

Students to Decide Future in NUS

Imperial College students will vote in a referendum to decide whether Imperial should join the National Union of Students, after Union Council narrowly voted last Tuesday to put the question to the student body.

Under the Union Constitution, referenda must be held within thirty College days of this decision being taken, meaning that a vote on the issue will be held on or before 19 March.

Speaking at the meeting, Union President Sen Ganesh argued that as six years had passed since the last such referendum, "a whole generation of students has not had the opportunity to vote on the affiliation to the National Union of Students," and that he wanted to give the students this opportunity to "have a say in what the Union does."

The decision to hold a referendum met some opposition, led by Natasha Newton, a former Union President. Ms Newton argued that similar polls at other universities had "torn the student body apart," and that such referenda "really stuff up a student union."

She went on to argue that it would be an unwise move to hold a referendum at a time so close to exams and elections for Sabbatical officers, as many students would pay more attention to the vote than to revising.

There was also dismay at the decision from Medic students, as it became clear that the referendum would fall outside of their term time, meaning that a large section of the student population would be excluded from the vote.

The most obvious benefit of NUS affiliation is the discounts offered to NUS cardholders by many shops, though many local outlets also accept the ICU card. Affiliation may also give Imperial students more representative power, as it would be part of a larger, national body of students. It would also allow ICU members access to more welfare support, which could potentially offset the loss of the backing of the University of London Union if the College's application to award its own degree-awarding powers is successful.

However, financing the £56,000 annual

cost of membership would probably divert money away from Union clubs and societies. Prices in the Union bars may also rise, as the bars would be forced to use suppliers endorsed by the NUS rather than its own, cheaper providers. A spokesman for the bar at the University of London Union, which uses NUS suppliers, told Felix that Grolsch is sold there for £2 a pint, whereas it currently costs £1.85 at the Union.

The political nature of the NUS is also a major problem, as all member unions must declare some kind of political affiliation. This is certain to conflict with the apolitical stance of ICU.

The impending referendum is likely to bring a new dimension to the Union elections later this month, raising the possibility that candidates may take up a position when campaigning for Sabbatical positions.



This letter was received from Tasha Newton on Wednesday evening, and due to print deadlines, was too late to go in the letters page. However, since it is very relevant to this week's issues, I have included it here. Alongside it is my editorial, to balance the tone of this page.

'Watch out Sen we're going to sack you'

Sometimes Union meetings can be stuffed full of jargon that makes regular students feel outsiders. But last night, when a council member officially warned the President of ICU that he was facing a motion of censure, anyone could have understood that Sen's job is very much on the line.

As a final year who hopes to leave IC in June, you would have thought that I would have simply sat back and laughed at last night's farce of a meeting. But sadly as a misguided former Sabbatical, I care about what happens to ICU, its staff and students. I am especially worried that only the Sabbs' view on what happened will appear in Felix, so here's an alternative interpretation of what went on.

Council was first asked to consider a motion on whether ICU should have a referendum on joining the NUS. I'm sure that that news will be covered in great detail in Felix. There were two sides to the debate, those who felt it's time you, the students decide rather than Council deciding on your behalf and those who felt that a referendum would dominate the forthcoming elections and exam period, be a waste of money and probably fall flat due to lack of votes. (It needs more than 1.5 times the number of people who normally turn out for elections!) In the end even Council wasn't that convinced, only just over half thought it was a good idea and the meeting was inquorate anyway. (Sorry, in other words not even half of Council was there, which means only a quarter of Council thought it was good.) The real question is, why would Sen want to do this to us? Could it be that he worries that he'll be finishing soon and won't have done anything, that we won't remember him? Or is he looking for an advantage in the up-coming election?

