IC Tops the Charts

Imperial College's consistent research excellence has been emphatically rewarded with the princely sum of £104 million in research funding. This is the largest amount allocated to any university in the country, according to the Higher Education Supplement. The figure is made up of money from the Higher Education Funding Council for England, as well as the college's generic income from joint projects with industry. The amount is a 5.1% increase on last year and places Imperial above Cambridge and Oxford, who were rewarded £90 and £84 million respectively.

The 1998-99 allocations are the result of a research assessment exercise carried out in 1996. This assessment was also used to assign last year's funding levels, but Imperial received less as some of its grant was used to support those who performed badly in the assess-This time Imperial has retained its full award, leaving the HEFCE to pay the aid bill. The assessment procedure, which is still under development; considers a wide range of factors and allots them a relative weight.

All universities have received an increase on last year's awards in cash terms, but the high flyers have

clearly prospered to the detriment of the lesser universities, with 24 of the 135 higher education institutes gaining monetary increases below inflation.

Imperial has avoided getting caught up in the rapture caused by

the results' announcement last week, viewing the THES figures as extremely dubious. According to the finance department £170 million is a more accurate estimation of IC's research funding, but the increase on last year is apparently only slightly above inflation, with one department source stating "we don't think we're that much better off than last year". The amount includes revenue from tuition fees, which "causes us some concern". It is felt that the college is in a slightly more vulnerable position than last year, as the funding is the source of academic staffs' salaries, and difficulties with the collection of student fees could strain college resources.

On a national scale academic staff are exposed in having to rely so heavily on student fees. David Triesman, General Secretary of the Association of University Teachers, was far from contented with Government spending; "The universities are hanging on by their finger nails. We recognise a serious effort is being made to inject stability, but it remains a constant problem while all the big policy decisions for higher education are on ice."

College Steal STA Deal

The Union has found itself £42,000 per year worse off this week as a

result of a move from College which has been described by one senior source as "blackmail". College has demanded a 70% share of the proceeds generated from the space rented to STA Travel, which at present goes directly into Union funding. If the Union do not accept this deal then the Rector, Sir Ronald Oxburgh, has stated that the planned JCR development will not go ahead.

The edict from Sir Ron comes shortly after College attempted to force the Union to pay £100,000 for the desperately needed renovation, and thus some see the move as being purely cash-driven. Coming

on top of last year's loss of the Bookstore and recent attempts by its successor, Waterstone's, to take over the sta-

tionary and card trade on campus, senior figures view this as the next step in the Rector's master-plan to remove ICU's entire trading arm -

which at present generates in excess of £100,000 worth of extra funding for Union clubs and services.

> With 270 new students arriving on campus October, ICU have been left with no options but to accept the deal, leading Andy Heeps, ICU President, to describe this as "the worst week of my Presidency." In a letter to the Rector dated 10 March, Mr Heeps laid out the terms on which the Union accepts the deal; "That the Union is redeveloped over the summer vacation... that the Union is not financially disadvan-

taged... that the College affirms its commitment to seeing Union

Football Club Fracas

(Take Four)

The ICU Football team has landed itself in controversy once again. The latest incident took place at the Kensington Park Hotel during the team's Annual Dinner, only two days after a Union disciplinary found the fourth team guilty of bringing the Union into disrepute, after a match at Bath resulted in a string of complaints from Bath's Student Union.

Having booked the Hotel with £500 cash - and thus without the prior consent of the Union - the team then proceeded to enjoy themselves in their usual fashion. Consequently, the Union found themselves faced with a bill for damages totalling £1034 on Monday morning. The bill includes "an entire silver cutlery set and a painting, which had been torn down and urinated over". Faced with the bill Andy Heeps, ICU President, has declared that he will force the football club to foot the bill or face disbanding.

However, a football spokesman suggested that the damage caused by the party should not be overstated; "A few expensive items were borrowed from the hotel. They will be returned... Otherwise it was no different from any other ICU sports bash". He went on to add "Kids & beer - they just don't mix"

Coming on top of other ICU football related incidents this year, including the incident at Bath and the destruction caused by the Hammersmith pub crawl last November, which led to all IC students being barred from several pubs, this is being seen as the last straw by senior Union figures. Severe disciplinary action is anticipated.

News in Brief...

THIEVES WASTE COMPUTER

A computing student and two intruders were involved in a fistfight in the Huxley building last week as the men attempted to steal a lap-top computer. Although nobody was hurt, the computer was broken in the scuffle and the thieves escaped from the building unhindered. Ken Weir, Chief Security Officer, stressed that on no account should any students put them selves at risk in this way, but should call security on 4444 for immediate action on any emergency or security alert.

5th SABBATICAL

A new sabbatical position will be created for ICU in 1999 - 2000, if a motion passed at last week's Union Council is approved by college. The position, to be contested in the elections next February will add a Deputy President

(Students Affairs) to the current team. They will be responsible for the welfare and academic affairs of students, currently undertaken by the President.

The same motion also recommended that the president of IC School of Medicine Students' Union has sabbatical status for two further years before falling in line with the other CCUs.

STUFF PINCHED

Residents from Brabazon House, one of Charing Cross' halls, returned home last Friday afternoon to find the new video recorder and Nintendo 64 games system absent. After a few hours of general enquiries it was concluded that they had been stolen. Preliminary investigations failed to reveal their whereabouts and the police were called in.

The scene of the crime was sealed off while police investigations were carried out. There was no sign of a forced entry to the building.

Mines Rock Teaching Awards

The departments of Materials, Earth Resources Engineering and the Centre for Composite Materials scored full marks in a joint Teaching Quality Assessment carried out at the beginning of this month.

