



Chinese university may open UK campus


Zhejiang

Imperial College London has signed a memorandum of understanding with Zhejiang University (ZJU) that could see the creation of a UK campus for the Chinese university at White City, where Imperial's new Imperial West campus is to be built.

The memorandum was signed on the morning of 15 May 2013 during a ceremony in the Great Hall of the People in Zhejiang Province. Sir Keith O'Nions, President & Rector of Imperial College London, Hao Ping, Chinese Vice Minister of Education Jin Deshui, Council Chairman of ZJU, and the Governor and Vice Governor of the Zhejiang Province signed the memorandum. The seniority of the Chinese delegation is a sign that this proposal is being taken seriously by the Chinese Government. Xinhau, the national news agency in China, published the news and Chinese television news bulletins have run stories on it.

Zhang Xiuqin, Director of the Department of International Cooperation and Exchanges at China's Education ministry, said: "China will support and help its universities to go out and internationalise". She said that the ZJU's London campus would be a "valuable step" towards this goal. If the second campus does go ahead,



Student led teaching award winners announced

The winners of Imperial College Union's first Student Academic Choice Awards have been announced at a ceremony on Tuesday 21 May. Over 150 people attended the event.

The eight winners (see box at the end of the article) were picked from over 400 entries that the Union received. Best Teaching for Undergraduates received 244 submissions from students. The winner, Dr Alistair Donaldson from the Department of Computing, said "I've been constantly impressed by how bright, enthusiastic,

questioning and hard working the undergraduate students are". He said that the award "really means a lot" because it is coming from students and that he is "hugely honoured" to be praised for his lecturing ability.

Anna Hikel from the Department of Civil and Environmental Engineering echoed the sentiments from Dr Donaldson, saying, "I am pleased that the students recognise my dedication to them". She went on to say that she "was thrilled to receive the news that I had won the award".

At the event, Paul Beaumont, Union President, said: "The SACAs is our way of thanking all of the nominees



and winners for their hard work and recognising the positive impact that they have on the student experience."

Each of the winners received a trophy, and all finalists were presented with a certificate.







Future partnership on the cards

ZJU will be the first Chinese university to expand overseas.

Imperial have invited proposals from potential global partners in business, industry and academia to base themselves at the seven acre site and collaborate with Imperial. College say that the early response has been "strong". O'Nions said: "Our ambition for collaborating with other organisations at Imperial West - and certainly with ZJU – is to achieve a level of excellence together that would not be possible apart." He went on to say: "We look forward to working with ZJU colleagues to establish how the two institutions will benefit from the potential partnerships."

At this stage the agreement is to discuss the new campus and is non-binding. Both Imperial and ZJU will now

explore the feasibility of establishing joint academic facilities in the Imperial West campus. The two universities will also explore ways to collaborate in postgraduate education and joint research. O'Nions has hinted as to how this could be useful. He said that there are some problems that cannot be solved by one side and that this is good opportunity to work together in a two pronged approach. "For example, in the field of human health, the two universities can study the population in different regions and explore the treatment of diseases faced by human beings."

ZJU seem to be keen on the move. An article appeared on their website praising Imperial and highlighting the reputation for international excellence that Imperial enjoys. ZJU described the opportunity as "exciting". Jin Deshui said: "We are very pleased to be able to work together with Imperial

College". He went on to say that Imperial and ZJU will develop a mutually beneficial model, which will be sustainable and that they will carry out two-way, in-depth strategic cooperation that will help both institutions.

Imperial West is the new campus for Imperial College London. Exact details on what will be there have not yet been fully released. However, College say that the site, previously owned by the BBC, will be a £150 million research centre for up to 3000 scientists. The site faced opposition from local residents who claimed that their peace would be disturbed and their houses would be overshadowed.

ZJU currently contains around 39,000 students, and houses one of the largest library collections in China. The Times Higher Education supplement (THE) ranked it below 300 in the world, although its income from industry is very strong.



New Scientist Live Event

Paul Davies will be talking about a radical approach to cancer therapy.

Cancer research is a vast worldwide enterprise, yet there has been little improvement in patient outcomes over several decades. Clearly some bold new thinking is needed. Amid the frantic search for an elusive "cure", some basic questions are overlooked. Why is there cancer? What are its deep evolutionary roots? Why do almost all cells come pre-loaded with a cancer subroutine? Paul, who is the Director of the Center for Fundamental Concepts in Science at Arizona State University, will describe a new and testable theory of cancer as the re-activation of an ancient phenotype, suggesting a radically new approach to therapy.

