Strike Hits College

College was much quieter than usual on Thursday when staff walked out over pay across the capital.

Official pickets were set up outside most entrances to College, though movement around College was generally unhindered, particularly for students. However, staff protesting outside buildings made up only a fraction of those away from work, as many others declined to cross picket lines, regardless of their support for strike action.

Many departments, such as Physics, officially cancelled lecturers for the day, but in others most lectures ran as normal.

At Imperial College Union, the strike had little effect on student services, despite some members

of staff walking out for the day.

Four of the main staff unions — the Association of University Teachers, Unison, NAFTHE and Amicus — called a strike to

protest about the amount of extra money awarded to university workers in the capital. It has been fixed at £2,134 since 1992 but the unions would like to see

that rise to around £4,000.

One member of technical staff on strike told *Felix*, "We are very bitter that management get £16,000 London allowance and they won't even talk to us."

Despite the strike, no talks were scheduled between the University of London and staff unions to resolve the dispute.

Unison announced that a focus of the strike would be the Queen's visit to King's College, where she is expected to open a new library.

The AUT's general secretary told the BBC "When reasonable staff are pushed to strike, vice-chancellors should sit down with the unions and seek a resolution. So far, they have not done this."

'Speaker Van Man' Is Back

A regular feature of life at Imperial College returned this week when men selling speakers out of the back of a van started pestering students.

The "speaker van man" phenomenon crops up each year. The van's passengers call a student over as if to ask directions, claim that they've had a delivery of speakers rejected and that they are trying to shift them at a knock-down price.

In the past, the speakers have found to be either broken or of very low quality. Buyers have also been asked to take the salesmen to cash machines, and physical threats have been made against those who refuse to buy.

College Security strongly advise students to stay away from the vans – so far this week a white van and a green van (S904 NGW) have both been used, and there may well be more – but can do nothing to stop them as long as they remain on public roads. AW

Graduates Unprepared?

A new survey of final year university students published today reveals that 46% do not feel prepared for work.

The survey of over 1,000 students, conducted on behalf of TeachFirst, found that two thirds of students thought that University should be about preparing students for a professional career, but less than half thought it had succeeded.

Students were questioned at several universities across the UK and Ireland. Oxbridge students proved to be much more theoretically-minded than London students with only 43%

believing that university should be about preparation for a professional career. This was compared to 70% of students guestioned at UCL, LSE, Imperial and Kings College London.

Additionally, it was discovered that just over half of the students know what they want to do after they graduate.

Money was rated by students as their primary goal for five years after graduation, followed closely by respect; family was rated as their primary goal twenty years after graduation.

Diana Warwick, chief executive of the umbrella group

Universities UK, said there was a difference between enhancing students' general skills and preparing them for a specific job or profession.

"Some jobs require a specific degree subject, and additional studies - others do not." said Baroness Warwick. "What is clear is that higher education helps students develop transferable skills that are useful in their subsequent careers."

Lord Mayor's Show

The first Lord Mayor's Show was in 1215, after King John had granted a Charter allowing the City's citizens to elect their own mayor. The Charter stipulated that the new mayor must be presented to the Sovereign for approval and to swear loyalty to the Crown. Saturday 9th November 2002 saw the 675th Lord Mayor's Show and City & Guilds College Union once again co-ordinated an entry on behalf of Imperial College. This year's float celebrated the 100th birthday of Boanerges, affectionately known as Bo', one of the vintage vehicle mascots of the Faculty of Engineering.

Generators purred into life, lights lit up, silk flames started billowing around and the air around the float was filled with floating voices whispering "testing" into the microphone. The rest of the students accompanying the float began to trickle in, including members of Skate Soc (on skates...) and Juggling Club (to juggle). After 11am the float finally began to move off, edging forward with Clementine and Jezebel bringing up the rear. Clem appeared to find itself the chosen base for STOIC, who were along to film the event.

In true Imperial College fashion one of our generators chose this particular moment to fail, shutting down the all important sound system (probably much to the relief of the marching band in front). With panic rapidly setting in as we pulled out into the main pro-

cession Bo' and Derrick set out to make up for the absence of sound with quick-fire usage of their horns while enthusiastic students scrambled over the float to try and repair the broken generator (we are engineers, after all). The return parade back to London Wall took about an hour and passed mercifully almost without incident though sadly the BBC didn't get a chance to capture our float in its full two-generator glory, with silk flames billowing. As always the show was great fun for those who took part and superb publicity for Imperial College. Assuming the money can be found, there can't be any doubt that we'll be back again next year.