The assessment was conducted by the Higher Education Funding Council for England and is part of a national investigation into the quality of university education. During the week long assessment a team of inspectors rigorously analysed various aspects of the departments, classified as materials technology, ranging from curriculum design to student support. More importantly the standard of teaching, learning and self-assessment was explored in detail to discover exactly how good the educational package is. It is important to note that the primary objective of

the assessment was to ascertain whether departments are meeting their attainment targets. However, this is not to say that those which aim low get good scores as the mark also reflects how the high targets are.

The Dean of the RSM, Professor Rees Rawlings, revealed in a meeting with students that they had scored 24 points out of a possible 24. The assessors highlighted the excellent links with industry, the high standard of the

graduates, unparalleled library facilities and good staff-student relations. No other institution has achieved full marks in this subject with Oxford and Cambridge managing only 23 and old rivals Camborne School of Mines scraping 21. Other departments in IC were also assessed, including Chemical Engineering Aeronautics, but failed to score full marks. Prof McLean, head of the Materials department hoped that this mark would go a long way to giving the department "recognition for its high standards".

In the meeting where the result was announced, Professor Terezopoulos from ERE reminded the gathering that "Nobody is perfect", to which the Dean replied, "I think we're approaching it."

BUSA Put it to Bed


The dust has finally settled concerning Imperial's place in the British Universities Sports Association. It appears that IC will be permitted to take part in competitions as a 'hybrid' entry. The subject has proved to be one of this year's most contentious issues, causing numerous debates within ICU as well as the wider London student community.

The issue arose because of the medical schools' merger with their parent institutes throughout London. At IC the debate centred around South Kensington's wish to join with the medics and enter as a single applicant, while IC School of Medicine Students' Union insisted on having two independent entries.

Last Friday in Birmingham the BUSA executive convened and, apparently, laid the issue to rest with a decision to allow universities in the London Division to compete in BUSA as 'hybrid' entrants. Hybrid entry is an ICU idea, and

allows medics to represent either their parent institute or medical college on an exclusive basis. Other students of the university will only be allowed to represent their own institute. The system has succeeded in placating several other London universities and their respective medical schools, and should ease the transition from affiliate to merged subsidiary. It has been agreed that the system will be used until 2001, when all the universities involved will use single entries. There is a possibility that the BUSA executive will refuse to give the final approval at their next meeting on 15 June, but the chances of this are being dismissed as "negligible" by ICU.

Charlie Joynt, Deputy President (Clubs & Societies), is relieved that the issue is at an end; "It got off to a shaky start - IC council didn't take the right attitude to start off with, however we went back to the drawing board, came up with a better plan and convinced London of the plan's worthiness".

facilities remain and expand..."

In his letter, Mr Heeps also pointed out that under the Memorandum of Understanding the agreement by which College determines the basis of the Union's existence - the areas designated for the Union include "the space currently occupied by the Travel Agencies... and Sherfield Room 216C [the site of the present STA Academic Travel shop] in accordance with the terms of the lease agreement approved by College on 9 November 1993". Although this document is currently being rewritten, the present version is still valid. However, most senior figures questioned believe that the Rector could have it overturned almost at will. Mr Heeps also notes that the Union paid £25,000 four years ago to have the room developed so that it could be used by STA "converting it from a catering storeroom into the retail outlet that currently occupies the space".

On the financial side the outcome comes as another blow, compounding the loss of income from the Bookstore, for which an appropriate level of compensation has still not been agreed, a year after the closure. Coming in the same week

that the Union Executive agreed to spend £300,000 on the essential redevelopment of the ground floor of the Union Building during the summer, this puts ICU in a precarious position. It has also been a major factor in the recent resignation of Brian Roscoe, the ICU Shop Manager

It is the long-term strategy behind the move which has caused the greatest concern. Fears that the College's goal is to remove the Union's right to trade, and replace the income generated with increased central funding may sound harmless, but Mr Heeps sums-up the feelings of many in the Union in his letter, saying "such a move would breed a dependency culture, which would lead to the downfall of the Union's identity and pride... It is therefore essential that the Union receives a guarantee that the Union Shop, Newsagents and refectories continue to exist as services run by students for students... so that threats which currently emanate from the College can be quashed". In the end, however, the chain of events means that the ICR development should now go ahead in time for the arrival of the medical students in the Autumn, and the cost must now be borne in its entirety by College.

CASH QUESTIONS

Dear Felix

Since becoming Acting Honarary Junior Treasurer of City and Guilds College Union recently, several things have come to my attention, most of which are related to the "fund with no name."

It appears that the reason why the CCUs are failing to provide the service expected of them, is not just due to poor union officers, but also due to a lack of funding from ICU.

In the last few years C&GU has lost several thousand pounds of self generated income and five year plan money to the "fund with no name."

This is only significant when I explain what these funds could have been used for.

Self generated income is the only money that can be used for social activities under ICU Finance rules. This means that several thousand pounds that could have been used to run bar nights and subsidise C&G dinners, etc. has been taken by ICU from C&GU and placed in the "fund with no name."

Five year plan money is the money that could have been used to refurbish the C&GU office and buy new computers for use by the C&GU clubs / societies.

This is just the start of what appears to be a trend of moving the money from the CCUs to ICU.

If this trend continues as it seems sure to do, then the CCUs will cease to operate altogether.

I hear rumours now that ICU wants to move the sale of regalia from C&GU to the ICU shop, reducing the income of C&GU again. This is a direct parallel with the way ICU lost its bookshop last year.

If the funding crisis of the CCUs is not ended soon, then it looks more and more likely that the CCUs will have to unite and fight against ICU.

If the CCUs act together, they have the majority vote on ICU Council and can overthrow any more stupid plans that the anti-CCU megalomaniacs on council may have.

The new exec will have a tough job to try to rebuild C&GU, but if ICU will help them, especially financially, they can start making C&GU work for the student population again.