Virgins for the hell of it!

ls Imperial really as limp as it seems?

So, with our infamous ratio often being quoted as a source of a lot of discontent, are we really as dissatisfied as other student surveys are leading us

When asking students about how happy they are with their sex life, the majority of students said they were satisfied with their sex life, with 61% either happy or very happy in their bedroom endeavours. Only 15% of students said they were dissatisfied with their lacklustre sex lives.

Splitting by gender though, 67% of all females out there are either happy or very happy. This is not the case for the boys, with only 55% of men feeling the same. One in four males simply described their attitude to their sex life as "meh

So has Imperial had any influence on these findings? When asked, around 46% of students overall feel that being at Imperial negatively affects vour sex life. However, when split by gender, it was found that, actually, to the contrary, 20% of women thought it enhanced their sex lives, compared to only 9% of men thinking the same. Not only that, a further 56% of males agreed that going to Imperial has left them rather high and forever dry by stating Imperial has done them

Just to cover all of the bases, we then asked if their sex life at Imperial has had any impact on their overall student satisfaction. It was also found

there wasn't really any link between the two. Splitting by gender again, it does seem that the boys are again more disgruntled than the girls, with 64% of females not considering their sex lives a hindrance to their blossoming student experience, whilst only 56% of the boys seem to think the same. Maybe what the library can do for some it just can't do for others.

With women on average having more sex per week then men, it does seem that men are indeed feeling a bit begrudged towards the ratio. Underground networking

Sarah Byrne explores a potentially useful facet in plant-fungi relationships

ou probably think humans invented communication networks.
However according to recent research, plants might have got there first, communicating with each other through extensive underground fungal networks.

Most soil-based fungi grow as hyphae: long, branching fibres that form spreading network-like structures known as mycelium. In some cases the fungus goes a step further, interacting with the roots of a plant beneath the ground, in a symbiotic or mutualistic relationship. The mycelium is highly efficient at absorbing water and minerals from the soil, and the colonised plant gets the benefit of this, allowing plants to thrive even in drought conditions or mineral-poor soils. In return, the fungus feeds off the energy-rich sugars made and stored by the plant. The mutualistic relationship may also increase the plant's resistance to disease and toxic

It has been suspected in recent

years that fungal connections between plants might play some role in communicating. The recent study, however, provides the first experimental evidence of this mechanism in action.

A new way to protect agricultural crops against pests and disease?

The bean plants used in the study can develop resistance to infestation by aphids when exposed to a sample of the insects. However when two plants were connected by the fungal



network, the aphid-exposed 'donor' plant was able to transfer signalling molecules through the mycelial network to a 'receiver'. This gave the receiver plant the information it needed to develop aphid resistance, despite never having encountered the aphids itself. A fine mesh barrier was used to prevent actual root-to-root interactions, and controls using nonconnected plants demonstrated that the communication was not simply diffusion through the soil, providing strong evidence that the plants really are chatting to one another over the network.

The researchers suggest that we may be able to manipulate mycelial networks to develop new ways to protect agricultural crops against pests and disease. Either way it is clear that these generally overlooked networks are a huge part of plant ecosystems, maybe as much so as the internet and social networks are a part of our society.

Malaria mozzies can't resist smelly feet

Compared to uninfected mosquitoes malaria parasite-containing mosquitoes are approximately three times more attracted to the smell of humans, a study shows.

The researchers from the London School of Hygiene & Tropical Medicine infected malaria mosquitoes with the deadly parasite that causes malaria, *Plasmodium falciparum*.

They put the mosquitoes in a container with socks that had been worn for 20 hours before the experiment.

The scientists recorded the number of times the mosquitoes attacked the socks.

They repeated the experiment with uninfected mosquitoes.

The infected mosquitoes attacked the socks more often and fed for longer than uninfected mosquitoes.

The findings, published in PLOS ONE, suggest that the malaria parasite manipulates the behaviour of mosquitoes and makes them more blood thirsty.

It cannot resist the smell of human blood and bites more often and for longer. This gives the parasite a higher chance of getting passed on to humans, so its lifecycle and the deadly disease can continue.



Dr Logan from the London School of Hygiene and Tropical Medicine said, "We have shown for the first time that the sense of smell could hold the key to understanding how the parasite successfully manipulates the mosquito to ensure its spread. Exploring this further opens up the possibility that we could use this knowledge against the parasite by developing tools with crucial chemicals found in human

odour."