What do we do?





Oscar Wilde is seminal, and you'll easily find plays, stories and film adaptations. P.G. Woodhouse is fairly flippant, and breezes through the stereotypes. The Jeeves and Wooster books got a good TV series with Stephen

Fry and Hugh Laurie. Evelyn Waugh is much more subtle, and though you'll have to overlook the racist mindset of many of his generation, *Decline and Fall* and *Scoop* are great.

Punch magazine was a work-horse for a very long time, and has recently been reincarnated. but you'll have to look up the earlier stuff if you want top quality. Of especial note are the cartoons of **H. M. Bateman**, of *The Man Who...* series.

Although these are strictly speaking contemporary, the subject matter is historical. You should be able to see *Life of Brian* and *Holy Grail, Monty Python* films and the *Blackadder* TV series very easily soon as Christmas and the re-run season approaches. Ask many Brits about these two, and they'll happily wax lyrical about them and possibly provide you with opportunities to view them. Encourage them.

Cannabis: A scientist's view

Cannabis usage

The pros

- Alcohol and tobacco are more addictive.
- It can help make various medical conditions more bearable to live with, for example cancer, HIV, MS, glaucoma.
- Cannabis appears to be good for the heart.



The cannabis plant

The cons

- Cannabis is psychologically addictive.
- Users can show aggressive behaviour when in withdrawal.
- Cannabis use could lead to 'harder' drugs.
- It has a higher tar content than tobacco and so has a higher risk of lung cancer.
- Users can have trouble controlling blood pressure and so are prone to fainting.

A scientific history

The cannabis drug is from the plant Cannabis Indica, probably first found in India and related to nettles. It has been grown for 'medicinal and recreational' purposes for thousands of years. Most of British cannabis resin ('black', 'soapbar', 'hash') comes in from Morocco, with the herbal cannabis ('grass', 'weed', 'skunk') coming in mainly from Jamaica. There is an increasing trend for 'homegrown' cannabis.

Most cannabis is smoked, often along with tobacco, but it can be eaten, often with much stronger effects. These effects include increased talkativeness, relaxation and heightened experiences of sound and colour.

The main psychoactive ingredient in cannabis is called THC, but this is only one of over 400 chemicals. THC interferes with brain functions by producing signals very similar to that of the brain's neurotransmitters, but with a random pattern. The effects last for about four hours and there is no 'hangover' as such.

Sometimes the effects of a high cannabis dose can be unpleasant, producing hallucinations, panic, paranoia and nausea. Some users have short-term memory loss because the parts of the brain controlling memory have been disrupted. Some research has suggested that prolonged use can permanently affect the memory and the ability to learn.

Cannabis smokers inhale far more tar than tobacco smokers and so there is an increased risk of lung cancer.

Currently cannabis in its herbal and resin form is a class B drug carrying a penalty of up to five years in jail for possession. The Home Secretary, David Blunkett has, however, recently suggested moving it down to class C, and experimental schemes have been introduced in some areas to relax police regulation of the drug

Medicinal uses of cannabis

It seems likely that soon the British Government will introduce legislation to allow the use of cannabis for medicinal purposes. It has been shown to help reduce nausea associated with chemotherapy, help increase the

appetite of AIDs sufferers, help relieve eye pressure for people with glaucoma, and to help relieve muscle pain.

The condition that cannabis has been associated the most with is Multiple Sclerosis. MS is incurable and sufferers have balance problems, muscle spasms, incontinence and tremors. A large number of sufferers have said that cannabis helps ease these symptoms, particularly spasms, pain and bladder control. But many are breaking the law while attempting to ease their suffering.

Doctors can prescribe Nabilone, containing THC, but patients complain about 'getting stoned', because the pain relieving ingredients have yet to be separated from the 'mind bending' ones.

