Day Security Threatened

College Security staff have been facing increasing job uncertainty over the holidays due to a drive to get more staff on the beat.

Felix has been keeping an eye on the situation since it was first announced that provision of day guards' would stop on the 1st October of this year. The day guards man the security lodges in departments, as well as in Southside and the familiar lodge in Beit Quad where access to club and society facilities is managed. They also take care of departmental post.

In a memo sent during July by Keith Reynolds, Head of Security, Post and Fire services, it was announced that the sixteen day guard posts would be replaced with sixteen patrolling posts, in order to provide "effective patrol and response duties". These new patrolling posts were to have different hours and rates of pay, and while the day guards were eligible to apply for the new positions, there was no guarantee that their jobs were secure. Redundancy was the likely alternative for those guards not given a patrolling job.



Day guards not the only officers to disappear?

On 1st August, the situation further escalated when all Security Officers were warned that their terms of employment were to be reviewed. Meanwhile, some of the day guards previously threatened had sought alternative employment

or had even planned to take the improved redundancy package offered to them the previous

The situation changed once again on 9th September when it emerged that Conferences would fund fifteen Campus Receptionist jobs with an additional managerial role – happily matching the sixteen day guard positions that were originally to be lost. With the new employer would come new terms, but Keith Reynolds told *Felix* that they would be "very, very similar" to current hours and pay.

Unfortunately, those planning to leave with the improved redundancy package, either for retirement or other employment, no longer have that option, although some are still planning to leave for health reasons, according to Mr Reynolds.

Every departmental head contacted by *Felix* vehemently refused to comment, but it is clear that there is consternation in College about security arrangements for the future.


NUS by the Back Door

The National Union of Students seems to have crept into Imperial College despite an overwhelming rejection of the NUS by Imperial students last year.

The new Union card for the 2002-03 session is sponsored by Endsleigh Insurance, who are partly owned by the NUS, and bizarrely marketted as the only student insurers recommended by the body. As such, they include the NUS logo on their marketing material and the back of our Union card is no exception.

The result is that, although Imperial College Union is in no way affiliated with the NUS after students voted 72% against joining (probably on the grounds that beer prices may have gone up), our Union card features an NUS online logo.

It is unclear whether stores accepting only NUS cards for discounts will be taken in, but David Francis,



head of the 'Yes' campaign last year, was clearly amused. Imperial Union President Sen Ganesh added that the presence of the offending acronym had been "unexpected" but that the use of the Union cards would go ahead as planned.

Beit Quad Improved?

Beit Quadrangle, the grounds outside the Union building, were refurbished over the holidays, mainly to remove the unsafe surfaces and improve wheelchair access.

The new design leaves the Quad entirely without steps, though much of the original paving was retained and reused. The Quad now has paths around the outside and a single central path from the Quad archway through to the main Union entrance. As reported previously in *Felix*, the aim was for a more Cambridge-like quadrangle feel, but we might have been taking the piss.

There has been some concern among Union drinkers using the tables outside about the 'bonded gravel' which has been used to cover those areas which aren't on the main path, but which are also unsuitable for turfing due to heavy traffic. The gravel is rapidly 'unbonding', creating more of a sandpit effect and problems for those charged with sweeping the



quad of cigarette butts.

Apart from that, it is hoped the new layout will satisfy the Health and Safety Executive who argued that the previous paving was a trip hazard in event of a fire, which might lead to a nighttime stampede of drunk students if it occurred during a large Union event. Despite Union interests, however, the project received only a small amount of funding from the Union for some

additional facilities, the remainder coming from College.

The greatest challenge yet for the new quad will be Freshers Week, which will no doubt see many attempts to destroy it.







My philosophy, Objectivism, holds that:

In a system of full capitalism, there should be (but, historically, has not yet been) a complete separation of state and economics, in the same way and for the same reasons as the separation of state and church.

Want to run the Union?

The Union is run by students for students and every year a groups of officers are elected to govern and manage the Union. There are positions (see below) available for the various bodies that govern the Union.

