y, Z'", and Soren Dymond, Guilds Treasurer, warmly endorsed him, adding "He's a great poker partner".

News in Brief...

SUSPECTS CAUGHT

Two men believed to be involved in several thefts on the Imperial College campus were apprehended by Imperial College security last Thursday, and have subsequently been arrested by police officers. The men have been caught before, but there was insufficient evidence to detain them. Ken Weir, Deputy Security Manager, explained that on previous occasions the men had given reasons for being on college premises. However when caught in Beit Quad they could not claim it was a 'shortcut', and were detained pending police investigation.

MASSIVE MERGER

The news of a merger between Glaxo-Wellcome and SmithKline Beecham, two of the world's largest biotechnology companies, has provoked fears that jobs will be lost and funding for research at institutions such as Imperial College will suffer. Roger Lyons, the Manufacturing, Science and Finance Union's general secretary, speaking in The Times Higher Education Supplement, commented "This merger could have devastating implications for university research and science graduate employment." However Dr Chris Evans, formerly a microbiologist at Imperial, and now a millionaire biotechnology entrepreneur, commented in the same article that he thought the merger was "extremely exciting" and that the new company would be even more supportive of science in Britain.

CANNABIS STUDY

The House of Lords has launched a high powered investigation into the legal status of the drug cannabis. Following the British Medical Association's November report on the possible benefits of the medical prescription of cannabinoids. Lord Chief Justice, Lord Bingham, is calling for a "detached, objective, independent" consideration of the issue and the formation of a Lords Select Committee. Chaired by Liberal Democrat Peer Lord Perry of Walton, a former professor of

pharmacology, the all party committee's terms of reference is said to cover "the scientific case for and against relaxing the prohibition on the medical and recreational use of cannabis". After taking evidence from 'expert witnesses', the Select Committee will hold public hearings after Easter, with a report scheduled for completion in October.

SPEAKER DEALERS

Belgravia Police have released details of a second street trader they are attempting to apprehend. The van, registration P415JP0, has been spotted near to both the South Kensington and St Mary's campuses, and has been used to sell audio equipment to passers-by. The activities of these vendors, who have been present in the area for several years, is apparently becoming more furtive, leading to an Imperial student being kidnapped last week and forced to withdraw money from a cash point.

Anyone seeing the van should report it to Sheffield Security on x58900, noting the time, location, description of the vehicle's occupants and details of any conversation held. On no account should anyone enter into any purchase or get into the van.

AIR DEADLY

The true cost of UK air pollution is coming to light following a recent report that values the damage at £11 billion annually. The study, published by ICSM's National Heart and Lung Institute, attempts to place a monetary value of the "loss of quality of life" caused by the airborne toxins. The model employed, similar to that used by the Government when conducting feasibility studies, involves quizzing the public on how much they would be willing to pay to avoid the problems associated with air pollution. Poor air quality is currently thought to be responsible for health problems in millions of UK citizens, and the report claimed "It makes economic and health sense to clean up the air in our cities as an urgent priority."



Arab Soc Fight

Three groups of security guards were called to restrain an angry crowd as a large scale fight broke out in the Sherfield building after an altercation over a mobile phone. The incident happened two weeks ago in the early hours of Saturday morning. Following an Arabian Society function, two students began arguing over the possession of the phone, and this escalated when friends joined in. Punches were thrown before college security and Union stewards intervened to diffuse the situation. Clubsec, a security firm contracted by the Union, were also brought in and the parties involved were led off campus in opposite directions.

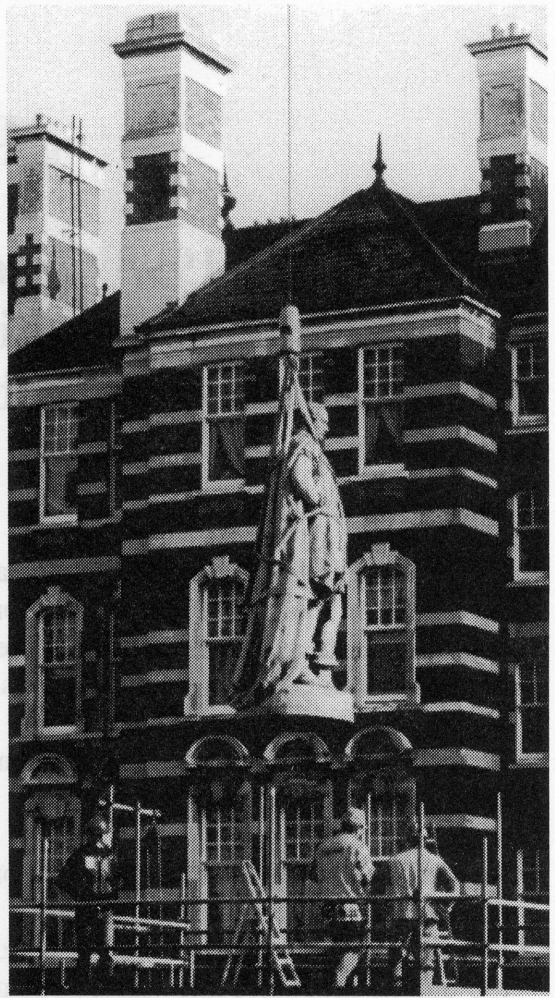
However, the dispute did not end here. With emotions running high the two groups met again in Exhibition Road where fighting once more broke out. The violence was such that the police were called in, but the group soon dispersed and no arrests were made. College security passed on what they knew to the police, but due to the quick exit of the two sides not much information could be gathered. It is suspected that gang warfare could have played a part in the confrontation, but the Arabian Society's president Marwa Hamour insists that "the incident has been blown out of proportion". The police are reluctant to comment because the incident is currently under investigation.