You complain of ICU 'removing funds' from the C&GU. As far as I am aware, funds are only returned to ICU at the end of the year, as with all clubs. The Union operates a budget system, whereby you submit an application for cash before the year starts, stating how much money you want and what it is to be spent on. Subject to approval, this is what you will receive. If you don't need all of the money, it is naturally returned to ICU at the end of the year. More money may be claimed from the Union's Finance Council, who are quite happy to fund justified applications.

Union money may be spent on social events, but cannot be used to buy food or alcohol. This is not because the Union is mean, but because it is illegal. Only money that is earned by the club itself (self-generated income) used. However, you should realise that SGI is still union money and as such is subject to the usual totting-up at the end of the year. If your SGI forms a large part of your total income, there may be a case to set up a reserve account to keep hold of it, but this is generally only applicable if it actually exceeds the Union grant.

You concerns over regalia are also unfounded. While ICU are planning to sell the ties, scarves etc from the shop, they are doing so with the co-operation of the CCUs, who were unable to sell them effectively. Furthermore, they were not making any money on the sales, do ICU is really doing them a financial favour.

If C&GU are not able to fund the projects they require, it is almost certainly due to bad budgeting and financial incompetence, and certainly not some union conspiracy. I hope you will look into these matters more carefully before making a fuss at ICU Council. C&GU have enough problems at the moment, without one of their exec making a tit of himself at Council. Ed

GLIDING PLEA

Dear Felix,

I am writing, on behalf of Imperial College Gliding Club, to thank everyone who came to visit us on Thursday 5th when we had a glider parked on the Queen's Lawn. For those people who didn't know about this, our reason for doing so (apart from it being the club's 68th anniversary) was to advertise our offer of an introductory flight for half-price (i.e. £9 instead of £18) to anyone who joins the gliding club this academic year.

An introductory flight consists of a briefing by a qualified instructor, followed by a 10-20 minute flight (dependant on weather conditions) in our two-seat training glider. Membership of ICGC allows you to continue learning to fly in our gliders at only 12p/minute (free after 2 hours), and also makes you a member of Lasham Gliding Society (the biggest gliding club in the country) where we are based. Lasham has the best launching facilities in the country, and our launch fees are subsidised by the Union giving us a 40% discount. This means that on a good day in the Summer when flights of 5 hours or more are possible, you can take a winch launch and spend the day racing around the countryside using nature's energy, for less than \$20.

The best gliding weather is from March-October and, although it does take a while (40-60 flights is average) to go solo, learning is part of the fun. Gliding is one of the cheapest and most enjoyable ways of learning to fly, even at non-university clubs where flying similar gliders costs around three times as much. We also run subsidised courses and tours during the holidays, and experienced members can train to become instructors, and take part in cross-country competitions (where pilots race each other on tasks of around 100-500km) and aerobatics competitions.

Gliding is a satisfying, fun and diverse sport, suiting both people who just want to "get away from it all" at the weekend and people who want to combine exhilarating flying with an intellectual challenge. ICGC has the gliders, facilities and instructors to train people from their first flight up to solo standard and beyond. The best example of this is ex-student member Afandi Darlington who started gliding with ICGC and, at the end of his 4 year Aeronautics degree, came 2nd in British Junior Gliding Championships.

If anyone has any questions about ICGC or gliding in general, then E-

mail me on Error! Bookmark not defined, and I will be glad to help. Alternatively, we have weekly meetings (Thursdays 1-2) in Aeronautics Room 254 where people can join the club, arrange to go gliding and find out more. Our main aims are to give everyone the chance to find out what gliding is like and to help people to progress as fast as their money and free time will allow. If you have any comments and suggestions about how we can make gliding more accessible to students, I would be very interested to hear them

Thanks for your time everyone, Andy Holmes, ICGC.

PS. Anyone who would like to try gliding, but doesn't want to "gamble" their membership fee before they find out if they like it, can book a non-member's introductory flight for £18. We will reduce your membership fee by £9 (to £20) if you join the club on the day of your introductory flight.

PPS. The first 5 people to E-mail me can have an introductory flight and ICGC membership for £25.

Editorial

Once upon a time, there was old. old document called, although nobody knows why, Memorandum of Understanding. Archaeologists, after years of studying the bizarre and bewilderingly complex language, have come to the conclusion that is was an agreement between what is now called the Great Imperial World Legacy and something called "Imperial College Union". Says the document: "The College will continue to involve its students", whatever they are, "through the Imperial College Union, in discussion on all policy and administrative matters concerning students' social, cultural, welfare, sporting, academic and other appropriate interests." (it was written in the days when sport and cultural activities were still permitted by the Legacy). Stranger still, it appears to actually offer concessions to ICU: "Any changes to this document... shall be as a result of full consultation with ICU and as finally determined by the Governing Body [Power and Fortune to the Legacy]." What can it possibly mean? Let us look inside...

Here we find the greatest surprise of all - the Legacy allowed allow ICU to operated and profit from trading activity on its own property - "ICU may continue to operate legitimate trading activities in the College", and "ICU may

retain any profits received from its trading activities or rental charged to its franchises to fund legitimate student activities." Doubly strange then, that the document dates from the same period that historians believe formed the beginning of the Legacy's great empire building era - subsuming a little bookshop, travel agent and bar before moving on to annex other campuses, universities and entire countries, but we all know that. Indeed, the document was in force during this entire period (though it was watered-down in 1998) but must have been totally disregarded; take for instance "ICU may occupy... in order to fulfil its legitimate role and may allow outside organisations to use whole or parts of it for any agreed purpose... No 4. Sherfield Room 216C [STA Travel] in accordance with the terms of the lease agreement approved by MPG on 9 November 1993", in place when, according to a rare surviving copy of the evil anti-legacy newspaper Felix, the STA shop was taken by the college without consultation or Governing Body approval (Power and Fortune to the Legacy).

But then again, the Legacy would never have got where it is today giving concessions to weak, subversive influences such as this Imperial College Union seems to have been!