After this really bad decision there was an amusing turn of events as the President came under fire for going to Felix with issues before Council, for giving up his duty as returning officer (ah, yes, you see he does want to stand again, heavens!) and lots of other things I can't even remember. Then he was told that he should realise that people are considering sacking him. They weren't joking, seriously, people were asking me after the meeting if I'd sign up. Well Sen, I think they're going to remember you now, mate! Just when the whole thing couldn't get any more bizarre one of the members challenged the number of people at the meeting, quorum, there weren't enough people so that was it, game over

Now I can't really comment on whether Sen should get the sack or not (although I can tell you that people normally have to be really, really bad for it even to be suggested) because I've been out the country for three months and simply don't know. And now... my reply:

While Tasha's concerns should be considered, her own motives for writing this letter should be questioned. She is a very vocal opponent to affiliation with the NUS, and was seen in council to argue against affiliation very emotionally.

She seems to be under the impression that Felix is written by the Union, and this is possibly because the relationship between Felix and the Union this year is significantly better than that of her tenure as Union President. This does not, how-

ever, mean that Felix is a vehicle for Union propaganda, but, in my opinion, this does help to ensure that many of the news stories are more accurate than they have been in the past, since the Sabbatical officers are more willing to talk to, and give quotes to Felix.

Interestingly, the Council in question was quorate (did have the minimum number of people present), and was only declared otherwise as a mistake by Council Chair Sam Sharpe. Additionally, Mr Sharpe has now resigned from this

post for academic reasons, which means for the time being, Sen Ganesh is Council Chair. Conspiracy, perhaps?

Tasha also seems to think that Sen having more knowledge than other candidates is an 'unfair advantage' when it comes to elections. Sorry? Surely if someone has more knowledge, they're a better candidate: that's what two year sabbaticals are for. So you don't have to teach them everything again. And Sen clearly doesn't control Council, so his impartiality is not an issue.

Finally, Sen was warned with censure, meaning someone was warning that they were considering the first step to getting a bit cross with him. This was because he had, apparently, told Felix about the fifth sabbatical before Council. Which he hadn't. Felix discovered that from an independent source, and merely asked Sen for a quote. 

Throbbing Elections

Don't leave it to everyone else!

With election season fast approaching, and nomination papers up for the sabbatical posts at both Imperial College Union and ULU, I thought I would write a few words about the whole election business, from a club and society perspective. You should also be aware that your club or society's AGM must be held this term, but more about that later.

So, the sabbatical elections, what's the big deal? Well, it sounds obvious, but you get the chance to choose who you want to run the show next year. For club and society members, the results could have a significant bearing on how easy, or difficult, your lives become next year. This applies not only for the DP(C&S), but for all four Sabbatical Officers. Perhaps you'll hit problems or you just need assistance or support in trying out something new; the attitude of the Sabbaticals may determine whether you get the kind of help you need or the opportunity to go ahead with your plans.

Thinking more globally, the ULU Sabbaticals will set the direction of London-wide campaigns to shape your lives as students in the capital, examples being the LT Travelcards and student finance. So, in both cases, find out about the candidates, ask questions, raise interest among your friends and fellow club and society members and, most importantly, cast your vote!

On a smaller scale, each club and society will be electing its officers for the following year at its Annual General Meeting. This is a great opportunity to get more involved, give something back to your contemporaries, and gain valuable experience in a whole host of tasks. It would be all too easy to leave it to everyone else to stand for the posts on your club committee; remember, if everyone did that, there would be no club next year. So, take the initiative and go for it; even if someone else is standing for the post you want, don't let that put you off, the members of your club deserve the

opportunity to choose the best candidate.

If you've already been on your club's committee, perhaps you'd like to take it a stage further and help run all the clubs in your CSC. You could go for Athletics Clubs Committee Chair, Overseas Students Committee Secretary, Arts and Entertainments Board Treasurer, to name but three posts. Any student is able to stand for any post on a CSC Executive, you don't have to have experience running a club, but it helps. These posts are more demanding, but you get the satisfaction of helping a broader range of people, and the knowledge that comes from working more closely with experienced Union staff, as well as the Sabbatical Officers. Without dedicated individuals putting themselves forward for these positions, the Union quite simply could not operate as it does. So give it a go, put your heart into it, and the rewards will be yours at the end.

coincides with the "march of the living" through the concentration camp at Auschwitz.



and Rwanda.