Ecstasy Guru Dies

Nicholas Saunders, counter-culture writer and alternative businessman, died in a car crash last week aged sixty. Failing to complete his degree, the former IC student worked initially as an inventor, producing one of the first working answering machines. In the mid 1960s he became involved in the 'psychedelic revolution', experimenting with hallucinogenic drugs while living in a Squat in Fulham. He then moved into writing, producing the highly popular

'Alternative London' series. Meeting with considerable success, he raised enough money to buy derelict property and founded Neal's Yard in Covent Garden, home to alternative shops, restaurants and publishers. A firm believer in maximum information, he is well known as an impartial expert on modern drugs, writing the popular E for Ecstasy, Ecstasy and the Dance Culture [Felix 1042] and Ecstasy Reconsidered [Felix 1097]. RECTORIAL RESPONSE

Dear Editor,

I am writing to comment on the letter in last week's Felix about the oil industry, and although there is a great deal to be said I shall confine myself to just three aspects.

First there are concerns that the association of the College with the oil industry may be unhealthy or in some way damaging. Since its earliest days the ethos of the College has been to foster research and teaching across a full spectrum from the pure to the highly applied, and to establish mutually beneficial partnerships and strategic alliances with industry, including the oil industry. Indeed the Royal School of Mines was established with the prime purpose of supporting the extractive industries and has for many years worked closely with them. Like your correspondent, many of us in the College are nostalgic for the days when Government support of research was stronger, but that view appears not to be shared by any major political party. On the other hand, we do not find ourselves significantly constrained by our industrial contracts. We work on the general principle of deciding what we would like to do, and then finding an industrial partner who has the same objectives and is prepared to meet the costs.

The College has recently led the country, and possibly the world, in creating a new academic department, the T. H. Huxley School, that brings together both the disciplines necessary for the extraction of natural resources and those that focus on understanding and managing the environment. This change has been welcomed by industry and is simply an expression of the fact that extractive practices that were acceptable thirty years ago on a planet with half its present population and based on the understanding available at that time, are not viable today. The world will continue to need to extract its natural resources, and I believe that the College can play a leading role in finding ways to do this at acceptable environmental cost. To have any practical influence we need to work in close collaboration with industry.

Second, many undesirable consequences were attributed to the

actions of major oil companies. Whether we like it or not, much of the twentieth century prosperity of the western world and much of the improvement in standard of living that has come about in the developing world is attributable to hydrocarbons, and in particular to their use in the internal combustion engine - a blessing that has in part become a bane. However, blanket demonization of individual companies or industries because of particular perceived failures is not balanced, sensible, or constructive. That said, I do not believe that there is any large company in the world, in the hydrocarbons field or any other, that with hindsight does not believe that it could and should have done things better. Overall one has to look at a much wider canvas than there is time or space to do here. But to take an example at an almost trivial level, I believe (but I do not know for sure) that over the years Shell has been responsible for financing the higher education of more students from developing countries, indeed of more students overall, than any other private organisation in the world. I also agree that inaccurate and misleading statements have been made by some oil-industry lobbyists. Sadly the same is true of their opponents who, all too often, also seem to be unaware of the practicalities of running a business.

Finally your correspondent sees a conflict in interest between my role as Rector and as a non-executive director of Shell. I see none. I would go further. It seems to me that the aims your correspondent seeks to achieve may in fact be helped by having people such as me contributing to discussions of company policy. After all I do bring a fairly good knowledge of higher education and research, have worked in climate change, and have devoted around twenty years of my life to research into alternative energy sources etc. Just a thought!

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CONSIDERED OPINION

Dear Jeremy,

Having a foot in both camps, it was interesting to see that Felix has finally come out resolutely against the CCUs. It appears that they are self-serving, irrelevant and misunderstand their role.

Although I cannot agree that the CCUs should be abolished, the accusations have some weight. There is still confusion as to exactly what the CCUs should be achieving, although there are signs of change, with 2 sabbaticals in the ICSM and wholesale structural change in the RCS. C&GCU's inactivity over the past year is not a reason for the abolition of the entire structure. CCUs have declined slowly over the past 70 years or so, due to much larger social changes in what people identify with. Students apply through UCAS to 'Imperial College' and only hear of the CCUs when they get here. Many do not know which CCU their department belong to. At the top end, the introduction of Pro-Rectors even removed some of the duties of the Deans.