These findings will enable researchers to develop better mosquito traps that specifically lure malaria-infected mosquitoes by human scent. This should help eradicate the parasite, which infects more than 200 million people every year, over three times the population of the UK.

Zap your way to a better brain

If you're still in the midst of revision, holed up in the library, cramming equations and formulae into your swollen brain, scientists might have a solution. A team of researchers have studied harmless brain stimulation and found it can be used to improve cognitive ability for up to six months.

The team trained a group of 25 test subjects in mental arithmetic whilst stimulating their brains using a technique called transcranial random noise stimulation (TRNS). In typical sci-fi style, TRNS involves applying DC current to the scalp with electrodes in saline-soaked sponges. The researchers trained the volunteers in arithmetic drills and calculation, involving shallow and deep level brainwork respectively. By stimulating the area of the brain used for tricky arithmetic functions, the researchers found the subjects processed unlearned material better and that 6 months after the TRNS brain-training they retained improvement in the deeper brain cog-

The scientists hope the research could be used to help people who suffer with neurodegenerative illness, strokes or learning difficulties not only in maths but also in other brain functions. Lead researcher Roi Cohen Kadosh said, "Maths is a highly complex cognitive faculty that is based on a myriad of different abilities. If we can enhance mathematics, therefore, there is a good chance that we will be able to enhance simpler cognitive functions"

Improvement in long-term cognitive ability

TRNS could lead to a new type of learning and education, which Kadsoh says might help humankind reach their full potential. For now it is still in its testing stages but in the future maybe we'll prime ourselves for revision with a bout of electrode stimulation to ease the revising of all those equations. Perhaps we'll even reduce the number of hours we spend fortressed on the Library's fifth floor...



Big Headlines & Little Englanders

Padraic Calpin gives you an update on recent happenings in British politics.

Though everyone seems to be resigned to the Coalition trundling along to 2015, there's still a bite to British (though perhaps more specifically English) politics. It's been a tumultuous month, with waves of Tory rebellion unsettling David Cameron and the guffawing face of Farage barely off the front pages.

From Eastleigh to the Third of May

The focus of all the noise is a newly buoyant UKIP, having jumped 6-8 points in opinion polls in the last couple of weeks after some years bubbling around 10% support. The sudden surge came just as English voters prepared to go to the polls and elect their district and county councillors, and appeared to be more than borne out; UKIP secured some 23% of the vote, gaining 139 councillors and splitting majorities in traditional Conservative heartlands such as Kent and Lincolnshire.

The trouble began in March, in

the by-election held following Chris Huhne's sentencing over swapping speeding points. Eastleigh, nestled in the county of Hampshire, has been a Lib-Dem seat since '94, with the bulk of the vote split between the two Coalition partners. But, a bullish UKIP turned the tables, cutting swathes out of the Lib-Dem and Tory vote to soar into second place, some 24 points higher than their result in 2010.

Despite Eastleigh being fought overwhelmingly on local concerns, it prompted a bout of back-bench grumbling within the Conservatives that has kept UKIP on the front pages for weeks. As the murmurs of dissent seep further up the party, every article speculates on attempts to woo voters; the Tories and the British press seem to be doing UKIP's work for them.

At the heart of the unrest is Europe, something Cameron hoped to have laid to rest in January with a promised referendum. And yet, while Eastleigh's UKIP supporters spoke of fears about immigration and unemployment, the EU question seemed curiously absent. Polling from IPSOS Mori reveals it's in fact only the 5th most important issue to a UKIP voter, well behind other factors. But, while Cameron did offer words on being tough on crime in the run up to the local elections, it was all but drowned out amidst the EU

4 Party **Politics?**

As the results rolled in, the media commentariat were quick to pronounce the arrival of '4 Party Politics' to the UK; once again, it seemed people were vying to make UKIP's PR team redundant. Because, away from the press and the Conservative rebels fanning the flames, the actual hard data from the local elections doesn't support such a statement.

For one, these were English elections. In Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland 4 party politics has long been a reality. What's more, in Scotland and Northern Ireland, UKIP's poll performance is poor to nonexistent. Just last week Farage found himself surrounded by an antagonistic crowd in Edinburgh, who were quick to dismiss his accusations of being "Anti-English", insisting they were protesting his "Bigoted, English Nationalism".

Then there's the results themselves. Whereas their overall performance, gaining around a quarter of the vote, is certainly significant, the council by council breakdown reveals a much more fractured picture.

Rural English counties are a long standing Tory heartland; even in the north of England, councils are historically split with 'No Overall Control' by a single party. In these contested Northern counties, UKIP registered some 2 new councillors out of 433 up for election. In the west Midlands, too, gains were modest; 2 seats here, 6 there.