Research proposal competition: "Why I need 16 contact lens holders" Winner - Wai-mei Chan

In response to angry farmers, grounds-men and gardeners, a research opportunity has arisen in the prevention/minimisation of crop and flowerbed damage by moles. I propose to select 16 moles to experiment (humanely) upon from a mole community. The aim will be to train them to apply their contact lenses once they have surfaced and ascertain whether they


have disturbed a place of agricultural/horticultural significance or a designated mole habitat. If they find that they have done the latter they will know that they can dig more extensive burrows there, however if not, they will know to leave that site as delicately as possible, never to return, and pass the message onto other moles.

As contact lenses will be easily scratched and damaged in the harsh conditions of a burrow under construction, it is necessary to have funding for 16 contact lens holders, which can be attached to the moles via utility belts. (The lenses being funded by the Moles' protection league). Let me prove that people and moles can live together in peace.

SCIENCE Atomic clocks

We'll meet in a moment... err... in 5,345669543 seconds

The current most accurate clock (NIST-F1 fountain clock) neither gains nor loses a second in nearly 20 million years. Rather accurate. To understand how this super clock reaches such accuracy let's first remind ourselves what a clock is. All clocks have two basic components:




The nist-1 clock

a constant process to mark the increments of time and a means of keeping track of the increments. For example, your grandfather's pendulum clock increments time with the oscillation mechanism of the pendulum. Christian Huygens (a Dutch scientist) made the first one in 1656 and its error was less than one minute a day.

While Huygens' clock (or your grandfather's pendulum clock) is a mechanical clock, the atomic clock is a quantum-mechanical clock. In other words, its working is based on quantum physics (physics of the ultra small). Essentially, the incremental component is given by the radiation frequency that causes the maximum transitions of the clock's atoms (NIST-F1 uses Caesium 133) to another state. In English? Well... According to quantum mechanics, subatomic particles can only exist in discrete states and not at in between states (electrons have two hyperfine states). Generally, an atom remains in its hyperfine state. But when prodded by electromagnetic radiation at a specific frequency, it will switch to the other state. For Caesium the specific radiation frequency is 9,192,631,770. Or in other words, when the radiation frequency is 9,192,631,770 a maximum number of Caesium atoms undergo a "hyperfine state" transition. As frequency is expressed in [s-1] (per second) it is obvious (...hopefully) that the 9,192,631,770 beats define exactly 1 second. The idea of using hyperfine states for a clock was first proposed by U.S. physicist Isador Rabi

After this preamble, you can now understand that an atomic clock: 1) filters atoms by selecting those in one hyperfine state, 2) radiates the selected atoms by microwaves, 3) measures how many changed atoms there are (fluorescence detection), 4) tunes the microwave generator to the frequency that causes the maximum transitions. This optimal frequency (or number of oscillations) represents 1 second.

So now why do we need such accuracy? Innumerable communication and navigation systems as well as synchronising systems (between computers,...) rely on it. One example is the GPS (Global Positioning Satellites) system. GPS determine the position of a receiver anywhere on Earth by timing the arrival signals from four GPS satellites and doing a quick calculation to triangulate its position. Each

nanosecond (billionth of a second) of error translates into a GPS error of one foot. Thus each of the 24 GPS satellites contains four atomic clocks.



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Put your hand up if you need a job, I do




Junk yard for forwards

street of rather unsavoury characters whose lives are intertwined. Their personalities, revealed through a highly descriptive narrative of the mundane objects and routines which fill their lives, left me wondering - just how many homes are littered with free gifts from lager promotions?

English Electric is a depressing foray into the downfall of a man after being made redundant. Short and not very sweet but eye-opening all the same. The final story, Early Doors, introduces you to the highly entertaining world of a conman and his new wife. Has he finally made it big?

These three stories have a colourful cast of characters, perhaps stereotyped, but that is to be expected in such a small space. I did enjoy the stereotypes and Crump uses them to his advantage, injecting them with a surprising amount of humanity. As a result, his characters are fully rounded and lively, inciting you to care about

If you prefer to avoid the less desirable side of life, then the cast of wackos, drunks and conmen may not be for you. But if you want your eyes to be opened to different outlooks on life, and to investigate the motivations for some of the most depraved social behaviour, then perhaps this is the book for you.

There's some strong social comment here. For example, Monkey's Birthday ends with a crime, depicting the perpetrator as a passive agent driven by circumstances and situations. I'm not sure if this book should be taken as an authority on these situations. After all, it's just the author's personal insight, but it'll definitely spark thought in your own mind. On a more superficial level, this is thoroughly entertaining; a personal through-thekeyhole into the lives of a diverse range of lively characters.