CCUs now find that their role covers academic affairs, some welfare, social meetings, alumni association recruitment and career help. Some of these are covered by departmental societies - which are part of the CCU structure. Felix thinks that these jobs would be better done if 'properly run', (i.e. by ICU). It is also of the opinion that students can't be trusted to run our unions for ourselves. Who else is going to run them? The position of Dep Rep, for example, is by its nature departmental. The existence of the CCU acts as an extra devolved layer of academic support, with certain jobs within its remit. The ICU sabbs do not need to worry about Jim's unfair lab mark, but a Dep Rep/AAO could sort it out before some ICU drone storms in, guns blazing. These people sit on plenty of high-level committees so that they can bring these problems to attention. I cannot see that ICU will be able to do that any better, and the idea that CCU academic representatives are not approachable or efficient is an insult to those that work hard in an unpopular job.

It is said they shouldn't be called 'Unions' - again they are not - they are called 'Constituent College Unions', part of ICU. There is no doubt that the main student's union is ICU, and it does its job

very well. If this serves to create confusion, then it is the job of publications like this to dispel that. The names and crests, older than Imperial itself, are not going anywhere. The alumni associations and many others wouldn't stand for it. If the CCUs are shells of their former selves, then so be it. But let them do the job that they are supposed to do, and can do properly.

Ordinarily, I try to refrain from ranting on in the letters pages. After all, they're supposed to be for your opinions, not mine. However, I cannot permit such illiterate, ignorant twaddle as Mr Jenkins has seen fit to make public to go unquestioned in Felix.

Firstly, describing the C&G Union's current state of total ineptitude as a 'bad patch' is rather like calling World War Two 'unfortunate'. In researching the story ('C&G Union 'A Joke', Felix 1106), one of my reporters attempted to contact the C&G Union fourteen times over three days, both by telephone and in person, and at no point was the C&GU office manned or even unlocked. WE HOPE THAT YOU CHOKE

A few months ago, a study was published suggesting that air pollution in the UK is killing more than twenty thousand people annually. Now we have a report valuing the damage at £11 billion [page two]. Now I don't really expect our economically-motivated government to act on the health risk (apparently it's only our food and water that qualify as health risks, not air), but surely the gargantuan bill should be enough to get even the most hard-nosed capitalist on their feet? John Prescott has learned to speak fluent eco-jargon, but despite making all the right noises, even the simplest and cheapest policies have still not been implemented.

The biggest problem with air pollution is its invisibility; it can rarely be seen, the body quickly adjusts to the background stench and it generates no serious public interest. People have developed a gung-ho attitude of total acceptance of the pollution. They stride through smoggy streets with their nose held high as if it was some sort of challenge, rather like Victorian alpinists who, frostbitten and dying, still greeted others with a hearty "Good Day" rather than asking for help.

Everyone knows what happens to the occupants if the exhaust fumes are fed back inside a car, but fail to realise the similarity between this and the environment by a busy street. The fact is that air pollution damages the health of everyone in cities, some times seriously, and

sometimes fatally. To paraphrase Dylan, how many cars must a man drive around before he dies of lung cancer?

BEHIND THE TIMES

I recently bought a copy of the new Imperial College Calendar. This is essentially a college handbook containing facts and figures about all departments and services, and although I am still none the wiser why it is called a calendar, it is largely clear and accurate. I was, however, rather surprised to find the following paragraph in the Admission section:

"Woman Students

Applications for women students are encouraged. Several halls of residence and student houses have places for women students."

Friday 6th March is the 118th Annual Dinner

The evening includes a drinks reception, three course meal, half bottle of wine, coffee, mints, port, raffle, discotheque, dance floor and bar till 1:30am.

All this for only £39!

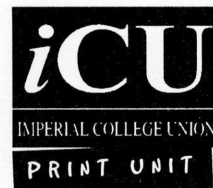

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Originally, I was going to have a rant about the parlous state of the Constituent College Unions, but the events of Sunday mean that this will have to wait. I am referring to the death of Enoch Powell. Even at a place as politically apathetic as Imperial, this is a tricky subject to handle. For many, he is remembered only for that speech in Birmingham on 24th April 1968, 'The Rivers of Blood.' This was branded racist by Ted Heath and led to his immediate dismissal from the Shadow Cabinet. An inflammatory and, it was later to be shown, overly alarmist speech, it sharply divided public opinion and led to the unusual spectacle of London's dockers marching on Westminster to defend a Tory politician. However, it had the unfortunate effect of pushing one of the finest political mind of the century to the sidelines, leaving the rest of his work overlooked by so many. He is widely credited with inventing Thatcherism, espousing monetarism decades before it was embraced by the Conservatives. He mooted the idea of privatisa-

tion in the early 1960s and laid the foundations for the breaking of consensus politics in Britain, the remorseless march to the left, which drove the country onto the rocks. His views on Europe, dismissed by Heath, were frighteningly accurate. 'The Community is designed to be a political unit, with common internal and external policies, the same currency, the same treaties. All this means a single government, and therefore a common parliament based on one electorate.' He said this in 1970, and the full

impact is only now being felt. Such was the strength of his feeling on Europe, he urged people to vote Labour in 1974. He was the sharpest mind in the Commons, who would ruthlessly crush opponents with his frighteningly powerful intellect, his principal strength

but possibly one of his weak points. There will never be another.