It was in the east Midlands and South that UKIP made a significant showing, edging into Conservative majorities and, in places such as Norfolk and Lincolnshire, pulling enough councillors to nudge the county into 'No Overall Control'.

So, the overall picture given by the data is UKIP edging into councils across England, often where they previously had no councillors whatsoever, and in a few regions becoming a significant opposition. And yet, when considering the significance of all this we have to remember that these elections are only in rural England, in Tory heartlands.

The seats UKIP won were leached away from the Conservatives; in more Labour leaning counties, UKIP made no appearance whatsoever. In many regions, Labour also increased its share of councillors. And in the South Shield's by-election, triggered by David Miliband's resignation and held

on the same day, the UKIP surge was driven by huge cuts into the Coalition parties, with Labour's vote share barely dented.

Bursting the Bubble

The South Shields result in particular gives a picture of the reality of the UKIP position. Their appearance in the local elections is significant, but it does not translate into a party on the verge of entering Westminster. Pulling predominantly from dissatisfied Tory voters, UKIP hasn't so much surged as poked its nose in, doubtless benefiting from the free publicity afforded by the Conservative rebellion.

I still cherish the memory of the first meeting of the IC Heads of Departments I attended - it was both educational and amusing.. Having received the invitation, my predecessor immediately tried to dissuade me from accepting it; nobody expected the Librarian to discuss College business, shamefully I would be the odd one out among the Heads.

Naturally, I immediately decided to go, taking the risk to be the odd one out, not on account of being the Librarian but being the only woman on the list of participants. The Rector, Eric Ash, was the first person to realize this, valiantly rising to the challenge: after rapping his gavel and emitting a stentorian cry: "Gentlemen", he looked at me and added "and Magda". The discussion included, as almost always, the financial prospects of the College; how much income the departments were expected to earn, and how the departments which did not bring in sufficient money would be supported. The Library was always a special case because of the disproportionately high cost of scientific journals, but everyone around the table agreed that journals were the life-blood of research and that their subscription must continue.

We also debated the position of HOST (History of Science and Technology), the relatively modest cost of maintaining three to four members of staff teaching and undertaking research which was acknowledged as



outstanding and seamlessly fitting into the high academic standard of the College. To my amazement and delight, the Heads of the major, internationally respected departments stood up, one after the other and declared their support for HOST. They firmly stated that current achievements in science had been built on the foundation laid by our predecessors. That there is a continuity of scientific discoveries, and that the past belongs to us, it is therefore our duty to keep its memory alive. What better way to do that than to maintain HOST? I felt that I was witnessing something unique: the declaration of solidarity of scientists both past

It was, therefore, with great sadness

that I have learned of the transfer of HOST to King's College London. I am sure that there must have been a serious debate in College regarding the decision and it is not my intension to question why this had to happen. The memory of that Heads of Departments meeting, however, will stay with me forever, the image of a magnanimous College firmly believing in "one culture" - science and arts combined which few institutions were ever able to demonstrate. What remains now is to say farewell to HOST, wishing it a happy and prosperous future - alas, in another institution. Magda Czigány




Shirley Tucker

The Bell Jar by Sylvia Plath featured a cover designed in 1966 by Shirley Tucker. Sylvia Plath's only novel, published in the UK a month before her suicide, details the protagonist Esther Greenwood's descent into clinical depression.

The bleak outlook is perfectly encapsulated in the strikingly contemporary cover design by graphic artist Tucker. The bold, modernist text set above a graphic image of concentric circles, creates a strong visual effect. Like all great covers, it doesn't explicitly describe the plot, but rather hints at the story contained within.

She was originally never credited with the design, a happily defunct convention. Her name now features in all modern editions.



Boris Vallejo

Boris Valejio is the undisputed king of hyper-representational fantasy and sci-fi art. His gleefully effusive works have graced the covers of numerous pulp fiction paperbacks, none of which you are likely to have read. Often working with his wife as muse and collaborator the pair's execution is immaculate.

Boris' familiarity with human form so complete he seems to effortlessly inject near fatal quantities of erotic potency into his oil paintings. His sylphine, alabaster warrior princesses and axe-wielding beef-cake barbarians may seem dated, but for pure red-blooded thrills they have never been surpassed.



Michael Mitchell

Almost as mysterious as Sainger himself E. Mishael Mitchell is hard to get a handle on. Yet the reclusive illustrator is responsible for the cover on of the most revered pieces of modern American literature, *The Catcher in the Rye*.