MAGIC

Harry's world has been recreated with stunning visual style, with superb special effects: Dobby the house-elf equals anything Mr. Lucas has done recently, cars swoop with verve and realism and there are spiders that would induce severe arachnophobia in the most passionate entomologist. It is directed with a grandeur that perfectly suits the mood of the film, and the pace is fairly relentless. Beware though, there are a number of sections that will make you squirm by their very cheesiness.

Added to this, the kids' acting is still largely awful, even if things have improved since the first outing. Ron still does a Mr. Soft impersonation when he's frightened, Hermione still has the overannunciation of a school presentation and Harry is rivalling his wand for sheer woodiness. The teachers have all settled into their roles nicely, with the late Richard Harris bringing an understated humility to Dumbledore, but the star of the staffroom would have to be the OTT Gilderov Lockhart. Whether you love him or loathe him will depend mainly on how much the sight of Branagh makes your fists itch.

I could sit here nitpicking about any number of things in the film, but overall it remains a very enjoyable way to spend an evening. The humour of the novels is cleverly captured and the story remains in-keeping with the book - well-structured and intriguing. It is a much darker affair

than the first film, with some pretty scary scenes for hardened students, let alone guivering 8 year olds. But go on, get in touch with your inner wizard - it's certainly a lot cheaper than the merchandising.

film could be repulsing.

The story, both imaginative and intricate on paper, is allowed to drown in an extremely indolent screenplay. The plot never flows. Columbus can be excused for skimming away many of the minor stories and complexities (at two hours, forty minutes the film can already be tediously long) but he left the film without direction. The script was terrible, containing too many cheap and nauseating lines and the soundtrack was jammed with melodramatic strings - the experience was similar to sitting through a three-hour Werther's Original advert.

The best acting seen was probably Dobby the computer-animated "house-elf" - one of the highlights of the film. Smith (McGonagall), Rickman (Snape) and Branagh (Lockhart) created their characters excellently, but unfortunately Harry, Ron and Hermione did not live up to expectations. Their acting was wooden, and Watson is the only one who looks likely to have a future career.

I imagine for many under-twelves, the world will be a happier place with The Chamber of Secrets, but for me the beauty of JK Rowling's books lies in her imaginative minute details. The film lacks such qualities, resulting in something ridiculous and disappointing. As I looked around, there was little evidence of wonder on the audience's faces - the most frequent expression was a cringe. Sachit

If films wrote history, we'd be screwed. Forget Attila the Hun, Ivan the Terrible and Hitler; in the all-time definitive list of most evil entities the world has ever known, the English would be sitting pretty at Numero Uno. With the exception of German and perhaps Russian, diabolical megalomaniacs always have English accents. Then there's Braveheart, The Patriot, Titanic and countless others. Blighty-bashing is the most popular sport in Hollywood, and with Mel Gibson in particular. And if you've ever talked to an Aussie, you'll know that it's almost their national past time.

Rabbit-Proof Fence is a tale of the subjugation of Australia's native Aboriginals in the name of Her Majesty. This is still a most controversial subject Down Under, and one of 'Straylia's most shameful legacies. Up until 1970, half-caste children could be removed from their homes and sent for education in white environments. They became known as the Stolen Generations, and to this day the Australian government refuses to

apologise for its treatment of them.

Although this is a tale of the plight of Australia's indigenous inhabitants (and it raises some pertinent questions about Australia's policies on this subject), it is more concerned with what the Aussie film industry does best - which is making simple yet subtle movies about the nature of human emotion. The plot (based on a true story) centres on the plight of three halfcaste girls, who are taken from their Aboriginal mother in the 1930s. They are moved 1500 miles to be educated as servants, on the orders of the Minister for Aboriginals, Mr. Neville (Kenneth Branagh).

Refreshingly, the filmmakers have shied away from making an anti-English movie, although it must have been tempting to do so. Mr. Neville comes across as a decent and honourable man, albeit with badly misguided views about race and

equality. In a line laced with irony, he laments, 'If only they could understand what I'm trying to do'. These days, the boot is most firmly on the other foot.