Ordinary Member of Council

Council is the sovereign and governing body of the Union and exercises all powers of the Union. It is the supreme body of the Union and there are specific positions reserved for First Years and Post-graduates. Council meets once a month during term time.

Ordinary Member of Executive Committee
The Executive Committee is charged with the
general management of the Union, co-ordinating Union affairs and controls Union finances
(an annual turnover of £5m). The Executive
Committee meets approximately once every
two weeks.

Ordinary Member of Trading Committee
As a member of Trading Committee you will be
in charge of the supervision of the trading outlets of the Union, namely Bars, Catering, Ents

and Events with a turnover of £1m. Trading Committee meets once a month during term time.


Ordinary Member of Services Committee
As a member of the Services Committee you
will be charged with the co-ordination of Union
services including Reception, Minibuses and
the Union Advice Service. The committee
meets once a month during term time.

Ordinary Member of Retail Committee
As a member of the Retail Committee you will be responsible for the supervision of the retail outlets of the Union including the shop and newsagent with an annual turnover of £1m. The committee meets once a month during the term time.

Ordinary Member of House Committee
As member of the House Committee you will be charged with the management and usage of the space under the control of the Union and have executive control of a maintenance budget. The House Committee meets twice a term.





Time To Kick ASCAR

If you're sick and tired of watching Formula One, you could well be forgiven for thinking that top line motor racing is interminably boring. That observation is amazingly far from the truth however, because on an industrial estate in Northamptonshire, you can see racing of a sort that will really make your hair stand on end. Imagine going to a circuit where you see cars dicing three wide at 170 miles an hour, where the action is relentless and where mistakes are met by painful and expensive encounter with a concrete wall. Think of a place where bigger is most definitely better and where the noise is almost guaranteed to make your ears bleed.

plenty of manic action from the moment the first wheel turns in anger. Each race is over a fixed distance of 100 miles, with a single qualifying session setting the grid for the first race of the weekend. The finishing order of the first race determines the grid for the second race and so on. At the start, the field is held behind the pace car until the track goes green, and when it does, it unleashes a 60-lap frenzy of panel-bashing, paint-swapping, wall-scraping, high-speed drafting and that genuine rarity in Formula One - overtaking. Mandatory pit stops to take on two fresh tyres add to the spectacle and with only three mechanics allowed over the wall

Anglo-American Stock Car Racing (or ASCAR for short) is a no-holds-barred, high-octane oval racing series loosely based on NASCAR Winston Cup. According to the specialist press, it is a championship that is going places fast, and one that is rapidly increasing in popularity among fans and drivers alike. It is not just a question of flooring the throttle pedal and turning left - there is far more to it than that, and as drivers are willing to testify, ASCAR is more of a way of life, one that is fast becoming very, very addictive.

The ASCAR format guarantees

into the hot pit lane, it always guarantees a certain level of mayhem. Plenty can go wrong during an ASCAR race and invariably does; this is racing where staying out of trouble is an art form and where the opportunist is king.

Underneath the eye-wateringly garish paint jobs, the 500 bhp V8-powered cars are essentially identical (if somewhat agricultural in the technology department), so succeeding in ASCAR depends purely on talent, balls and an astute racing brain. Driving a car at average lap speeds of 155 miles an hour just inches away from a concrete wall is a real test of skill at the



best of times, but doing that in the close company of other cars requires nerves of steel along with a peculiar brand of insanity. It takes a special kind of person to compete here - this is the stomping ground of hard, uncompromis-

ing racers and that is why only the best will ever win at this particular game.


The 2002 entry brings together the very best of UK circuit and oval competition, with a wealth of experience and talent from both sides of the divide. Those putting their considerable reputations on the line include Jason Plato (2001 BTCC champion), Kelvin Burt (2001 GTO sportscar champion and a former British Formula Three champi-

on), John Mickel (2001 ASCAR and World Legends champion) and Rob Speak (2001 World F1 and F2 Stock Car champion). Rally star Colin McRae and sportscar ace Ian McKellar Jr. have also guested in the series alongside the

regulars, which also includes drivers from the US, France and Germany.