By preserving their memory, we are ensuring that in some small way their deaths were not in vain and hope such terrible crimes will never be repeated.

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





Chaplaincy

HIV and AIDS affects us all.

When AIDS first emerged as a disease over twenty years ago, few people could have predicted how the epidemic would evolve, and fewer still could have described with any certainty the best ways of combating it. Now in the year 2002, it is known from experience that AIDS can devastate whole regions, knock decades off national development, widen the gulf between rich and poor nations and push already-stigmatised groups closer to the margins of socie-

Already, 21.8 million people around the world have died of AIDS, 4.3 million of them children by the end of 2000. Nearly twice that many - 40 million - are now living with HIV, the virus that causes AIDS, and most of these are

likely to die over the next decade or so. The most recent UNAIDS/WHO estimates show that, in 2001 alone, 5 million people were newly infected with HIV.

Michael Sean Paterson in his book 'Singing for our lives' writes:

"Tell me it's not true ...

- That AIDS provokes feelings of fear, ignorance, disgust, hostility, rejection, marginalisation and prejudice
- That AIDS strikes at the vulnerable the African peoples. gay men, intravenous drug users, commercial sex workers, haemophiliacs
- That those who live with AIDS personally embody the rejection of society hungry for a scapegoat
- That people with AIDS carry the can for all that society cannot face to."

Sadly we cannot say that it is not true, because we know full well that it is true!

Sebi died last year from AIDS. He was 9 years old. Sebi was born in Romania and infected when he received a 'blood tonic' soon after his birth. His parents could not cope so they placed him in an orphanage.

Johnathon also died last year. He was 45 and one of the first to be diagnosed with the virus in this country.

Sadly some in the Church still condemn those who have the HIV or AIDS virus. They condemn people for the lifestyle that they live. But for many Christian people this is not the response that we would give. So what should our response be? Paterson gives some responses from people with the virus:

- We are living with Aids, not dying of Aids
 - · Don't judge, but accept us
- Don't classify us into two groups - the 'poor innocents' and those who brought HIV on themselves.
- Don't be frightened of us. We won't infect you.
- Don't love me for Christ's sake. Love me for my sake.
- We are looking for God too, but not necessarily in the places where the Church has hidden him.



The card system was getting rather difficult to manage, so in 1995 a member donated a pc to run a database and this sturdy little 386 ran the system until 1999. In 1996 the library obtained a television and video player and there were regular crowds of people squashed in the cramped space between pipes watching the increasing number of society videos.

After a hard fought campaign the society obtained a new room, located almost directly underneath Beit Quad arch. After several weeks of cleaning, painting, decorating and moving over 3000 books down the corridor, icsf became established in its new library (a room which is now the Beit Hall laundry). The library was huge and was quickly furnished with things acquired from various skips around college. However with the start of the Beit renovations we were once again on the move to a location dubbed by the sabbaticals at the time as "the icsf portacabin experience". In October 1999 the society reluctantly moved venue from its luxurious underground cavern to an upper portacabin behind the main library which was about half the size of our previous one. It was generally pretty crowded in there, although at least when there were lots of people in there, it wasn't quite so cold!

The delays of the Beit project meant that we were in the portacabin for twice as long as originally planned, but the wait was well worth it. Last year we moved into our beautiful new home in the Union West Basement Media Centre. We could finally spread out all the library contents. At the moment the library contains 4460 books, 113 graphic novels, 447 videos, and 36 audio items. All of these items can be borrowed by society members and we show a video every lunchtime for members to sit, watch, debate and make jokes about.

Picocon 19 - February 9th

Our major event almost every year since 1984 has been our one day convention - Picocon. The first Picocon came to be when a group of society members invited a few friends, including a couple of authors to the union bar for a day of discussion and drinking. The event was called Picocon as a rival university held two day conventions called Microcon, so as ours was even smaller we decided on Picocon. We now also hold femtocons for Freshers that only last an afternoon - see, our sense of humour is still as good as ever.