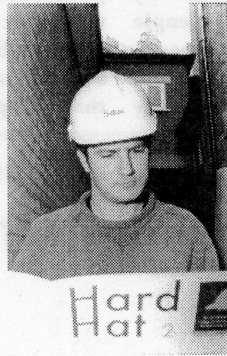
I find myself in the odd position of leaping to the Rector's defence, something which probably unnerves him as much as it does me. Once again, our friends in the ICU Environmental Society are bleating on about Imperial's fund-

ing. Suzanne Aigrain states that IC's funding 'is increasingly coming from Oil companies with a reputation for appalling environmental destruction [sic], denial of Global Warming...' Needless to say, this dubious,

sweeping statement is rubbish. The highly respected Worldwatch Institute in Washington has just praised the efforts of BP, an Imperial funding source, in investing in solar and wind energy. The Chairman of BP announced last year that his company accepted

that the burning of fossil fuels was linked to changes in the Earth's climate. Yet the Environmental Society still saw fit to disrupt a BP lecture held at Imperial recently in a manner that can only be described as childish. Ms Aigrain begins to reveal her true agenda when she moans about oil companies developing new fields. As she well knows it is not the role of a supplier to suppress its own sales or fail to meet the demand for its products. That is the role of governments. Perhaps she feels that the battle against lung cancer would be best served by Philip Morris deciding to stop the manufacture of cigarettes? The clincher is her preference for 'state funds' over industrial sponsorship. As with many 'environmentalists', her real disagreement seems to be with the capitalist system, rather than environmental issues, which serve merely as a vehicle for these crypto-socialist views. You can best help save the planet by not clogging up Felix with these silly distortions.

THE IDIOT'S GUIDE TO GETTING A FIRST with COLIN DALE

Part Four: The Lab Report

Abstract

Your practical experiences may or may not agree with my theory.



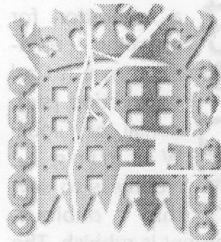
There's nothing the press like to do more than write about themselves. Opportunity to do so was recently given, when the press was bringing attention to the tactics Rupert Murdoch, owner of News International, was using to maintain his control in the newspaper industry. Murdoch had been engaging in various price cuts in the Times, subsidising them from his Sky network profits and running the Times at a loss, his opponents say. The Times countered that, saying in its editorial that the Times/Sunday Times ran at a very good profit (although it didn't the Times itself did - could the Sunday Times be subsidising the Times?) and that what it was doing was morally acceptable. Murdoch has many enemies - one does not get to become a worldwide press baron without making some - and he is known as a bully, in the economic sense. What brought this issue to attention was the Competition Bill presently going through the House, to keep us in line with EU Law. These are the occasions that demonstrate the usefulness of the Lords - since the Upper House are unpaid and cannot be fired, they only turn up if they feel like it, and it seems that on this

occasion, they felt like it. An amendment to the bill in the Lords, proposed by the Lib Dems, was specifically aimed at Murdoch, or more specifically, the Times, whose circulation has increased to 800 000, partly at the expense of the Telegraph and Independent, and partly by increasing the number of people reading broadsheets. The amendment passed by 121 votes to 93, and creates a headache for Tony

Murdoch for all it's worth. The Independent is present in dire financial straits, and the price-cutting at the Times will serve to further deepen its crisis. As they said, there is no point on having a loss-making title unless you intend to rid the market of a competitor. They are worried that this will reduce press diversity, which can only be a bad thing. Murdoch already single-handedly ditched the newspaper 'Today', for what-

worry here is that there is a powerful media baron, who isn't even British, and may not have British interests as his first priority. The Labour Government will remember well in the Eighties when Labour's planned policy of banning foreign ownership of the media was naturally ruthlessly opposed by Murdoch, with savage effect in the polls. He was sending a warning to anyone who dare oppose him again.

Recently, Ministers hinted at a deal that would get them off the hook in the Commons and prevent an embarrassing rebellion - since the single mothers vote, backbenchers know that they have the muscle to cause problems for the Government if they so desired. The Government may introduce an amendment that will deal 'more precisely' with the problem of newspaper wars. This will act as a compromise to diffuse the situation without losing face. But soon, Blair may have to make a decision. Should he keep his famed friendship with Murdoch going, or should he legislate in the interest of the British press and people? The two are sadly not the same.

Labour and the Tories both oppose the plan, more out of fear than anything else, but there are plenty of MPs on both sides that would like to vote for the amendment.

Polly Toynbee, a known opponent of Murdoch, has recently been writing in the Guardian, calling on the great and the good to oppose

ever reason. This removed a centre-left paper, leaving only one, the Independent left. Now the Independent is under threat. Murdoch is known to have his papers espouse those views that are in his own best self-interest. His opposition to the Euro is reflected in his papers' editorial line. Burning Water

As a special bonus this week, here are two recipes from the cook so wise, he almost makes preparing dinner parties enjoyable...

1. Tarte à la Tomate

- ½ lb ripe tomatoes
- 4 - 5 tbl dijon mustard
- Short crust pastry made with 8 oz flour etc as explained in a previous Burning Water

Preheat your oven to 210°C, gas mark 7. Meanwhile roll out the pastry to about 2-3mm thick and place it in you well greased tart tin.

