


# Unions Vote on Strike

The Association of University Teachers is one of several unions to announce a strike ballot, due to take place by the end of the month.

Ballot papers were due to be sent out yesterday to AUT members to decide whether to walk out over the current level 'London allowance' – the extra money awarded to staff for increased living costs in the capital. At the moment, staff receive an allowance of £2134 every year but this has remained frozen since 1992. The AUT are campaigning for an allowance of over £4000, and have decided to begin industrial action due to the "intransigence of employers" in negotiations. The unions note that the average salary of Vice Chancellors is £16000 greater in London than outside, and feel that less senior staff are being treated unfairly.

The University of London [Students'] Union has been campaigning for an increase to the student London allowance for some time, and decided to back the action by university staff at

the ULU Council meeting held last week. The Imperial College student delegation to the meeting voted against support of a staff strike, though two of the IC delegates voted in favour.

Despite the vote, Sen Ganesh, President of

Imperial College Union said he was "deeply concerned about the situation", stating that strike action would have a significant impact on Union services if staff were to join in the strike action.

At the end of 2001, Imperial College raised the starting salaries of new lecturers by £8000, which has been seized by staff unions as an indication of the recruitment crisis in London and further evidence of the need to improve pay. Staff employed after 1992 were recently offered an allowance increase of just under 3% but this was unanimously rejected by the trade unions.

The strike ballots close at the end of October, and, if approved, industrial action will take place on Thursday 14th November.

The result of the ballot, and headway made by staff as a result of any action, will be carefully watched by student unions and may pave the way to improvements in allowances awarded to students living in London.

## **Democratic DoC**

A victory for student rule in academic departments was celebrated over the Summer when students in the Department of Computing demanded that Apple's iMac computers should be available in the teaching labs.

The famously cute computers appeared during the vacation when the department's Computing Support Group was running trials of some Apple equipment. However, it was under the express understanding that the machines would vanish before term started in order to make way for three more IBM-

compatible PCs – the standard machine used for teaching.

A petition was set up after some students experimented with the new hardware. It had the specific aim of keeping the iMacs permanently whilst expounding the obvious educational advantages of diverse computing experience for students.

As a result of the petition, the iMacs are still in the labs and are now awaiting full integration with the department's systems. The results of this exercise are expected to influence the policy on non-

Last weeks' programme of Freshers Week events finished last Friday with the sold-out Superheroes Ball at the Union in South Kensington.


1200 students with a wide range of super powers descended on the Beit Quad site where two dance-floors, chill-out room and bizarre inflatable-based sports were on offer.


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
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## AYN RAND -- THE MOST INFLUENTIAL NOVELIST IN THE UNITED STATES







#### My philosophy, Objectivism, holds that:

- 1. Reality exists as an objective absolute facts are facts, independent of man's feelings, wishes, hopes or fears.
- 2. Reason (the faculty which identifies and integrates the material provided by man's senses) is man's only means of perceiving reality, his only source of knowledge, his only guide to action, and his basic means of survival.
- 3. Man every man is an end in himself, not the means to the ends of others. He must exist for his own sake, neither sacrificing himself to others nor sacrificing others to himself. The pursuit of his own rational self-interest and of his own happiness is the highest moral purpose of his life.
- 4. The ideal political-economic system is laissez-faire capitalism. It is a system where men deal with one another, not as victims and executioners, nor as masters and slaves, but as traders, by free, voluntary exchange to mutual benefit. It is a system where no man may obtain any values from others by resorting to physical force, and no man may initiate the use of physical force against others. The government acts only as a policeman that protects man's rights; it uses physical force only in retaliation and only against those who initiate its use, such as criminals or foreign invaders. In a system of full capitalism, there should be (but, historically, has not yet been) a complete separation of state and economics, in the same way and for the same reasons as the separation of state and church.

# John Oliver appearing in the Comedy Club at the



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

## By Students, For Students

Europe

In 1999, Imperial College entered into a strategic alliance with four of the best science and technological institutes from across Europe to form the 'IDEA' league. The league consists of Imperial College, Delft University of Technology, ETH Zurich and RWTH Aachen. This is symptomatic of the globalisation of education and over the coming years you are likely to see more alliances formed not only in Europe but across the world.

The Students' Unions of the respective Universities have also formed a strategic partnership to ensure the views of students are heard within the IDEA league. We had our first conference in May. One of the key issues that was debated at the conference was the Bologna Declaration. The declaration was signed by Ministers of Education from 32 European countries including the United

Kingdom and in itself is quite a complex and intricate document. In essence the declaration is a commitment between the countries to reform the structures of their higher education systems in a convergent way. It aims to create a comparable and increasingly converged system of graduate

and post-graduate education across Europe, in order to maximize transferability and mobility within Europe.

One of the key objectives is the adoption of a system of easily readable and comparable degrees. This will essentially be based on two main cycles, undergraduate and graduate. It will also look towards establishing a system of credits that can be used between the countries signing up to the Bologna Declaration. This will allow for the free movement

of students across Europe.