The bold design is representative of the rest of his body of work which features bold avant guard pen and ink drawings. Mitchel spent much of his career as an instructor at California Institute of the Arts. Where he built a formidable reputation with his students. Mitchell passed away in 2009 at 89, never again ascending so high in the popular imagination.

David Pelham

As leader of Penguin's design team from the early 70's David Pelham was responsible for most of Penguin book's fiction. He did a number of brilliantly eye catching designs for J G Ballards paperbacks amongst many others.

Most famously Pelham designed the iconic cover for Anthony Burgess' A Clockwork Orange. The Cog-eyed Droog design instantly became a design classic and informed much of the subsequent imagery that surrounded the book and film.

The minimal design and sinister featureless face evokes a disturbing otherworldly sense that compliments the content of the book.



Chip Kidd

Many of the illustrators on this list have sunk into relative anonymity. Chip Kidd is certainly not one of these. His flamboyant confidence and marketing acuity have seen him rise to the top of Random House's design team. An early work that cemented his reputation was his design for Michael Crichton's fated publication *Jurassic Park*.

The design was so popular it came to represent the entire franchise that followed, including the three Hollywood films, making Kidd, we suspect, a very wealthy designer.

Like many of Kidd's covers the image is simple, striking and creepy. Kidd himself has said that "I'm very much against the idea that the cover will sell the book".

Michael Gillette



Sometimes a young or unrecognisable designer just happens to hit upon an absolute classic. Michael Gillette's series of covers for lan Fleming's Bond novels was one of those times. The covers were commissioned to celebrate the centenary of lan Fleming's birth in 2008.

Everything is perfect from the bold lines and bright colours to the typography. The images proved extremely popular and were made available as prints and translated into a variety of languages. They feature delicate, smouldering sexy retrotastic representations of the girls in each book. "None of them are based on any one person or image, they are archetypes. I wanted a look of seductive murder about them," he says.

Josh Kirby



Terry Pratchett was the best selling author of the nineties. The man who put a cover on every one of his books until his death in 2001 was the otherwise relatively obscure artist Josh Kirby. His highly distinctive paintings perfectly caught the quirky, caricatured madness of Pratchett's early *Discworld* novels.


Working in oils, his busy, slightly grotesque depictions of the characters in the books perfectly caught the surreal atmosphere of the strange comicfantasies. Perhaps this is why Kirby was also chosen to design the poster art for *Monty Python's Life of Brian*.

Francis Cugat

The painting for the first printing of F Scott Fitzgerald's seminal work *The Great Gatsby* may be one of the few examples in history of book covers actually influencing the writing of the book. The highly symbolic illustration features a pair of female eyes beaming mournfully through a night sky. The eyes hide reclining nude figures and hover above a bright metropolitan carnival. Fitzergeral maintains that the image was written into the final draft of the book possibly in the image of Dr. T. J. Eckleburg billboard eyes.

Cugat went on to work on art for over 68 Hollywood films but it is for this work, the most widely disseminated cover art of the 20th Century.



Paul Bacon

Paul Bacon designed over 6500 book covers in his career. With a portfolio of that size one could argue that a big hit was inevitable. Bacon also illustrated for Jack Kerouac and John Cleever but it was his work for Joseph Heller's *Catch 22* this is considered by many to be the most memorable.

Bacon was known for pioneering the "Big Book Look," characterised by the title and author's name in large, bold print, accompanied by a small conceptual illustration. He would work for around three weeks on each book, saying his skill lay in "finding something that would be a synthesis graphically of what the story was about". His jazz record cover designs are also worth a look.

Maurice Sendak

Where the Wild Things Are has sold 19 million copies worldwide since its publication in 1956. This extraordinary success marks it as one of the most popular children's book of all time.

Uniquely for this list, the illustration and writing are all the work of one man Maurice Sendak. Sendak includes Disney and Mozart amongst his influences yet his books were so visually striking these are difficult to justify. The story describes the escape of a small boy into a land populated with strange beasts, actually caricatures of his family.

Sendak famously refused to write a sequel, announcing just before his death in 2012 that this would be "the most boring idea imaginable".

Mo Mirza gets within touching distance of Kurt Vile in Camden

he gig was hosted at Barfly which provided an intimate setting, for what
was a show for competition winners. Kurt Vile
had not brought a backing band
along on this occasion and he made
everyone wait. The crowds were a
bunch of happy campers though –
true to the stoner spirit. They did
not mind one bit as Vile spent some
time tuning his guitar on stage and
repeatedly asked his sound engineer
for "more reverb, yeaa!"