Over the years Picocons have grown, they now take over the entire union building and attract more than 100 guests. Over the years we've had such renowned authors as Stephen Baxter, Terry Pratchett and Iain (M) Banks. Other events include debates, quizzes, panels and film showings in the icu cinema.

This year is no exception: Picocon 19 will be coming to the Union building from 10am on Saturday February 9th and we will be joined by four special guests:

Anne Gay - author of several fantasy books including *Mindsail* and *Dancing on the Volcano* and also edits LineOne's Science Fiction and Fantasy Club.

China Miéville - The winner of this year's Arthur C. Clarke award for his novel *Perdido Street Station* and has also written *King Rat* and *The Scar*.

Stan Nicholls - has done a wide range of jobs in the genre, including managing a SF&F book and memorabilia shop, journalism, teaching and writing fiction and biographies.

Geoff Ryman is a past winner of the Clarke and many other awards for his novels. He has also created an internet book - 253 <www.ryman-novel.com>, about the people on a tube journey.

Other events of the day will include our famous (or is that infamous?) destruction of dodgy merchandise during which we auction tacky items to be destroyed in entertaining ways by the highest bidder (all money to RAG). There will also be booksellers, a LAN network, Dalek racing and even a Killer tournament running throughout the day. To round it all off there will be a showing of Pitch Black in the icu cinema which everyone can come along to. The day kicks off with registration at 10am and finishes with the film at 6pm. All of this will only cost you £5 if you're a current student, £2 if you're already and member of icsf, or £8 if you are neither. Oh, and there will be a piece of birthday cake for every attendee. What more could anyone want from a sci-fi convention?

This week's film section features an interview with the man who has the task of bringing the story of the Greatest to screen...

Will Smith

Willard Smith was born on the 25th September 1968, the second of Caroline and Willard Smith Sr.'s four children. His father was the owner of a refrigeration company and he grew up in middle-class West Philadelphia where he got the nickname 'Prince' (because of the way he would charm his way out of trouble).

Years later in 1989 and after embarking on a showbiz career, Will Smith starred in the NBC sitcom based on his early life. In The Fresh Prince of Bel-Air, Smith played himself, a street-wise teenager transplanted into the heart of Beverly Hills. The series lasted six years and set him on the road to super-stardom.

His first movie was Six Degrees of Separation (1993), followed by the successful action picture, Bad Boys (1995). The Smash-hit Independence Day (1996) secured his position as one of Hollywood's highest earners. Since then he has made a sequence of often dubious, but invariably successful movies, including Men In Black (1997) and Wild Wild West (1999).

He is currently working on Men In Black 2 (2002). In the meantime, audiences around Britain are waiting in keen anticipation to see his performance in Michael Mann's, Ali. But will Will do justice to the legend behind the story?

In this interview Will Smith talks about the rigorous training schedule required for playing the part, his views on Ali, boxing, being punched, and his prediction on the Lewis versus Tyson match.

How tough was it to get to the Ali standard of fitness?

Essentially, we trained for twelve months. I had a little sneaky month before that where I crept out by myself to try to get into some sort of shape. Little bits so Michael Mann would think that I was already in good shape.

So probably twelve or thirteen months of training and essentially we would run at six for three to five miles in the morning, depending on the day, and we would go into the boxing gym from 10.30 am to 1.00pm. Technical boxing training, jumping ropes, sparring, and then in the evening we would go into the weight room for physical weight training. So that was five or six days a week for a year, so your body would definitely come into shape with that kind of regime.

Did the pain of being punched ever deter you from taking the part?

Yeah! That's the first thing! There's a really strange primal thing that happens when you get punched. When you get hit there's a blue flash and you start trying to remember where your car is! Where did I put my keys? As soon as this buzzing goes out of my ears, I'm outta here! But when you get hit and you get knocked down and you stand up, there's a really animalistic thing that happens inside of you that either destroys or reaffirms your manhood.