Spread the mustard out evenly around the pastry (like tomato on a pizza). Slice the tomatoes thinly and lay them out around the tart so that they overlap by about ½ a slice each. Sprinkle with salt, pep-

per and whatever herbs you have around.

Put in the oven till the pastry is nice and brown, about 20 minutes.

2. Chicken Cacciatore

- 1 chicken, dead
- 1 onion
- 5 cloves of garlic
- 1 tin tomatoes
- 1 glass of wine
- Loads a olive oil

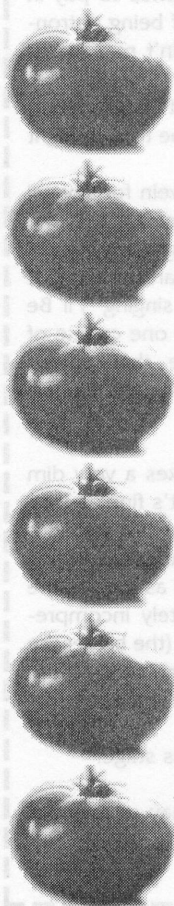
Hack the chicken to pieces. You should end up with 2 legs, 2 wing bits, 2 breasts and a carcass. Heat up about 1cm of oil in a frying pan until it's smokin' hot. Fry all the chicken pieces until well brown. You'll probably find it easier to do a couple of pieces at a time and I'm told it's better to fry the skin side first - it helps to retain the juices.

Chop and fry the onion and garlic until they're also thoroughly brown, adding some pepper and a tbl of paprika near the end.

Deglaze the frying pan with the glass of wine (we've been over this before) and combine everything in a large pot. Heat up and leave to simmer gently for at least an hour.

A great carbohydrate accompaniment to this is polenta - a golden yellow paste made from ground up corn. It's available from most market street stores and the instructions on the packet are usually reasonable so follow them.

The DP(F&S) sits on, and chairs various committees, and has to keep in constant contact with other Union

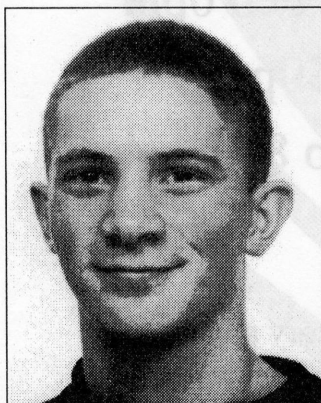

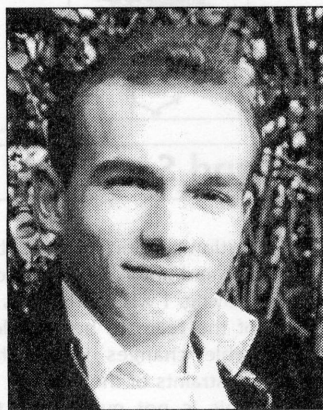

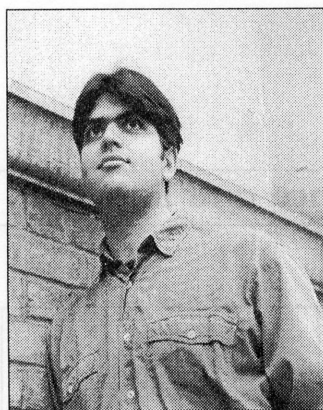
Felix is a newspaper, not a magazine,

DAWN OF THE REPLICANTS

One Head, Two Arms, Two Legs ★★★½



Five piece indie bands are ten a penny these days. It's always the same old thing, one mop-headed, swaying bloke sings, a sweaty one on the drums, two playing guitars, and some ligger that plays the keyboard or tambourine or just sort of dances around, i.e. Bez and that's the

standard five piece. Dawn are different, they piss around with their line up more often than President Clinton shags his secretaries, and that's a lot! One minute there's only two of them on a track, producing a minimal melody. Then the next thing you know three people are singing, sometimes with scary Beach Boys like harmonies, three on guitars, two on keyboards and thank God only one on the drums. Figure that one out with only five members!! Not only do they do that but they also employ the most innovative instruments this side of the moon. Interesting noises are produced by Phasers, Speedway, Hollow-bone Nose Drone, MC303, Ha-Ha, Numerics, Cigarettes, and finally a Drone-Stick Squealer. Hmm very interesting indeed.

Down to the music, Dawn produce a pleasant, if not slightly dark sounding noise. They are not too heavily guitar orientated and can often sound like one of the better

bands of the early eighties. Tracks like *Windy Miller* are sung in a mildly depressing monotone that adds atmosphere and meaning to the words. However at times their use of crazy instruments detracts from their essentially best material. The more simplistic melodies are supported very capably by their myriad of vocalists with lyrics being meaningful and full of emotion. On more than one occasion I found myself comparing the band and much of the music they produce to the material produced by Frank Black, formally of the Pixies. On tracks like *Sgt Growley*, Dawn sound more like a mixture of The Cult and Soft Cell. My personal favourite is *Radars*, which is a more modern sounding, up beat track very reminiscent of the better, new, British bands around at the moment. Next big thing, who knows, this could be just the Dawn for the Replicants. **M**

Strange Angels ★★★



Throwing Muse Kristin Hersh makes beautiful music. Sparse, precise acoustic arrangements of articulate soprano, expertly picked guitar, arpeggiated harpsichord and only the occasional tambourine providing percussion; the emphasis is directed solely to each song itself. Hersh's lively chord structures and lullaby melodies at first misdirect and then bring into sharp relief some chilling libretto, much in the fashion of a more subdued and less world weary Kurt Cobain.