Hailing from Philadelphia, Vile was initially a part of **The War on Drugs** which was followed by constant touring with his backing band **The Violators**. His writings come across as incoherent, yet purposefully poetic and although he lands his words in a leisurely way, boy, do

they pack a punch. Vile's songs are unhurried and spacious and have uncanny knack for conveying his deep meanderings.

I found his previous album *Smoke Ring for My Halo* absolutely superb and the appearance of a few choice songs, such as the blissful 'Jesus Fever' and loving 'Baby's Arms', made my night. One admirable thing to note about Kurt Vile is that even though he comes across as overt about religion, it never really becomes annoying. He somehow manages to sing his praises, and not detract from the musical experience – that is pretty rare.

Once tuned to perfection, Vile's guitar squeaked awake as he shared his stoner wisdom with 'Wakin' on a Pretty Day', a song from his fifth latest studio album *Wakin on a Pretty*

Daze. "Phone ringing off the shelf..." he sang, epitomizing his laid-back nature.

He continued on to play some more people pleasers which lulled the crowd into a pretty daze. A kind of seduction by soothing is how one could describe it. 'Peeping Tomboy', also from *Smoke Ring for My Halo*, came across as a crowd favourite with quite a few happy campers chiming in to Vile's dulcet tones.

With no backing band most of what Kurt plays has a more subtle and easy going feel to it than what you hear in the album versions. Perhaps this is what he intended. In Vile's head, there is all the time in the world and no need for rushin' and the crowd acknowledged that.

Like most geniuses Kurt's mutterings are very erratic, some of them



incredible and some not so. His live performances are, however, undoubtedly exceptional and I am totally looking forward to seeing him rock out once more at the Field Day festival tomorrow. Yeaa!

Ensemble Pearl – Ensemble Pearl

Ensemble Pearl is a thoroughly dark album featuring some big names in modern avant-garde metal. Steve O'Malley of Sunn O))) is the best known, but two members of Boris, the Japanese noise rock band, are also present (drummer Atsuo and live guitarist Michio Kurihara). Former bassist of Jesse Sykes & the Sweet Hereafter, Bill Herzog, is the only musician that might seem out of place.



The four of them set out to make a careful masterpiece of ominous music like nothing they've written before. This is saying a lot, as O'Malley and Boris' music has touched upon everything heavy and unholy. Ensemble Pearl is instead a collection of slow, doomy instrumentals, fleshed out with gloomy textures. Drums keep a steady dirge pace yet feel loose and improvisational. Melodies and riffs take minutes to play out and run their course through moods both dark and ambiguous. The mix never becomes muddied by an overdose of pedals or laptop effects. Dissonance is not constant, such that the listener is not exhausted by offensive sounds, but this does not stop Kurihara occasionally lashing out with incredibly loud, fuzzed guitar solos that the rest of the band are unshaken by.

Tracks average 8-10 minutes with the final chapter, "Sexy Angle", playing for a monumental 20 minutes, climaxing in a solo at its 13th minute that could be mistaken for a small child, screaming. In the song's quieter moments, an assortment of drones rise up from the background, and individual snares and toms are delayed separately from the rest of the drum kit, making the band feel like much more than four players.

Some of the album's best parts are those where the atmosphere surfaces from its darkest moments. The best example of this is "Wray", a beatless track focused on string drones and heavily sampled koto plucks, evoking a different, lighter mood, becoming almost ambient. A casual listener might fault the album on being too consistent, or simply be disappointed that the result isn't "heavy" enough, given the talent present. It's simply heavy in a different manner – a slow, suffocating manner, rather than the blistering noise that Boris and Sunn O))) have been treating our ears with for years. Ensemble Pearl highlights a progression from doom metal to something more mature and agonising.

Melvins: Live Review

The Melvins have long since become an institution, one of the most influential bands in modern rock. In recent years however, they have not simply been resting on the laurels of their classic albums, but exploring new territory and breaking new ground. Their album as Melvins Lite, a stripped down form of the Melvins with Ipecac favourite Trevor Dunn on double bass is one example, another is their record breaking 51 states in 51 days tour last year. It must be said, however, that a bit of retrogression from a band as great as them is always appreciated, so it was much to the delight of many when two shows consisting of Lysol/Houdini and Stoner Witch/Bullhead played in succession were announced.