In a film where lines of dialogue are few and far between, a hugely effective visual narrative more than fills the gaps. Stunning cinematography powerfully conveys the vastness and wildness of the Australian outback, while the three lead girls, Molly (Everlyn Sampi) especially, manage to convey much simply through body language and facial expression. The acting in general is astounding considering most of the children featured had never even seen a movie before, let alone acted in one.

A word must be said too about the music. If this were a Hollywood film (and thank God it isn't) we'd have sweeping scores and sentimental interludes. The way that things like this are managed produce an emotional movie despite filming in an almost understated style; by letting the story do the talking, if you'll pardon an incredibly bad pun.

It wouldn't be excessive to say that this is one of the best Australian films I've ever seen, although come to think about it, that doesn't necessarily mean much. One anecdote might convince you though: in a near-packed cinema, no one left until well after the credits had started rolling. Even if you disregard everything I've said above, you have to take that as a sign of a powerful film.

Call the Girls is an anthem for the females out there who aspire

The Lollies never stop trying to be amusing or ironic and this stops the album from being an excellent debut. Sonically and lyrically, it borders on lightweight and silly too often. What is certain though is that The Lollies are part of a new wave of bands reinventing the indie scene - The Strokes, The Datsuns, the Yeah Yeah Yeahs. A New Day At Midnight



It's been a long time coming, this much anticipated follow-up album to *White Ladder*. Predictably, the first thing that is asked will be how it compares to *White Ladder*, something I'm sure David Gray tried to avoid by going on tour and just staying away for a few years. Friday 25th October, Brixton Academy



On the final night of their latest national tour, **Kosheen** played a powerful, emotional and thoroughly enjoyable set at a packed Brixton Academy.

For the uninitiated, **Kosheen** are DJs/producers Markee Substance and Darren Decoder, together with vocalist Sian Evans. Their debut album *Resist* was released last year and is still going strong, having spawned four Top 20 singles, most notably the thumping, hypnotic *Hide U*. The key advantage they hold over so many other groups is their near-unique ability to blend together flowing, addictive melodies and powerful drum 'n' bass beats.

Right from the very first note, the crowd were hooked - many of them didn't stop jumping up and down all night. I'd say this was due to the sheer energy and emotion generated by the band, but I suppose the 10.30pm start (and the resultant





Cherbourg Trip

It was a Friday afternoon when we left South Kensington in a big red smelly minibus, which we singularly failed to crash, and hopped along the road using two hands to change gears. After a quick meal, safety brief and putting on of lots of extra layers we left Portsmouth Harbour in the early evening, stuck the motor on and pointed the boat for France.

About twelve hours later we arrived in Cherbourg, a bit tired and cold but otherwise fine, having motored almost all the way as there was next to no wind. Unfortunately all the weather forecasts we heard were implying that this was definitely the calm before the storm, with each forecast predicting that the gale force winds would arrive sooner rather than later.

Since being stuck in the middle of the channel in howling winds and rain was not quite what we had in mind, and nor was being stuck in Cherbourg all week while they went on - although maybe it would have been nicer than lectures - we decided to head home a little earlier than we had originally planned. We left Cherbourg some six hours after arriving, having indulged in the necessities of quick nap, some breakfast, showers, a trip to the hypermarket for chocolate and alcohol, and lunch.

As we left we checked the engine and fuel like the good

responsible sailors that we all are and in a still non-existent wind motored back towards England feeling rather as if things were too boring to be true. And so they were. Two hours later and our engine started to make very strange noises, so we turned it off, never guessing that it would not turn back on again. Half the crew retired down below at this point, and spent the next few hours with their head in the engine trying everything they could think of while the other half stayed resolutely on deck in the cold - mainly because they couldn't get down below as the steps had been removed to get at the engine - and concentrated on sailing as fast and efficiently as possible in what wind there was. Soon we were storming along towards home and the shipping lanes, with a stiffening wind, but no engine. We decided that it would be safer to continue on our way than to turn back, considering the weather forecast, and settled into two watches to sail through the night. Thankfully the wind held pretty

constant and ten hours after our first sighting of the Isle of Wight and a lot of big ships later we found ourselves back in the Solent. Still with no engine. We obtained permission form the Portsmouth Harbourmaster to enter the harbour under sail, something which is normally for-






After a lot of decision making we phoned the marine equivalent of the AA, who sent a guy

out in a rib to help us in, and then fixed our engine in two minutes since we had ran out of fuel. Turns out the fuel gauge was wrong...