The first two tracks do little to inspire but then are followed by seven consecutive recordings of undeniable brilliance and understated power. Touching on subject matters many artists shy from, *Strange Angels* is an uneasy listen. Clever wordplay and pleading emotion combine well in the first half but the second leans toward self indulgence; the simplicity of the arrangement. If this record had the five weaker tracks removed, and with a more open-minded and less indulgent producer than Hersh, I would have been so much more gushing in my praise. With luck the forthcoming *Throwing Muses* album will be better. If, if, if. What might have been, what might have been... **M** Mr.Trout

PHILADELPHIA BLUNTZ

Philadelphia Bluntz ★★

Welcome to another edition of the Electric Cafe! First of all, many thanks to all of you who entered the Reactivate Classics competition from last week. The response from the Felix readers was so good, that I have ordered extra CDs from the record label! As I am writing this column, I still don't know who won. I will have to wait until the response from the radio show (that went out on Sunday and Tuesday this week) comes back.

For all of you who entered by email, I am thinking of starting up a mailing list so that you will know what special features and competitions are coming up on the radio show and the Felix column. I will also tell you about club nights in London, if I think something unusual or special is happening. It will be an informal thing, decided by how often I can get to a computer to write it! If you would like to be included on such a list, then please drop me a message (a.sethi@ic.ac.uk) with your return address.

This week I want to tell you about a group of artists that have been making music out of Cologne in Germany for a number of years. Many at Imperial will know Air Liquide as a French chemicals company. Only a few will recognise the name as one of the most avant-garde German techno groups. But for those in the know about the underground dance scene, Air Liquide have been consistently producing challenging, yet highly addictive music for a number of years now.

Three people make up Air Liquide; Dr Walker (Ingmar Koch), Jammin' Unit (Cem Oral) and singer Mary Applegate (who comes from a pop background, having written the lyrics to Jennifer Rush's hit single *The Power Of Love*). They have also built up a network with other Cologne artists, including Khan (Cem's brother), Mike Inc and Jorg Burger. All

these artists are releasing material today, and all share a common vision and philosophy.

So what is this vision? In an interview Ingmar once said, "I don't want to make music for people when they're washing dishes or cleaning their apartments. It's boring, I hate this kind of thing. Music should touch your heart, your fears, not make one sound for half an hour."

To say Air Liquide's music is dark would be an understatement. Whether they are pumping out full-on techno, indulging in electro, serving up rich, textured soundscapes of ambience or taking their new departure of breakbeats, you get the feeling they are right on the edge of their abilities. If something has been done and put on the map of techno, then you should understand that it is no longer of any interest to them.

I first listened to Air Liquide about three years ago when I bought the album *The Increased Difficulty of Concentration*. That experience still lives with me today. In an age when music had to be "uplifting", the sound they created was fresh. Air Liquide have a vast back-catalogue, scattered amongst a variety of labels. Check out Rising High, Sm:(e) NYC, Blue, Djungle Fever, Blue Planet and Harvest. Albums such as *Nephology* (The New Religion), *The Increased Difficulty of Concentration*, *Radiowaves* and *Air Liquide* have been pivotal moments in electronic history.

Once in the studio, Air Liquide follow no set rules or formulae. Their greatness comes from their unpredictability. You can't really talk about pushing back boundaries when the boundaries don't exist in someone's head! Indeed, it does appear that the greatest experimental artists of the electronic genre are the ones who don't think or create within set limits. Quite fitting for a form of music that is inventing itself from totally new types of instruments and composition tools.

Air Liquide was born of the school of hard knocks that was responsible for Ingmar's education. An electronics whizz from his teenage years, a load of new electronic sounds that he had invented were stolen by a synthesizer company at the age of sixteen. After that he produced a string of successful commercial hits for a Frankfurt house label. Three and a half million copies were sold, but the company went bust before he could see a single penny of his cut.

From that moment, Ingmar decided to make only the music that he really liked. The result is a new independent electronic music scene for Cologne, some of the most respected and admired music and artists of today, a multitude of labels and the highly successful Liquid Sky parties. Yes! Liquid Sky was one of the few club nights that I had a real longing to visit. It was here that Air Liquide perfected their spellbinding live performances and DJ sets in front of a local crowd, and also discovered and nurtured new artists and DJs, giving them the confidence and freedom to

create their own music.

Tonight (13/02/97) will see a rare appearance by Air Liquide and the rest of the Cologne collective in London at the 333 Club in Old Street (333 Old Street, London EC1) from "10 till death" as the publicity points out! I counted over ten named artists plus guests, so there will be something for everyone on two floors of teeming action. Look out in particular for live sets by Air Liquide, The Bionaut, Khan and Frank Heiss. On the decks you can enjoy the talents of Freddie Fresh, Strobocop, Kron and Thomas Thorn. This all comes highly recommended from the Electric Cafe.