One of more useful things about having new governments is that they take a fresh look at affairs, and find it politically a great deal easier to change them. This has just submitted its report to the House. This report covers aspects of the debating process itself - more fundamental changes to the ways MPs work and live are months, if not vears away.

Some of the things that are likely to be scrapped seem to have long lived past their usefulness. Under present Parliamentary procedure, if a Member shouts "I spy strangers", the Speaker must call a vote on whether to ban "strangers" from the room. Strangers are people within the Parliamentary building who are not Members or Peers. The name Strangers itself is up for review - it is considered not particularly welcoming. The procedure was originally adopted to prevent agents of the monarch listening in to debates and reporting the results back to the palace. It was also used during the Second World War for security reasons, although it could never realistically be used now, since it would not look too impressive for a constitutional democracy not to let the public hear what its supreme body was discussing. Instead it is used now to interrupt debates, something which it can do to good effect.

Another ridiculous regulation up for the scrapheap is the rule that a Member must be "seated and covered" to make a point of order during a debate. Opera hats are placed at strategic points around the chamber, and whilst one is being passed

themselves suspended, although they may soon be unpaid. There are certain limits to what can be done within disciplinary policy - a person returned by a constituency should not just be told he can't turn up or vote anymore, since that goes directly against the principle of democracy, but there are certain things that can and it seems, will be done to redress the balance. On the

to the Member making the point, they tend to cover their head with a piece of paper. The vision of an MP making a serious point on parliamentary procedure whilst wearing a silly hat has, in the view of the Modernisation Committee, "almost certainly brought the House into greater ridicule than almost any other. We do not believe that it can be allowed to continue."


The House is also cracking down on bad behaviour from its members - showing a new sensitivity to public opinion on its rowdiness and ill-discipline. Presently, Members can obtain some free publicity by getting issue of general behaviour within the chamber, various ideas that were proposed (mainly by the new intake) were discarded: Members will still address the Speaker, rather than each other; Members will call each other "the Hon Member for [constituency]" rather than by name (this was to make it more difficult to refer to each other quickly, to stop debates degenerating into slanging matches); Members will still vote in person; and finally, the Speaker can still hold Members to account for their behaviour. One change will occur though: members of the Privy Council (those who are called "Rt

Hon"- members and exmembers of the Cabinet and party leaders) will no longer receive preference in the

speaking order, to allow Members to receive equal treatment within the chamber.

One of more interesting, and perhaps most important recommendation from the committee was that certain bills could go through Parliament more slowly, taking two years rather than just one. The administrative nightmare of allowing the Channel Tunnel Rail Link Bill to take longer than a single parliamentary term (period of time between Queen's Speeches) was generally considered to be senseless waste of time. This would prevent debacles such the law creating the Child Support Agency, which was rushed through without proper scrutiny, bequeathing us the present mess.

The minutiae of parliamentary procedure may seem dull to those not involved (if you think this lot was bad, the don't read Erskine May, the 600+ page guide to procedure: veteran MPs say they still don't understand it all) but it is vitally important in the passage of sensible legislation and maintaining Parliament high in the public esteem. If the Government can do this well, they will certainly have left at least one good legacy to its successors.



ROASTING - Part 1


To continue the oven theme I thought I'd do a little resumé of roasting techniques. Roasting is one of my favourite methods of cooking and has loads of advantages e.g. the food tastes great, you don't use much fat, it's ridiculously easy and it keeps the place warm.

A few general points to start with. Roasting implies using a quick, fierce heat. For meat this means you need a good quality piece of around four pounds so get some friends around. The oven needs to be very hot when the food is put in, generally 220°C, gas mark 8.

Right, first off, Beef. Suitable cuts include sirloin (expensive), silverside and chuck. Have a chat with your local family butcher and decide. Whilst your oven is warming up, wipe the joint with a damp cloth, season it with salt and pepper and place it in a roasting tin with some fat. The best fat is of course beef dripping but butter will do I suppose. You'll need about 1 oz per pound of beef. Put the roast into the very hot oven and leave for 10-15 minutes to sear the meat and then reduce to 180°C, gas mark 5. You'll need to baste the joint every 30 minutes to keep it nice and moist (this involves removing the joint from the oven with an appropriate insulating thing, pouring the fat in the tin over the meat using an large spoon and putting it back in the oven).

Total cooking time = 20 minutes per lb + 10 min for joints without a bone, or 15 minutes per lb + 15 min for joints with a bone.

Lamb. The only piece of lamb I reckon is really worth roasting is the leg. All the other bits are best grilled. A really tasty way of seasoning this is to insert slivers of garlic into the leg by cutting deep holes into it using a long thin knife and pushing slices of garlic right down the cut. Then rub with olive oil, salt and rosemary. Place

in the hot oven for 10 minutes and then reduce the heat to 180°C, gas mark 5 for the remaining time. No basting involved.

Total cooking time = 25 minutes per lb + 25 min for medium cooked, 30 minutes per lb + 30 min for well done.

Pork. I recommend (but again, your local butcher is the expert) that you use leg, loin or shoulder for roasting, with or without a bone. If you like crackling, buy a joint with its skin still on (this also removes the need to baste the joint. Bonus). Either way, score the top side of the joint with a sharp knife down to the flesh, rub with oil and seasonings. You can use practically any herb, spice or combination on pork. I'm particularly partial to a mixture of salt, pepper, cinnamon, mustard (powder) and sugar but garlic, cloves, bay, laurel etc ad nauseam are all excellent. Once flavoured, put the joint in a tin and into the oven at the usual 220°C, gas mark 8. After 10 minutes reduce to 180°C, gas mark 5 for the rest of the cooking time. If the joint does not have any skin, baste every 30 minutes.

Total cooking time = 35 minutes per lb + 35 min for boned joints, or 30 minutes per lb + 30 min for joints on the bone.