Trust me, it was a tough decision, Stoner Witch is probably the most varied of the four, and the opening track on Bullhead is so good Boris named themselved after it. After much deliberation, however, I went to the Lysol/ Houdini night.

As anyone familiar with the Melvins knows, I was greeted by the sight of four rather eccentric looking guys. If I seem abnormally focussed on their appearances, it's merely because I want the uninitiated to know how hilarious the Melvins can be. Buzzo wore a robe and his sideshow Bob-like mane flopped to punctuate the dropping of every riff, and I'm pretty sure one of the drummers, Dale Crover, was wearing some kind of tunic.

One major difference is that since 2006 Coady Willis (formerly of Big Business) has been in the band as a second drummer and there is no doubt that having two drummers contributed to the enormity of their sound as much as it did to the visual presentation, with Willis being left handed creating a sort of mirror image between the 2 halves of the stage, where the four piece played standing in a row, rather than most rock bands, who simply hide the drummer in the back somewhere.

The set opened with Lysol and possibly the highlight of the night. 'Hung Bunny, the opener of the album and an absolute monolith was hugely enhanced by massive drums and a punchy bass rumble that practically had me shaking. Indeed, the sound over the






whole night was excellent; incredibly loud, with guitar tones forming carefully controlled, resonant feedback at many points.

Their rendition of Lysol continued very much in this vein. In other words, it was truly crushing, with a tangible feeling of euphoria in the audience any time they dropped a great track, which was pretty much all of them. 'The Ballad Of Dwight Fry' provided a rare moment of relaxation amongst this barrage of powerful, sludgy riffs. This response continued throughout the night, throughout their rendition of Houdini. This is considered their landmark album and generally the first album anyone hears, so I'm sure it invited some nostalgia for more or less everyone there. For those not aware, this album is more rocky and less sludgy than its predecessor. The bassy excellence of 'Night Goat' or the particularly catchy 'Lizzy' stood out for

The set ended on a powerful note with 'Spread Eagle Beagle,' as Buzz left the stage, leaving the two drummers and bassist Jared Warren, (also formerly of Big Business) who was clad in american football padding made out of a cardboard box. then proceeded to enter the crowd screaming vocals which heavily distorted themselves, decaying into feedback (possibly with



some kind of delay pedal), before it was left with just the drummers, as in the album itself, trading fills and gradually fading out. A truly outstanding performance from one of rock's best loved institutions. Equal parts humour, rock n' roll showmanship, and familiar, punishing riffs.

The Melvins have recently released a cover album Everybody Love Sausages on Ipecac.

Fresh from playing the Alexandra Palace with Everything Everything and Two Door Cinema Club the trio Chvrches came to the Village Underground with the weight of expectation lying squarely on their shoulders. They recently won best new non-US band at SXSW and made it into the top 5 of the BBC's sound of 2013. Little surprise then that the gig sold out in minutes and the queues to get in started an hour before doors opened

Through the delicate vocals of Lauren Mayberry and pulsing synths of Martin Doherty and Iain Cook, Chvrches have found a winning formula. Critics have drawn comparisons between them and the Canadian duo Purity Ring, but live the ominous bass sounds more like an epic blend with their fellow Glaswegians Mogwai.

Her immaculate delivery and presence really captured the hearts of the audience, as did her playful banter on themes as diverse as Game of Thrones (their cover of the theme went viral on YouTube), kittens

with laser pointers and boy bands in the audience. Add to that her ability as an intriguing lyricist and Chvrches have found a new indie heart-throb.

To round off the evening Mayberry performed (as promised) a karaoke version of **Little Kim**'s 'Lady Marmalade' rap followed by a stunning cover of Prince's 'I would die 4 U', a song which could have been written for this band. So did Chvrches live up to the hype? Although they aren't quite the finished article yet a fantastic gig showcased their massive potential and left the audience hungry for more.

There were concerns over Jackson splitting a rather thin book into three films but this gamble seems to have paid off since the first in a trilogy has already made a billion. No matter how long or seemingly dull, Jackson's visual mastery is always worth catching on the big screen. This also enjoyed the big Christmas and end-of-year push, typically the hot-spots for studios to release their big epic films. And let's not forget about the brilliant Andy Serkis, without whom Gollum wouldn't exist.



14. Alice in Wonderland

Worldwide gross: \$1,024,299,904

Why? Summer came early in 2010 as audiences rushed to the screens to keep their important date with Tim Burton and Johnny Depp. The Burton-Depp pairing is one that is hugely appealing given the right accessible source material (so no, films like Ed Wood don't cross the billion mark). This was smartly marketed by Disney as a colourful, all-round fun experience for the whole family, whilst also cashing in on the then-newly booming business of adding an extra dimension and therefore throwing in some glasses and a couple of quid to the ticket prices. Outstanding international ticket sales came from Japan, where it grossed \$130 million + (its 11th best non-Japanese film).