I leave you with the words of a journalist who said, "A recent single was charmingly titled *Don't Fuck With Cologne*. Far better to let Cologne fuck with you."

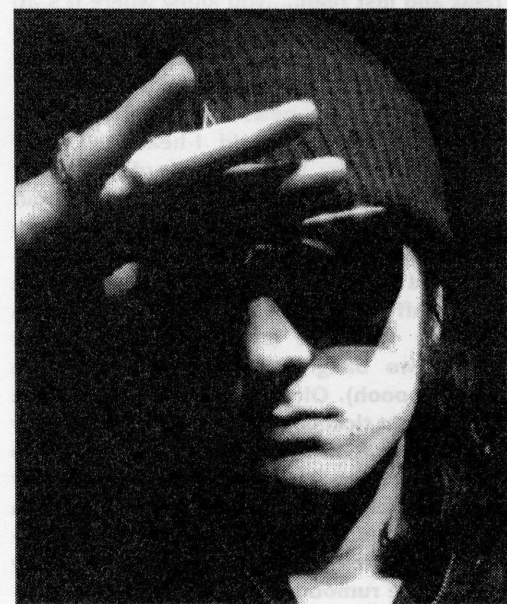

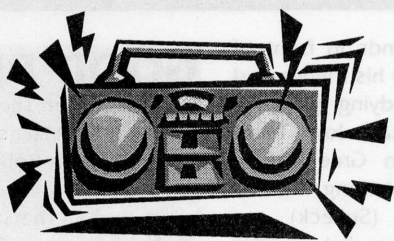

Starring: Kevin Kline, Joan Cusack, Matt Dillon, Tom Selleck
Director: Frank Oz ★★

In & Out is a comedy inspired by Tom Hanks' *Philadelphia* Oscar acceptance speech, in which he accidentally outed his gay high school teacher. In the big screen version of events, it is Matt Dillon as Cameron Drake whose message of gratitude calls into question the sexuality of his old teacher Howard Brackett, played by Kevin Kline. What's more, Howard is about to marry Emily (Cusack), his fiancée of some three years, that very week.

In & Out actively tries to distance itself from Hollywood 'issue' films and, left in no doubt that the situation is to be played solely for laughs, we are transported to Greenleaf, Indiana to witness the effect on Howard and his impending marriage. The residents of the small town in America's heartland are initially sceptical, but the seeds of doubt have been sown. Mr Brackett always dresses so neatly, and he does adore Barbara Streisand. And so do all gay men, don't they? Of course, Emily is in no



doubt that her husband to be is hiding nothing. Then again, it has been an unusually long engagement, and yet their physical relationship hasn't progressed far

beyond holding hands in front of the TV. It's not only his friends and family who are studying his every move, as America's low brow media descend on Greenleaf in search of a story. Among them is Peter Malloy (Selleck) a homosexual journalist who attempts to befriend Howard for the sake of an interview.

We are used to seeing Kevin Kline in somewhat unhinged roles, so it is a relief that he doesn't overplay his character's camp leanings. It is difficult to fault his performance as a man desperately trying to 'broke' up his prissy image. The film is served well by its supporting cast, particularly the female characters. Joan Cusack is very good as the devoted Emily, whose self esteem is dented further by recent developments. However, the film is so desperate to remain within the bounds of political correctness that most of the reactions to the outed Howard are fairly predictable and safe. *In & Out* is well executed to a point, but any charm it may have is overshadowed by the truly appalling finale. **F**

SOMETHING FISHY GOING ON IN CHEM ENG

EASY ACCESS (FOR THE BOYS)

Claire Dowie

This is the new play by Claire Dowie - hailed by some as the female answer to the "angry young men" of modern theatre - in which she explores the delicate issue of childhood sexual abuse. The central character Michael is a prostitute who believes that he was abused by his father as a small child, and the play charts his changing attitudes toward his father and his actions. At first Michael denies that his father's treatment of him was abuse at all, insisting that he still has a good relationship with his father.

During the play, Michael is making a video diary containing all the most intimate details of his life. He spends a large amount of time speaking out front to the camera, with the recording being simultaneously projected onto a gigantic screen on stage. As he relates his life story, we see his attitude toward his father gradually changing under the influences of the best friend Gary and boyfriend Matt. Michael

goes through the whole spectrum of reactions, from denial, through anger toward his father, to the realisation that his father's abuse of him had somehow made him feel special and loved - exactly the opposite of what one would expect.

Throughout the early part of the play Michael's father Ed hovers in the background, his constant presence symbolic of the far reaching effect he has had on Michael's life. Whenever Michael and Matt become physically close, Ed appears behind them and begins to act out the same kissing and touching that they are involved in. This is very obviously intended only as a metaphor, but nonetheless a surreal effect. Dowie also uses the device of the juxtaposition of different scenes, so that the action moves fluidly between separate conversations between Michael and others, and characters can be passively present without being directly involved.