That's all for this week, I'll do fowl and vegetables next week. However, a guick word on carving (cutting up the roast): it's an extremely complicated subject that demands a lot of skill and practice. Needless to say I've got neither so I just hack whatever it is to pieces. Oddly enough, it tastes just as good.

CLARE: So what were you filming for today, Robson?




C: You met a lot of medical students today, does it worry you that the future of the Health Service is in our hands?

I got a fax from Wiija Records telling me they had a couple of spare tickets to see Cornershop and I was brimming with anticipation hours before the band came on stage. It takes you away from the mundane routine. It lifts you above the rubbish. It seems so simple that it makes you wonder how some bands lose the plot. The Hybirds have the rock blueprint to soar: grab a wing and prepare to fly. M



PROFILE LL Cool I

LL Cool J is possibly the most recognised rap artist in the world today, at the age of 28 his list of accomplishments seem too long for one so young: 2-time Grammy A award winner, six consecutive platinum selling albums, star of hit television show,

film actor, author, father and husband. Some call him the undisputed king of hip-hop, maybe that's a little too much, but he's certainly a hiphop sensation. LL is doin' it and doin' it and

LL was born James Todd Smith, but before long he had created his own stage name LL Cool I, and acronym for "Ladies Love Cool James". At 9 he was rapping and at 13 had already produced numerous demos, he sent off tape after tape in hope of a recording contract, the only



label to respond was the then tiny Def Jam. LL hit the scene in 1984, at the age of 16 he was the first artist

to release a single on the now legendary label Def Jam, I Need A Beat. The following year saw him release his first album, described by the critics as the most original album of the time Radio. Suddenly LL was thrust into the public eye and the following summer he went on tour with the biggest rappers, Run DMC. His second set took a while to hit the streets but Bigger and Deffer didn't disappoint, at the same time he also delivered the hit single I Need Your Love. LL's profile was large. LL's 1989 album Walking With a Panther was considered by most as the worst thing he had ever done and there was talk that LL had lost it. This talk was quickly dismissed with his next album when he got together with Marley Marl for the hugely successful Mama Said Knock You Out, this set re-established LL in the hip hop world. Mama Said.. featured the wicked Around The Way Girl, a top ten smash, LL won his first Grammy for Best Rap Solo. 1993 saw the release of 14 Shots to the Dome, this was real weak in comparison to his previous effort, but still reached platinum, to make it five in a row for him. Next up was Mr Smith, this featured the classic Hey Lover, this song featured the vocal styling of R&B group Boyz II Men. Hey Lover ended up being one of the biggest tunes LL had ever made and also gave him his second Grammy award. Along with Hey .. the album also featured Doin' It and Loungin', all these went to making Mr Smith LL's biggest selling album to date. LL's latest offering is Phenomenon this is not in the class of Mr Smith, but LL has high hopes for the singles after they get the remix treatment. Milen

his debut album from John B is again in that jazz D&B fusion style which is coming on strong recently. You get two CDs (Organic cover the jazz experience and Synthetic which covers more normal D&B) or a very nice vinyl box set for your money.

CD1. Organic is a full on jazz D&B affair that I have to say is constructed superbly, with John classical training shining through the productions, which are full of funk.

The jazz influences are very prominent, but not so much as to put off an open minded drum & bass fan. Some of the inspired pieces of work are Jazz Sessions 2. I've never heard a trumpet sound so good, and it sound as if it could be recreated using live just instruments? but still retains a very funky jacking drum & bass track. Slam Funk (moog mix) and Jazz Sessions 1, a awesome college of beats and live instruments and when it drops in you know all about it. Future funk in full effect

CD2. Synthetic is described as a harder analogue tip which is just

standard drum & bass to you and me. By that I do not mean to imply unoriginal or not cutting edge material, but unlike the first CD it doesn't exploring just one style to the max.

This CD is mixed to perfection combining ten tracks all created by the one man. Starburst sets off with an intro that could be from Chariots of Fire then it pans out to be a top notice roller. This is one of the things I love about D&B is that their are no rules, you can use any sound or sample you like as long as it works

This is so impressive, it could be a standard set you'd hear in a club or mixed CD you would never guess that all this is one mans work as each track is so different and so strong, there's no real running theme. When you think about it most other D&B albums being released to date are ether a compilation of various artists, or feature a lot of remixed old material as well as new. Very few single artist albums have featured 21 tracks with the majority being totally new material. The man is a genius.

So many styles are covered here. The jazz element being explored to the outer limits, dark menacing numbers, futuristic steppers, intelligent crazy kutt up break beats. So by the looks of it this is one of those must have pieces of work, that'll be talked about and played for years to come. IP

H-Life Feat. Da Scat Cat. Lifeguard

(Suth Based Prod.) Mid March.

It's been awhile since the last release from the fairly new Hi-Life. and this latest offering could well put them centre stage, with the recent trend towards "The Smooth Groove". With their trademark soulful licks, sub-bass tones, clever keys and those powerful vocals from Da Scat Cat it's sure to be big in the clubs. With mixes to suit dub monsters and classic vocal styles.

RBM. Strong Loving EP. (Ripe 'n' Ready) Out Now.

Quality vocal and dub/speed garage mixes on this one. The beats 'n' bass roll along behind prominent keys and a fine female vocal on the more vocal mixes. The one I've been playing is the dubby/speed mix, where the rolls are reversed, strong solid beats, stabs of keys and a cut 'n' looped vocal with a sub-bass that is worth the wait. Guaranteed to keep the floor moving, but the vocal can be a bit repetitive and annoying on heavy listening.

DRUM 'N' BASS

Primary Motive. Venom /S (Creative Source) Mid march

Smooth chopped up beats roll and build over what sounds like underwater atmosphericals and whale calls 'n' sonar sounds, then in drops the deep bass tones, completing the seascape in your mind. The imaginatively titled S has very cleverly arranged beats, difficult to explain with dreamy keys and atmos. and suttle touches of sax and ahh ahh female vocal blend into the beats. Another first class offering from this label that never ceases to impress me.