The first time Michael Bentt (who plays Sonny Liston) hit me, he hit me really clean. I didn't have much time to move so I put my chin down and he hit me right on the top of my head. But it didn't flip my head back. It sort of compressed down onto my neck and I felt an electrical shock from the base of my neck down to the back of both of my elbows. I remember thinking 'Damn that Michael Mann!' But it felt like a rite of passage to the commitment that we had all made to telling Muhammad Ali's story; so it almost felt like I was worthy now after getting hit, to be in the ring with all the champions. We didn't use any actors; we only used professional fighters so that sort of confirmed my worthiness, in my mind at least.

When you were a young man Muhammad Ali had already ended his fighting career, but was he still an icon for you?

That was what was really important to me about telling this story. I'm thirty-three years old so I was born September 25th 1968, so by the time I was paying attention to fights, Muhammad Ali had already finished fighting.

By that time, he had obtained icon status so I knew that Muhammad Ali was an icon. I knew he was a fighter and I knew he was important, but I didn't know why. That was part of what inspired me to want to tell this story because anyone that is younger than me has no idea what Muhammad Ali had to endure in his life. They just know that their parents love Muhammad Ali and everyone claps when he is on television or when he walks into the room. So I really was inspired to tell this story, however terrified I was!

I can understand the intimidation of taking the part. Did it make you think 'mmm, perhaps not me'?

I felt physically perfect to tell the Muhammad Ali story. I felt that I could put the weight on, and that I could look like him. I felt that I could physically become Muhammad Ali, and I felt spiritually akin to his transformation from being at a stage where he believed in God, through to being a man who elevated himself to an individual one-on-one relationship with God. So I can relate to that transformation very well. I can relate to that spiritual space and I have always felt similar to Muhammad Ali in the simplicity of his spiritual beliefs.

At the same time I was terrified by the prospect of being the guy that messed up the Muhammad Ali story. They would say 'Independence Day', that was good! 'Men in Black', that was cool! But he's the dude that messed up the Muhammad Ali story!' So, I was terrified by that prospect, until I met Michael Mann. And he really got the ball rolling in terms of what I had to do to be Mohammed Ali. He gave me the belief that it was possible for that transformation to occur.

Was there a particular moment when you felt you had become Ali? When you felt you had made it?


You know there were moments that information created an epiphany. I don't specifically remember a moment where I said 'I got it. I'm Ali'. I don't remember that moment. It was such a gradual process for me. I remember Michael called in a guy called Jeronimo, formerly Jeronimo Pratt, of the Black Panthers. Michael had called him in to give me a sense of the era, because that was what was really difficult for me. The comprehension of the sixties is so foreign to me. I'm a child of rap music, cars, and women so I just cannot relate to the social upheaval of the sixties and Jeronimo said that war had been declared on Black America. Fire hoses, dogs, domestic terrorism, the bombing of the church in Birmingham, Alabama. He said war had been declared and when he said that, I just felt a wave of understanding. Of course, Muhammad Ali had not gone to Vietnam to fight a war, when in his mind, he's fighting a war right here at home, and if he goes ten thousand miles away, women and children aren't safe here in America. One war at a time. And with that point of view, I started to feel the dominoes beginning to tumble towards becoming Muhammad Ali and understanding the necessity for that point of view. The necessity for this hero during that era.

There was a negative sense out there that the Fresh Prince of Bel Air was playing the king of the boxing world. Seeing that it would take two year's of your life to become this man, did it take you a long time to make that choice?

Well, I turned the script down for years. Probably for six years. I think I was probably twenty-seven the first time an Ali script was presented to me. I just turned it down for years and years. Even I couldn't see the road from Will Smith, Fresh Prince of Bel Air, to Muhammad Ali. Someone said 'you have to become Muhammad Ali'. What do you do to become Muhammad Ali?