Success on the Water

Bill Mason's last year as chief coach of Imperial College Boat Club ended with strong performances by the eight crews that competed at Henley Royal Regatta in July.

Four crews in total progressed to the semi-finals on the Saturday. In the Temple Challenge Cup, the 1st eight narrowly lost to their main rivals, Oxford Brookes by half a length. Both crews were pushed to the limit, so much so that Oxford Brookes were arguably too tired to beat Harvard in the final.

In the Grand Challenge Cup for eights, an Imperial College composite crew comprising rowers from the national squad went out to a German national crew in the semi-finals. In the Visitors Challenge Cup for coxless fours, the Imperial College A crew were beaten in a tight race against a composite crew from

Oxford Brookes and Imperial College. It was later revealed that Imperial College's 3-man, Tim Perkins was suffering from gastroenteritis during the competition. The composite crew containing Dan Marret and Dave Gillard of Imperial went on to win the event in a controversial final requiring a re-row when a flock of geese wandered on to the course.

Other crews of note included the second Temple Cup eight who lost a narrow race to a strong crew from Marist College, USA. Finally a pair from Imperial raced the South African world bronze medallists, worrying them off the start going out in a well publicised race.

Four members of the Temple Cup eight, George Whittaker, Hugh McKenzie, Ed Johnson and John Weale, went on to win silver in open coxed fours in the National Championships. This

experienced crew raced with tenacity over the 2000m course, only being overpowered by the winning crew from Nottinghamshire County in the last 300m.

This ended a successful regatta season that saw various wins at the Metropolitan, Docklands and Reading regattas. Imperial also sent an eight to an invitational student regatta in Valenciennes, France, where they beat Dresden of Germany to win the final. Special note should go to the new members of the club who won novice coxed fours in convincing style at Putney Town regatta.

The women's squad prevailed through a difficult year and produced strong performances from a small base. At Women's Henley Regatta, Cathy Burgione, Kelly Cummins, Ali Elsey Helen Ellison, and cox Seb Pearce competed in the College coxed fours event. They raced with determination and skill against the much bigger, but younger, crew of Eden High School, Canada, but were unable to prevent them slowly edging out a 1 length lead by the finish line. Comfort was to be drawn from the fact that it was the closest any crew got to Eden in the event.

Imperial College was also well represented at the various international regattas during the summer months.

At the World Championships in Seville, Steve Trapmore, Luka Grubor and Kieran West from Imperial College, together with Tom Stallard of Cambridge University and cox Christian Cormack of Leander competed in the men's coxed fours. They dominated the event, rowing to gold in the final in commanding fashion. This adds to their impressive Olympic gold they achieved in the British men's eight in Sydney 2000. Imperial's Dan Ouseley also rowed in the British men's eight this year in Seville to come 6th place overall, a most respectable result considering their initially poor

performances at the preceding World Cup regattas. James Haddow, who coxed the Temple Cup eight, went on to steer the British lightweight men's eight and came 5th in the final.

Other international appearances included Angus Rivers, who rowed in the coxless four at this year's under 23 regatta, the Nations Cup. Seb Pearce coxed the British men's eight at the World University Championships. Ironically this was the Oxford Brookes crew who beat the 1st eight in the Temple Cup at Henley.

Marret and Gillard, along with their Oxford Brookes crewmates. represented England at the Commonwealth Regatta. More controversy was in store when they had to re-row for the bronze medal against former Queen's Tower members John Langley and Tom Morgan. Once again, they won the re-row and achieved bronze, proving that fitness over 4000m is a more prudent tactic these days. Helen Ellison and John Weale rowed Wales at Commonwealths, with Ellison winning bronze in the women's eight.

Simon Dennis, former member of the British Olympic gold medal men's eight from Sydney 2000, has now taken over as the Boat Club's new head coach. He inherits Bill Mason's 24-year legacy of consistent success as a coach at the top of British rowing. It includes 17 wins at Henley Royal Regatta, 15 World Championship medals, and national chief coach for women at the Atlanta Olympic Games. and many who have been coached by Bill have risen through the ranks to enjoy successes in the national team. He will now work in a more supportive role as Director of Rowing at Imperial.