Chemical Pilot. (Eruption) Astral Dominoes (mixes) March.

You get remixes by Decoder, Matt Schwarz and Profound Noize, all to a very different end results. Decoders mix give it a Krust sort of full length roll out, nice use of morse code sounds, tough beats with an un-intrusive dark wah wah bassline, Matt mix is much more in ya face, fast hectic beats, timestretches. Profound Noize funk up the beats, strong bassline. If you like a touch of darkness now 'n' then, and something a little different it's well worth hunting down.

Hot on the heels of the Mr C interview last week, look out for forthcoming features on the stars of German electronic music, including interviews with Fauna Flash, who have been creating shockwaves on the international drum'n'bass scene; Michael Reinboth, who owns Germany's coolest experimental electronic/jazz label Compost Records and also DJs regularly at venues such as the Blue Note in London; and also Ingmar Koch from Air Liquide, who have produced some of my finest techno moments and also command lots of respect in the underground scene.

Firstly, I wanted to thank everyone who came down to the first ever Electric Cafe music night a couple of Thursdays ago. It really was an event that transformed Southside disco. The atmosphere was very friendly and relaxed. I think the concept of making it into another drinking area where you can chill out and chat to people worked really well. I played from 7pm to 11pm, and a whole range of musical styles were covered.

If you couldn't make it to the last one, we are going to make these a regular feature at Southside. The next one will be on Thursday 19th March (in less than a week).

You may remember that I was talking about a club called *Analog City* in my column a couple of weeks ago. It actually took place last weekend on Saturday 7th March at The Camden Island Market. I was lucky enough to be able to check out the event for myself. After taking a lot of stick, techno has been going through a bad patch lately. DJ Craig Thomas and his friends decided to put on this event to prove once and for all that techno is not dead, and is as musically significant as any other style present today.

First of all, I have to say that I was really impressed with the venue. The Camden Island Market is very clean and spacious. The design and layout was interesting as both dance floors are connected and you have to pass through onreto get to the other. Somehow this wasn't a problem and I never felt jostled or cramped. It

could have been nice to have a better chill-ouit area, but that is just a minor niggle!

Arriving soon after midnight, I found the place was still warming up. This was going to be a long night! The concept of the club was to get as many DJs as possible to play for a set amount of time. The idea was to keep a varied and fresh sound throughout the night. I think that this worked. I thought beforehand that an hour-long set would be too short for many DJs, but I do respect Craig for trying a new concept that goes against the grain. Giving each DJ a deadline to spark off the crowd led to a sense of urgency in many sets. There were no long build-ups, each spinner got straight to the point and really let the music do the talking.

Two rooms were pumping out the grooves all night. The back room was the perfect setting for complete techno mayhem. Very minimal and rhythmic. The setting was dark and smokey. The music was good if you like hard techno. James Ruskin did an admirable job, pounding the crowd into a frenzy. However, player of the night in the main room had to be Craig Thomas. This was his night, and I was in awe of his set. It was by far the funkiest thing to hit that room allnight, yet it didn't compromise the atmosphere or loose the crowd at all.

The music represented in the other room was the housier side of techno. Some very rhythmic and groovy tracks kept a very friendly crowd smiling all night. All the DJs played really expressive, quality sets of music; none moreso than Mark Dale. Mark is the brother of one of my musical heroes, Colin Dale and is also a very highly respected DJ. I have seen him play twice at now. Once was on the main floor of The End at an old *Deep Space* party where he played hard and had the crowd screaming for more. This weekend he played a very different set that had the same effect! Techno DJs aren't versatile? I don't think so!

All in all, everyone I came into contact with had a great night out so well done to *Analog City*! If you missed out this time round then you can catch it every month at the Camden Island Market. The Electric Cafe will be running future

AS GOOD AS IT GETS



An acerbic-tongued romantic novelist, Nicholson takes pride in his ability to condescend, offend and wound. First introduced to the audience as an "animal-hater", who disposes of his neighbour's dog down the trash chute, he soon reveals himself to also be a racist, homophobe, misogynist... In short, this man is abhorrent and will no doubt offend many sections of the audience

There is only one person in the world who can tolerate Nicholson's sarcastic tirades. Helen Hunt is a waitress who works in Jack's favourite cafe and has a special relationship with the dysfunctional loner. This is enhanced when he pays for hospital treatment for her asthmatic son and soon this flash of generosity has surprising consequences on all around.

Once again Jack Nicholson proves himself to be one of the best actors in Hollywood today. One of the few individuals who could handle such a complex role. he delivers it with great conviction and deservingly won a Golden Globe Award for best actor this year. It will be a travesty if he fails to make it a third Oscar as well in a couple of weeks.

Last seen in the 1997 summer blockbuster Twister, Helen Hunt delivers her best performance to

American President's reputation when, less than two weeks before election day, a scandal erupts and threatens to cripple the bid for a second term. Anticipating the press attention, De Niro creates a bigger story, a war. With the help of Dustin Hoffman, a successful film producer, he brings together a range of unlikely people together to orchestrate a global conflict to rival any Hollywood production.

The combination of De Niro and Hoffman's smart thinking produces a cascade of events, that get more and more outrageous and daring, in the effort to last out the 11 days before the polls open.

There are great performances from both the leading actors as the two characters keep playing off each other in order to keep deceiving the press, the public and the CIA. The film has a very topical plot with the scenario being not entirely dissimilar to that being faced by President Clinton involving the alleged sex scandal and the Gulf war.