The fierce competitiveness and sheer unpredictability of this championship has been characterised by both the spread of results and the intense driver rivalries that have developed as the season has unfolded. Out of the fourteen races run so far this year there have been six different winners driving for a total of five





different teams. Races are closely fought as a whole, but regulars to the series will not easily forget the sight of Jason Plato putting Stevie Hodgson on the grass at over 170 mph or the repeated and frequent clashes between Colin White and Nicolas Minassian. Many of the other drivers and some of the team managers have also added spice to the regular bouts of controversy - particularly in the season-long needle match between the circuit racers and the oval boys

Everything about ASCAR and its support package of Legends and Pick-ups is geared towards the fans, and the whole atmosphere of a race weekend is friendly and welcoming without the bustle and impersonality of a major meeting. In only its first full season of competition, it is still a voyage of discovery for the organisers, technical crew and the teams, but they appear to have the balance right, from the intense and extremely close racing to the approachability of team personnel; drivers are

For the most part, the racing had been hard but fair and with just two races left to run, there are still four drivers capable of winning the championship and taking the Mintex Cup away with them at the end of the year. The battling quartet of Kelvin Burt, Colin White, Nicolas Minassian and Jason Plato are seperated by a paltry 59 points, and with 175 available for a win (not counting bonuses), anything can still happen and most probably will... ASCAR is like that.

more than happy to pose for photos and to sign autographs while mechanics delight in providing fans of all ages with used tyres to take home as souvenirs.

Rockingham Motor Speedway, known by regular racegoers as The Rock, is the spiritual home of ASCAR - built on the site of a former steelworks, it is the UK's newest circuit and only purposebuilt oval. All but four of the Mintex Cup races are contested here, with the remainder being run at the Lausitz Euro

in Germany. Speedway Rockingham is just outside Corby so there is absolutely no excuse in saying its too far away or hard to get to. The facilities are top notch and really puts places like Silverstone and Brands Hatch to shame. The Rock is also the only circuit in the UK where you can watch the racing from the roof of the pits garages - well worth a visit for that alone. Aside from ASCAR, Rockingham also plays host to the only European round of the FedEx CART championship as well as other top-class national race meetings.

both days. If you do decide to go along and see for yourself, you can be sure that the good 'ol boys of ASCAR will put on a show that won't disappoint. Get real - who needs Formula One when you can have racing that's this good?

Gliding

As we neared two thousand feet, I pulled the release, turned hard left and waved good bye to the tow 'plane. As he dived away to my right I headed for the cloud dead ahead - a white, fluffy, welldeveloped cumulus cloud, it looked like it could be marking a strong thermal. As I passed under the sunlight side of the cloud, I felt the right wing of the glider being forced upwards. I pulled up and turned hard right to stay in the lift. Glancing at the instruments, and adjusting the radius of my turn, I soon found myself in the core of the thermal. The altimeter needle began to wind round the dial... 2000'...2100'... 2300'. Five minutes later, at 4000', the climb eventually petered out. I was now flying level with the cloud base, staring straight down at the airfield I launched from; now a tiny green strip between the trees.

Well, the weather wasn't guite that good every day, but many members of Imperial College Gliding Club (icGC) had similar experiences during our recent four-week summer expedition to

the Black Forest, Germany. Last year's expedition took us to the Spanish Pyrenees, while an expedition to the Czech Republic is on the cards for 2003. icGC is the longest established and best equipped gliding club in the UK, with a fleet of gliders consisting of a two-seat training glider and two high performance single seater gliders. Union subsidy means that icGC is without a doubt the cheapest and most accessible opportunity to learn to fly available. And if you're not sure if it's for you, why not take a no obligation trial flight for just £25.

Finally, several of the pilots who participated in this year's expedition took up gliding only last autumn, so if you start training now, you could be joining us next summer...