Michael Mann was the first person who illustrated what he called a 'course syllabus' for becoming Muhammad Ali. He said, 'I will create the curriculum that will create Muhammad Ali inside of you'. I was like 'alright, cool!' I didn't know what it was! He said that there would be essentially a three-tiered course syllabus. The first tier would be physical. He said we are going to run the way Muhammad Ali ran in the cities on the routes that he ran. We are going to eat the food that Muhammad Ali ate. We are going to spar the way he sparred. We are going to go get Angelo Dundee and train the way Muhammad Ali trained. And by we, he meant me! He said that creating the physical life and the physical burden of Muhammad Ali would take us to the second tier, the mental and emotional development of Muhammad Ali. And he said by understanding what it feels like to be in a ring, and when that bell rings, and knowing that there's an animal on the other side of that ring that wants nothing more than to tear your head off, by being in that physical space you will understand the mental and emotional stress that Muhammad Ali lived with on a daily basis.

This would naturally carry us to the third tier which would be the spiritual development. From understanding the physical, mental, and emotional, he said that I would understand the necessity for the spiritual convictions that Muhammad Ali had developed during the period that we were shooting in the film.



What about Ali's vocal mannerisms?

We worked with a dialect coach. It was the same 'course syllabus' that Michael Mann laid out just after the physical. We found that Ali had a big, wide open chest and that's what gave him a big resonant voice, but he also really constricted his throat which gave him almost a higher pitched sound. Then we traced essentially the flavour of his dialect to seven Baptist preachers. So we studied a few Baptist preachers. You know how he'll get really low and speak really low and getting really dramatic, and then he takes it up high. So the voice is really that very holy Baptist preacher trying to impart the holy ghost.

What is your view about boxing as a sport?

I think in America, with boxing in the early 20s, 30s and 40s, the boxing ring was the only place where is was fair. For Jack Johnson, for Joe Louis, for Muhammad Ali, the boxing ring represented the only place that racism didn't matter. Because when Johnson hits you with that right hand, no matter how racist you are, you're asleep! So it represented a place where it was man to man, it was one on one, and there was no perceivable way to cheat. So I think that's a large part of the reason why people tend to gravitate towards the boxing match as a true test of man to man. There is no room for the referee to fly a flag; you can't get a red card! There's none of that, it's one to one, man on man. Or woman to woman! Absolutely!

Did any of Ali's mannerisms stay with you after the shoot?

Yes, the pure appreciation of beautiful women. That has stayed with me. The mementos also, I kept everything. All of the clothes, all of the gloves, everything. I knew from day one that this would be a journey that I would remember for the rest of my life. When we got into Africa, we had the opportunity to sit with Nelson Mandela and at every turn in making this film I just had new experiences and was being enlightened. I was keeping everything that I could get my hands on.

What chance has Mike Tyson got against Lennox Lewis?

That's a tough one. That's real tough. If Mike trains, he's hard to beat. But I think Lennox Lewis is a heavy enough puncher and a cautious enough fighter to potentially beat Mike cause he's jab, jab, right hand and will tire him out. I think if he gets past the third round he will be a really great champ.

Out now on Virgin records

There's been a fair bit of hype about this band. Judging from the photos on the inlay, this is probably due to their live act - lots of thrashy guitars, with dry ice billowing melodramatically in the intense lighting - and not much to do with their music. Or maybe pensive, moody male trios with unkempt hair are now back.

They namecheck the Dandy Warhols on the inlay and go in a similar musical direction, but without the humour or the flair.

A sample of the tracks is illustrative. On Love Burns, the lyric "Now she's gone, her love burns inside me" repeats to three-chord riffs, sounding like a bunch of teenagers practising after school. Whatever Happened To My Rock 'n' Roll [Punk Song] delivers what it promises, though rather unimaginatively. White Palms rolls out a dreary, deliberately muffled bassline, whilst an even drearier vocal moans over the top.

The attempt to spice it up with jangly, muffled Madchester guitars and keyboards only adds to the misery. Rifles is a good attempt at something genuinely moody - multiple repeating voices layered like canta Gregoriana are entwined with threatening basslines reminiscent of the Jesus and Mary Chain. After 90 seconds though, it suddenly reverts to pop-rock with indie vocals. The dark mood of the intro occasionally reprises, but the dumb indie vocals and post-Oasis guitars ruin the track.