In principle this sounds great but the practicalities can have a great impact on students here. The proposed model for adoption is a three year undergraduate programme (e.g. BEng), followed by a two year masters (e.g. MSc) and a three year post-graduate

> studies (PhD). As you can imagine this clashes with our four year undergraduate

masters degree and the one year masters programme. One immediate impact would be funding.

Currently the government is committed to funding the first degree for students. If you wish to undertake a second degree you are obliged to pay a fee that varies from institution to institution. Luckily, an integrated masters degree is regarded as you first degree and as such funded by the

government. If Imperial followed the Bologna process split it degree into the 3:2 format, students would have to find ways of funding the extra years and add to existing pressures on student finances.

It would also have implication on quality assurance - such as having to fill out a two year masters degree. These issues and more besides will have affect the future of higher education institutions in this country.

Imperial College will have to engage in a debate on whether we will be following the principles of the declaration or go our own way.

This is likely to start over the next few months and it is important that the students participate to ensure that best decisions are taken for all concerned.

Last year we found that the 'Portes Du Soleil' region was ideal for what we were looking for; plentiful chairlifts giving access to up to 900 vertical metre runs of extreme downhill courses and trails!

Upon our arrival at Geneva Airport the eight of us were greeted by worse weather than back home: pissing rain! This didn't put us off though and after unpacking and assembling our bikes on Sunday morning a few of us went out riding. The next day the rain was replaced with sun and rather than ride the local course we elected to go into Switzerland using the network of ski lifts. **Just Jack** 

Paradise



Those of you who like The Streets and Faithless may like this album. Jack Allsopp, a north Londoner, along with his six compatriots, has made a pretty good debut album. It starts off positive with the song Let's Get Really Honest, using a sample from I'm Not In Love (1995). My initial thought was "The Beatles, no... The Avalanches, no... Air". It was none of them but it was good. The following tune Paradise really sets the theme for the album

with Jack Allsopp, like Mike Skinner, "speaking poetry", some may say MC-ing, but I think not.

A very upbeat tune, the album sounds promising so far. The next tune is deeper, darker, with more punch, Jack sounding like Maxi Jazz and saying his lyrics to a nice bit of music. The middle of the album remains deep, meticulous, easily fading into the background, a slow burner of an album, and Sammy D features on Eye To Eye. Contradictions is next up, a paceier tune, funky guitar, but now with similarities to lan Brown with the lack of effort in the vocals.

The lack of effort in the vocals was just for a single tune though as *Snapshot memories* progresses sounding more like *Air*, with the tune playing with a lot of electric synthesisers and samples. *Triple Tone Eyes* is faster, being drum and bass, melodic but gloomy, not as upbeat as earlier.

The album rounds off with a slower tune Ain't Too Sad, nothing that will have you singing praises but a thoughtful song non the less. Although a well thought album with stimulating areas, an album that none the less sounds like it bears heavily on other creative influences that are the original street in the street at the original street.

#### Rhianna

Get On



Get On is the mature, polished, slick and sassy debut from Leeds-born Rhianna. Opening with the soulful single Oh Baby, she gets down, dirty and truly funky with this stunner of a track, which sweats optimism and avoids unwanted lyrical fussing, every word adding another element of cadence. The

second single Word Love echoes all the great soul sisters of note, e.g. Beverley Knight and Aretha Franklin with its high-pitched vocals and seventies backing rhythm. "Sometimes the word love/ Just ain't good enough/To describe this I feel for you". Likewise, Damn is a jazzy, sassy, uptempo, soulful delight, about newly found singledom (go Rhianna!) with a hint of RnB and the Stevie Wonder cover, I Love Every Little Thing About You does justice to the original. Another highlight, is the jazzfunk pop-masterpiece of Moon is Blue, which brings the vibe down with a suitably understated sexiness and cut-to-pieces beat. Unfortunately, the album does have its duff tracks, in the shape of the overtly sociallyconscious Runaway, and the disgustingly soppy Romeo and Juliet. (As you've learnt before,

this writer has a thing against soppy pieces of music, having not needed them in a long, long time. She is, as we speak, perfectly single. No supplementary reasons needed to explain why she enjoys drinking and bitching about being single with best mate).

It's hard to believe Rhianna is only nineteen, having produced such an accomplished debut album. The Music got together on the premise that there was 'nowt else to do', and started touring just over a year ago when they finished school. They've been on the road almost constantly since. So what have they got that all those other new bands don't?

Energy. Life. A passion for music. Every single member of The Music is completely obsessed with what they're doing - making music to entertain and help people. Making people happy! Oh, and they have a really pretty sleeve for their album. Circles! Rainbow! Woo! The People and Take The Long Road And Walk It were both previously released as EPs, and they're probably the best tracks on the album. Both are bouncy, fun, yet really rocky

tracks with old-school noises and delicate harmonies sprinkled throughout. Think distortion and lots of it. Think bouncing around like a crazed lunatic. Think tartrazine and sugar rush. Think guitar music you can dance to, and think how cool that is!