All in all, this is a clever film worth watching for its outrageous, yet quite believable, plot and the quality performances.

kay, so it's the morning after, and I'm sitting here desperately trying to write up my CV, when suddenly..."We're looking, we're looking, we're looklook-look-looking...." Oh, where was I? Oh, yes, I'm attempting to sum up the achievements of my illustrious career in a couple of pages of absolutely truthful and in no way exaggerated prose, when I'm distracted by....."We're looking for a P-I-A-N-O!" If by now you're wondering what the hell I'm talking about, I'm being plagued by the infectious melodies and sparkly silliness of "Salad Days," the show which has just finished a five night run aided by the silver tongues and twinkle toes of Imperial College Operatic Society.

The plot, as vaguely intimated in our preview two weeks ago, concerns in some way that most innocent of musical instruments, a piano. In fact, not just any old piano – but "the one that maks you dance!" The plot itself is, of course, highly spurious, being a chain of events of quite unrivalled implausibility, strung shamelessly together and connected by links

lacking in even the faintest trace of credibility. This was, even more obviously, the intention of the authors; the plot is simply a vehicle for the songs, and an excuse for some silly dancing – and let's face it, who needs an excuse for that? During the course of the show we encounter a magical piano called Minnie, who is in the competent hands of our heroes Timothy and Jane, a deliciously tacky nightclub, and the obligatory flying saucer complete with attendant aliens.

The whole show is peppered with humour, ranging form the surreal to the downright ludicrous, with a few horrendous puns along the way. The cast really use this to full effect, and we are treated to some truly priceless moments. One such occurs during an almost serious dialogue, when a nun rollerskates serenely across the stage, Martini-girl style, balancing a gin bottle above her head. Toward the end of the show, the magical Minnie is lost, and everyone and everything is thrown into chaos. The entire population of London appears to be out in force searching for her, and this is where the "look-look-look-lookimmortal

looking" occurs. Just when despair is nigh, darkness falls over the world, and we witness the landing of the mandatory UFO, which looks suspiciously like a Tardis. Here comes what is possibly my favourite moment in the whole thing; Troppo, one of the guardians of the piano, a wonderfully cute and timid character who communicates only through mime, is so terrified that he unfolds from his pocket a brown paper bag, and places it over his head, this removing the cause of his fear. Now we meet the occupants of the flying saucer, a crew of lycra-clad aliens with big hair and even bigger feet, who danced in a most alluring manner, their lycra tastefully cut to reveal one nipple. Of course, for the spacecraft our heroes are able to spot Minnie, and return to earth to rescue her, saving the day. After that, naturally, everyone gets married, and they all live happily ever after.

Now we come to the bit you've all been waiting for – my verdict. Firstly, I was impressed by the chorus line, with excellent singing and diction, and some very stylish dancing – especially on the part of

the stripping nuns. There was also very good singing from all the principals, some of whose songs weren't the easiest in the world to sing. There was a large amount of shameless hamming, (but what else can you do with a script like that?) although there was some very nice acting, particularly as the sober Minister for Pleasure and Pastimes, and the fragile camp tailor, who I only later discovered were played by the same person. The universal set was simple and fitted each scene well, and the costumes were absolutely stunning, especially those wonderful aliens. I left the hall in the mood to sing and dance, and had to consciously stop myself from tapping my feet. I could add a couple more criticisms, but I don't think I will, because all in all I enjoyed the show so much!

COSI FAN TUTTE Shaftesbury Theatre

ith its improbable disguises and farcical deceptions, *Cosi fan tutte* has often been visualised as a frivolous entertainment, with a plot that scarcely deserves the accomplished genius of his score." – Jonathan Miller, Director

This is a shame, because the frivolity of the opera's plot highlights the theatrical conventions of the time. Four lovers deceive themselves and each other by a mixture of disguises and good luck. In the same way that Lois Lane can't recognise Clark Kent as Superman when he's wearing glasses, the two sisters cannot recognise their lovers when they're disguised as Albanians. It sounds silly, and to a certain extent it is very silly, but the opera shouldn't be dismissed as trivial. The "artificial comedy" demonstrates reality, without blindly representing it. It's the

symmetry of the plot, the four deceitful/self-deceiving lovers, and the two guardians of moral authority, Reason and Instinct, that makes the opera so completely of its time. The librettist, da Plante, worked very closely with Mozart on the opera, to produce a beautiful piece of theatre.

I know that many people feel that opera is irrelevant to their lives, they don't like it, they can't understand it, it's in a foreign language, but don't dismiss it. Opera is universal, it isn't only put on for the benefit of rich people and companies. It's a tragedy that many people don't enjoy classical music; it's not boring or pretentious, and I'm not wierd for being a fan. Of course you have musical snobs, who elegantly sneer at you when you prefer Puccini to some obscure Yugoslavian composer with an unpronounceable name and impossible to listen to music. But then there are indie snobs who prefer some unknown band to anything popular, despite the difference in quality. In my ideal world, this sort of musical snobbery wouldn't exist, and opera would be as popular R'n'B and indie.

I am leaving the main point of this article far behind, however. Do go and see the production, it's bound to be amazing. The director is wonderful, and the opera won much praise from critics who know about opera the first time around. It'll be worth it. Really.

ALAN DAVIES - LIVE

The Duchess Theatre

Ithough Alan Davies' West End Tour for 1998, "Urban Trauma" sold out on the first night, his PR people guaranteed that he would be back in the future. The man has travelled around, which you can tell from the theme that pervades his comedy routine. The small, yet packed, theatre held an audience that seemed to expect this; many of them appeared to anticipate his jokes and shouted out one liners in the middle of the performance in an attempt to interact with him. After a while, some of the audience became irritating, but, with some effort, could be ignored. Davies himself was confident behind the microphone, although he constantly paused to take mental breathers by repeating earlier-introduced sound effects and performing silly dance routines across the stage.