The album ends with a couple of tracks that try to sound like Primal Scream but end up sounding like Celine Dion with a sore throat. Dull and disappointing.





Cooper Temple Clause
See This Through And Leave

Out this Monday on Morning records

The Cooper Temple Clause are a band with passion and integrity. That was the first impression I got when listening to the London live favourites' debut album See This Through And Leave.

They don't waste time in getting started, with the omnipresent, minimalist, futuristic arrangements of *Did You Miss Me?* focusing my attention firmly on the music. The guitar-riffed rock 'n' roll opening of current single *Film Maker* takes me completely by surprise, since it could hardly be more different from the first track. It's sleaze-rock, with a hint of glam, done in the best possible way. *Panzer Attack* carries on in a similar vein, with older punk influences (Buzzcocks, The Clash) coming through.

Lush orchestral backing features on the bluesy Who Needs Enemies?, which is one of the highlights of the album. Amber is both haunting and lyrically blessed, displaying the band's emotional side. This is continued on the simplistic Radiohead-inspired track Digital Observations, which demonstrates that the band can be experimental without being irritating.

The recent single Let's Kill Music comes through with its '60s-style brilliance, its chanting attempting to "kill" soulless, manufactured pop through pure repetition. Even a weather report makes an entrance - is there anything this band can't do?

The creeping *The Lake* and the atmospherically excellent *Murder Song* serve to close the proceedings effectively. I'm close to crying now, the album is that good! Go out and buy it!

One of the hip-hop intellectual elite Ludacris is not. The main subjects "discussed" on *Word Of Mouf* are hoes and the all-important life of a gangsta. But unlike many other rappers, Ludacris has fortunately picked up a bit of a comic streak, and some of the best moments of this album are the comedic skits.

Although hip-hop snobs may dismiss the subject matter of *Word Of Mouf*, one cannot ignore the production quality. Timbaland and Organized Noise (the team behind Outkast classics such as *Wheelz Of Steel*) produce the best tracks, like *Area Codes* and *Cold Outside*.

Ludacris is a self-proclaimed "ass valedictorian" and "abominable ho-man", and the tracks where he lets his freaky comedic side run wild are up there with any Redman track.

It is when he starts the gun-toting gangsta routine that the album falls apart, and Ludacris turns into a generic No Limit or Cash Money clone. He has the potential to become hip-hop's superfreak genius, and should follow his own advice on *Area Codes* and "put the .44 away".





Kicking off this evening's proceedings were the relatively eclectic **Seafood**. Giving us a selection of offerings to show the unacquainted audience precisely what solid matter they're made of, they started big and ended big, just like a band should (and gained top points for effective use of a starcloth!). The highlights of the set were their dynamic recent single *Splinter* and two very short cover versions - a couple of chords from Ash's *Shining Light* and the first verse of Jimmy Eat World's *Bleed American* (a short intermission while they tried to recover their bassist from the wings). A very classy and original idea from a band that just didn't want to leave the stage.



They're not crazy 'cause they take the right pills every day, they bleed Americans and they sweat salt and sugar. They are, of course, the amazing **Jimmy Eat World**.

Jimmy Eat World began the evening with the highly successful *Bleed American* (although whether this could top the totally unexpected Seafood version is doubtful). The crowd were excitable to say the least - at times, the number of crowdsurfers almost exceeded the number of people with their feet on the floor. The band had astounding stage presence and drive, and interestingly, they introduced a guest keyboardist/vocalist after the first couple of songs.

The sheer energy of some of JEW's heavier tracks was nicely contrasted by their mellower, more melodic emo side. Tracks like If You Don't, Don't proved that the band are not only capable of producing large amounts of noise, but also of moving adult and child alike. To our surprise, they left the stage before playing new single The Middle. Luckily for us, they came back and thrashed it out of their quitars with proper vigour and style.

The thing about Jimmy Eat World that confuses us is how they managed to release four albums before anyone had even heard of them. But the reason why they became so popular so quickly is obvious - emo-core never had it so good.