Michael returns to his father's

home to find that he has taken on live-in help for the bar which he runs, in the form of Ruth who now lives upstairs with her young son Jake. Michael is immediately worried, soon becoming terrified that his father is now abusing Jake, so that he makes every effort to persuade Ruth to leave. His father chooses this time to discuss with him the events of the past, playing on Michael's resentment towards his mother, who left when he was six years old, and saying that he never really did anything, nothing significant, and that it only happened once, after all. After this Michael really begins to doubt the accuracy of his own memories, half believing his father's platitudes, but is also hurt at the idea of his father's having found a substitute for him, in Jake. The plot comes to a horrifying climax, and only then does the full intricacy of the subject matter become apparent, showing that we can never be completely aware of the nature of the abuse

which is going on.

After seeing the climax, the viewer's impression of the entire play is dramatically altered, and it seems to me that Claire Dowie has written the play almost solely with the intention of creating the situation in which such a climax can occur, with the result that many scenes appear lame or irrelevant. The cast rise above this to some extent, in particular Malcolm James in the portrayal of the relationship between Matt and Michael, and Peter Marinker, who captured well the mild menace inherent in Ed; although I was unimpressed by Natasha Langridge's somewhat stilted performance. Despite the fact that neither the potential of the writing, nor that of the several clever devices used, is fulfilled, the play succeeds in raising many interesting questions, and challenging the accepted view of what constitutes sexual abuse.

ALBERT HERRING

Benjamin Britten

You're in London, arguably the cultural capital of the world and you think that, maybe sometime you might possibly like to see an opera. But you're in London which is famous for its extortionate ticket prices and you can only just afford a pint or ten down the bar. And then you remember that you're a scientist at IC, so where did you get such a stupid idea from in the first place? For those of you who might have even the slightest of cultural tendencies, here's your chance. Opera for £3 and just across the road from DaVinci's. The Britten Theatre is one of the best opera venues in London and even the cheap seats are excellent.

Based on Guy de Maupassant's short story, *Le Rosier de Madame Husson*, the opera is set in the fictional East Anglian coastal town of Loxford at the turn of the century. Those of you who are familiar with either that area or who simply have a general idea of British small-town mentality will be able to relate very easily to the characters and setting. Self-appointed moral guardian of Loxford, Lady Billows is discussing candidates for the town's May Queen with a group of local representatives (schoolmistress, vicar, mayor, and policeman); however, the suitability of all the candidates is called into question by Lady Billows' housekeeper Florence who's notebook is at the ready. Eventually they have to settle for a May King instead and

the honour is to be given to Albert Herring - a rather simple chap who works for his mother at the grocer's shop. Unfortunately for the moral majority, the prize money and a practical joke where his lemonade is laced with rum, provide him with the conditions to break out of the stifling constraints of the village society: this opera is, in the end, a coming-of-age story.

This chamber opera can be appreciated on many levels; Britten's characterisation is reminiscent of the Mozart comic operas: the vocal writing for each individual character perfectly portrays the particular neurosis and disposition of that person. Thus, Lady Billows' music is full of musical outbursts and arpeggiated figures which mirror her self-righteous moral and patronising personality. There are so many other details which may go unnoticed on one's first hearing but that won't spoil one's appreciation of it; underneath the light-hearted exterior there lies quite a profound message with music of equal depth, confirming Britten as one of the greatest operatic composers of this century.

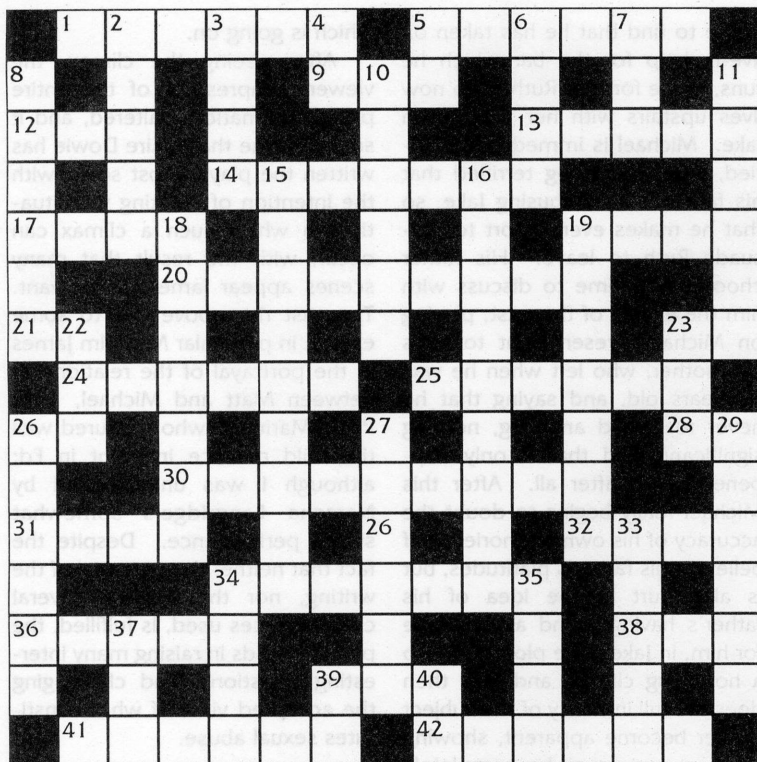