The crowd came prepared to laugh, and did so after every joke (or attempted joke), even when the comedian's remarks weren't particularly funny. As seems to be common with many stand-up comedians, Davies focused on a particular topic and then continuely lapsed off into tangent after tangent, only to return to his original topics suddenly, sometimes much later in the performance. This forced me to stay focused on Davies' words at the risk of becom-

ing completely lost. Most of his routine consisted of pointing out the little-noticed ironies that occur in every aspect of normal, everyday life. From the Olympics to mad cow disease to the potential evil plots of household cats and to the genetic engineering of a mouse with a human ear, Davies attempts to make us step back for a moment to ask, "Why are we doing this?" He points out the ironies that we think about every day, but never actually take the time to concentrate on or wonder about what could be going on behind the scenes. Davies' world is one of conspirators and skeptics, and he does a good job of pointing out

that we are all one of the two.

So if you are a fan of comedy, and are in the mood for a relaxing night out, find out where Alan Davies is performing. Try to be in a somewhat focused mood, as his string of jokes are often hard to follow, especially since he usually just jumps into new topics without introducing them. Watching Davies is definitely two hours well spent, but if you ask whether or not he's worth the hefty price tag of a West End performance, my answer, 'perhaps not." It would probably be just as good to watch him on television or video.

rying to put the words eighties, relevant and good in the same review is difficult, but trying to make them work on a stage takes something a little bit more special. Milling around her are the, maybe slightly overdone. characters of her moralistic PA, slimy and loathsome 'soon to be' boss, nerdish accountant, and her "trippin' an' ravin' all nigh'" toy boy (a truly wonderful portrayal of men in their most annoying state). They muddle around her, complimenting and flattering her before she heads off to court, and by the end of the first act we've been led pleasantly to the conclusion of the case, with moments of amusement and absurdity.

I have to admit that during the interval I wondered where the plot might be going, as it certainly didn't

look too promising, and the characters all seemed to be a little to much at that point. However, any doubts I may have had were dispelled early in the second half as the script, actors and play took on a whole new path. It twisted, turned, delighted and enthralled at such a pace there were times when it was hard to get a breath in between laughing. Wonderful Ben Elton, and full justice done to it

Although this is the smallest of the venues they have been to (having performed already in Bristol, Edinburgh and Dublin) the limited space presented no problems to the actors as they filled the theatre with their lively and charismatic personalities and bought home the excesses of life in the era. It has to be said that Charlotte

Franklin who not only played Doris, but also helped to produce the play obviously managed to juggle the two roles extremely well.

In a venue that should appeal to students in so many ways (it's above a good pub, it's on bus routes from college, there's concession tickets available as well as tickets which include dinner) and with such a well known playwright, it should make going to see this performance even more enjoyable. If you don't like Ben Elton you might find you enjoy this, if you do like Ben Elton I think you'll love it.

RESIDENT EVIL 2

CARAGO PlayStation

Possibly the scariest game I have ever played, Resident Evil was a huge hit when first released and even managed to sell 400,000 copies of its 'Directors Cut' release. A 'survival horror' game featuring shuffling zombies, killer mutant plants and appaling dialogue, it was clearly influenced by classic horror flicks such as Day of the Dead.

Well, the zombies are back and this time they have invaded Raccoon City. The seguel features a more mature plot, far improved

dialogue, even better scenery and mercifully shorter loading times. The game is already fast heading towards being the best selling videogame in history. Over 1.8 million copies were sold on the fist weekend of its release in Japan, and 650,000 were shifted in the US upon release. Virgin Interactive confidently predict that 250.000 copies of the game will be finding their way into UK homes when it finally ships on 29th March. We hope that the excellent TV advert, filmed by classic horror director George A. Romero makes it across the pond too.

3D HARDWARE

Let's face it, the only way to play today's 3D games is with the funky hardware accelerators available. Here are some of the new chipsets on the way...

3DFX VOODOO 2

The Voodoo looks like it will be the best board available, with two texture processors and 2Mb of memory each. Add another 2Mb of video memory and its quite a package. The downside is that it will probably be in the most expensive cards.

NEC POWERVR 2

Much improved from the original board, PowerVR's key features include full-scene anti-aliasing Texture (smoothing) and Compression, meaning higher quality graphics all round. Its likely that these boards should be a bit cheaper than 3Dfx-based systems.

INTEL 740

Intel, not happy with its domination in motherboards alone, is entering the 3D market with this impressive mid-end chipset. The 740 will only work with Pentium II systems and should handle 200-800 thousand polygons a second (significantly less than 3Dfx and NEC). However, this card should represent very good value for money and will probably find its way into motherboards, making it the standard for 3D graphics.

GAMING NEWS

PlayStation owners who wish to revel in the 70's Mad Max-styled fun that is Interstate '76 may be in for a shock. Bizarrely, the game has be re-titled Vigilante 8 and seems to has lost its 70's groove. Car-based combat and mayhem seem assured, however, so all is not lost it seems.

PC flight simulators seem to have run out of planes to showcase, to the point that F-22 Raptor centres around a plane that's only barely in production, and won't be in general use until the next century. Regrettably, the game has no support for hardware accelerated 3D. so those of us without the latest Pentiums could feel let down.

Speaking of which, as if 333Hz wasn't fast enough, Intel has announced that it plans to have 450-500Hz Pentium IIs shipping within the next 5 months. Given the size of the heatsinks on the current chips, one wonders if an integrated processor & central heating system is also in the pipeline...

Quake 2 multi-player addicts will be retreating to their bedrooms once more with the release of Quake 2 CTF - 'Capture The Flag' levels. Those who were disappointed with the standard game's multi-player levels should seize the new challenge eagerly.

Nintendo 64 owners will finally be getting a fighting game to write home about in Fighters Destiny. Featuring a novel points system rather than the more usual "batter opponent until they fall over" fare, Fighters should provide a welcome change from the cutesey game normally available on Nintendo's software-starved console.