Their first single *Sick/Happy* closes the set and has the place in a frenzy again. Will claims that this is what he wanted to do all along. Is it, or is he just moving with fashion? Who cares, because this is incredible stuff. 2002 will be their year, mark my words.

Paris:Capital of the Arts 1900-68 Royal Academy of Arts

For most of the 20th century Paris' beauty, romantic spirit, liberality (and low cost living too!) have made it the world's capital of arts, attracting artists form all over the world: Picasso and Dalí from Spain, Chagall and Kandinsky from Russia, Modigliani from Italy, Foujita from Japan and Kelly from the USA are a representative sample.

From the World Fair of 1900 to the student street riots in 1968 the exhibition guides the spectator through the masterpieces of the artists, and at the same time it highlights the social and political context in which they were developed. Four main sections correspond to the four districts of Paris that constituted the centre of intellectual activities: Montmartre with its rural character, its cabarets and nightclubs from 1900-18; Montparnasse with a sophisticated taste for cafés, Jazz and an international artistic elite from 1919-39; Saint-Germain-des-Prés as a shelter during the Nazi occupation and later as the cradle of existentialism (1940-57); finally The Latin Quarter with the politic turbulence of the European 60s, culminating with the 1968 student rebellions.

It's hard to choose the most representative works out of a set of almost 300, all of the highest quality. Worth mentioning are surely the studies for "Les Damoiselles d'Avignon" by Picasso, opening the way to Cubism, and the nudes of the Ecole de Paris for the first section. Avant-garde, Dadaism and Surrealism constitute the Montparnasse section, where Mondrian, Duchamp and Dalí are the flag bearers. During and after the German occupation is evident a radical shift in the themes and techniques employed, and the visual arts undergo the transformation through the metamorphosis of the sixties, to the contemporary way of interpreting art and the artist. Finally the 60s, characterised by political engagement and torn between philo-american Nouveau Réalisme and the left wing sympathising Narrative Figuration movement.

To our opinion the value of the exhibition lies, apart from the impressive collection of art, also in a coherent exposition that allows to travel through time and follow the evolution of arts in their own very centre, that constitutes in a certain way the ultimate masterpiece: Paris is the real focus, the "prima-Donna".

Klee:The Nature of Creation Hayward Gallery

With a grandiose title like "The Nature of Creation" our expectations of this exhibition were high, and if the queue was anything to go by we weren't the only excited ones. The Hayward Gallery has become a temporary home to about one hundred of Paul Klee's works created between 1914 and 1940. The exhibition has met with mixed reviews so feeling all important with our press tickets in hand we stepped out of the drizzle and waved goodbye to the soggy queue to give our, ahem, definitive verdict.

Paul Klee is often heralded as one of the great painters of the last century and a fore-father of abstraction. The exhibition was joint-curated by Bridget Riley and this is reflected in the choice of works. Lots of the pieces have a hypnotic quality and the selection reflects Klee's analytic skill.


Klee's most famous works are probably the early "Square Paintings". The vivid geometric paintings reflect Klee's passion for colour. As he explained "To paint well is simply this: to put the right colour in the right place". The influence of his time in Africa is prominent in these works. The colours are a response to the light at dawn and at dusk. Curves reminiscent of North African architecture are contrasted with rectangles and squares.

As the title suggests the exhibition focuses on the process of creation. "The Narrative Line" section focuses on Klee's uses of lines and simple geometric shapes to create dynamic and organic images. The pictures have a form that is free from the rhythm of the shapes that they are constructed from. A highlight of the exhibition was being able to explore the development of this new form of abstraction.

In 1935 Klee contracted scleroderma a disease that reduced his mobility. The delicate construction of images using hundreds of repeating shapes is replaced by sparse symbolic shapes and coarse lines.

The exhibition is a lively display of Klee's talents and also a chance to study the methods of one of the great abstractionists of the last century. The Nature of Abstraction is at the Hayward Gallery SE1 until April 1 and costs students £6.