The Crescent are another product of Liverpool, but are they worthy of all the attention? Admittedly, it's unfortunate for The Crescent that they, along with The Music and The Coral have been met with so much hype and expectation.

As seen many a time before, the consequence of hype is that a band very rarely delivers; people expect too much and are usually disappointed. This reviewer decided to ignore it all, and listen to The Crescent for their own merits.

With so many bands nowadays, you hear a bit of everything in the Crescent. Maybe, it's just the accents, but I can hear many acclaimed Scousers among them: The Beatles, the La's and Cast.

The Beatles connection goes a little further, as the band insisted that they used studio 2 at the Abbey Road recording studios in which The Beatles played.

Another heavy influence is that from North-West neighbours Oasis; as it could be said The Crescent have produced the album that Oasis should have done after What's the Story Morning Glory.

The strong point of this album is that The Crescent don't pretend to be anything they're not, and that is a good raw melodic rock band. The songs on this album are well crafted and sometimes hippy-ish, like the opening track On the Run which sets the style and pace for the entire album.

The highlight, or lowlight, take it as you please, is the soundalike of Paul Weller and the Levellers, especially on top summertime sing-along, Streets of Tide.

#### Does it not bother you though that your most popular song is basically a cover and not your own?

No not at all. I mean the Beatles did *Roll Over Beethoven*, the stones played loads of covers too. We've not done a faithful version of the song we've bought it up to date and made it more interesting.

## Why did you play at the jubilee. Are you pro-monarchy?

The jubilee thing was probably shown to the whole of the commonwealth and probably a billion

viewers so we wanted to do it on that basis. And it was a really great day. We do things which aren't perhaps cool but by doing that day we had one of the days of our lives and it's something I'll never forget. It wasn't about the cause. #### What would make Toploader split up?



## The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy

## A Trilogy in Five Parts

Ok, so we all know that the meaning of life, the universe and everything is 42 but did you know that the computer who calculated this was called Deep Thought and was designed and created by a pan dimensional species that exist in our dimension as mice?

Douglas Adams' trilogy in five parts began life as a radio show on the BBC in 5th April 1978, 12th April 1978, 24th December 1978 and 21, 22, 23, 24, 25 January 1980. After this it was (very) freely adapted and extended to give the five books that make up the trilogy: The Hitchhiker's Guide to the Galaxy; The Restaurant at the End of the Universe; Life, the Universe and Everything; So Long and Thanks for All the Fish; Mostly Harmless. Some of it has also been made into a television show some time ago.

Now I would claim that these are the best set of books ever written, I've read them many times, I've listened to the radio show and although I have yet to see the TV show I would claim to be one of his greatest fans (never thought I'd say that about anyone). As such I very highly recommend that any sad individual out there who has still to be introduced to the wonders of the world of Douglas Adams buys these books. 'That's the display department.'

'With a torch.'

'Ah, well the lights had probably gone.'

'So had the stairs.'

'But, look, you found the notice didn't you.'

'Yes,' said Arthur, 'yes, I did. It was on display in the bottom of a locked filing cabinet in a disused lavatory with a sign on the door saying Beware of The Leopard.'"

Having started the day losing his house Arthur doesn't think it can get much worse but soon discovers that his best friend, inconspicuously named Ford Prefect, is actually from another planet and not only is his house being demolished for a bypass but today is also the day that the Earth will be demolished for a hyperspace bypass. All in all it is a pretty bad Thursday.

However, Arthur is actually quite lucky (although he might not believe it) because Ford manages to hitch a lift with the space ship that is about to destroy Earth thanks to some helpful domestic workers. From there they are thrown out by the not-very-friendly owners of the vehicle with which they hitched a lift and picked up by the most advanced, intelligent ship ever invented — The Heart of Gold. Here they meet the only other surviving member of the human race Tricia McMillan, or Trillian, and Zaphod


Beeblebrox, President of the Galaxy. From hereon in the trilogy follows the adventures and misadventures of these four as they hitchhike around the universe and through time in a desperate bid to stay alive. The unlucky foursome stumbles from one disaster to another involving various alien life forms none of which seem to be very friendly.

Now, as yet, I haven't mentioned the best, most popular character — Marvin the Paranoid Android. A robot with an intellect beyond the comprehension of us mere mortals he is also the most depressed individual the Universe has ever seen. He is forced to do menial tasks and makes sure that everyone is clear that he hates doing them. With a pain in all the diodes down his left-hand side he moans, grumbles, whinges and complains his way through the entire series. Douglas Adams in fact tried to write him out at one point but there was such uproar from Marvin fans that he was quickly resurrected in the next book.


Douglas Adams is also responsible for the creation of Dirk Gently's Holistic Detective Agency and The Long Dark Teatime of the Soul. He has also written in conjunction with Mark Carwardine (Last Chance To See), John Lloyd (The Deeper Meaning of Liff) and Terry Jones (Starship Titanic). I have read Starship Titanic and would definitely recommend it and the Dirk Gently books are also well worth a read, but The Hitchhiker's Guide trilogy remains my firm favourite. So go! BUY BUY BUY! 