13. Star Wars Episode I: The Phantom Menace

Worldwide gross: \$1,027,044,677

Why? Everyone loves to hate the new Star Wars films, and it all started here, with a billion-dollar grossing prequel. George Lucas, in his high and mighty standing in Hollywood, was paid an unbelievable sum of \$400,000,000 in total for his efforts on the film - that's more than a lot of films even dream of making in their run. Because of the phenomenal hype surrounding the film, few major studios dared releasing anything in the same week as Lucas' big space comeback. An estimated number of 2.2 million fulltime employees missed work days to attend the film - it was that much of an exciting film event. The 2012 3D re-release helped surpass one billion.



7. Skyfall

Worldwide gross: \$1,108,561,013

Why? 007 was in dire need of a fresh new start even since Quantum of Solace came out and ruined whatever good that was set up from Casino Royale. With Sam Mendes stepping into the director role, Daniel Craig returning, a meaty sub-plot for the fiercely talented national treasure Judi Dench, plus that Adele song, many agree that Skyfall is the best 007 film yet. As UK's highest grossing film of all time, 007's home country added a whopping \$160 million + to its international total, and the rest of Europe (France and Germany in particular) followed, with China also not far behind. With Christopher Nolan now in talks to direct the next one, can this record be broken in a few years' time?



6. The Lord of the Rings: The Return of the King

Worldwide gross: \$1,119,929,521

Why? Peter Jackson's Lord of the Rings trilogy came to a fantastic close with Return of the King, where epic battles and emotions swept across the screen over a 3-hour running time - the build-up from The Fellowship of the Ring and The Two Towers paid off here, and sweeping the Academy Awards in 2004 gave the film an everso slight bump in the box office. The Christmas/end-of-year season was also in play here, as well as the promise of a grand scale and extraordinary spectacle. One of the earliest to cross the billion mark, when 3D wasn't in use, this is no doubt Jackson's biggest accomplishment.



5. Transformers: Dark of the Moon

Worldwide gross: \$1,123,745,996

Why? Critics hate Michael Bay, but that's of no trouble or any consequence to the director, as he will always have his loyal followers of action-junkies who only ask for some dumb fun, which is exactly what is delivered here. "I make movies for teenage boys. Oh, dear, what a crime" he says, and it appears this is his motto for making any of his films. But kudos to him - many of his films are consistently regarded as box office success stories and ideal for summer audiences, where students are out of school. The Asian market (China, South Korea) gave some significant input too, where the robot franchise is hugely popular.



4. Harry Potter and the Deathly Hallows Part 2

Worldwide gross: \$1,341,511,219

Why? The final film of one of the most successful film franchises in history, this finale conjured up \$32 million worth of advance tickets, setting a new record, whereas the \$169 million North American opening weekend made history, until it was beaten a year later by a group of superheroes. More impressive (as if the film doesn't have enough to boast about), its worldwide opening of \$483 million in one weekend is still the one to beat. Better luck next time Avengers. Audiences loved seeing Hogwarts get torn apart by evil wizards/witches, and the ensuing battle was suitably thrilling with the large ensemble cast giving it their all.

12. Iron Man 3

Worldwide gross: \$1,035,973,000

Why? It hasn't even been a full month since its release, and yet here sits Tony Stark's third outing, proudly at number 13 in the highest worldwide grossing films of all time. You can expect the film to climb up several spots at the end of this summer. Stark (played by the irreplaceable Robert Downey Jr.) is without a doubt the most popular character of the Marvel Universe, and given the great big success of Avengers Assemble, immediately following that recordbreaker no doubt helped boost the overall numbers. It's raking in money from China (\$64 million + opening weekend - highest ever), after a special-cut featuring local actors and scenes appear to be going down well with audiences there.



11. Pirates of the Caribbean: On Stranger Tides

Worldwide gross: \$1,043,871,802

Why? After the dud that was At World's End where very little made sense, Disney commissioned another outing for Captain Jack Sparrow (Johnny Depp - always the reliable blockbuster box office draw), retaining very few of its original characters (Geoffrey Rush stayed on - hurrah). Business in the States was disappointing to say the least, falling massively short of its predecessors, but it's the international market that contributed to \$800 million of its total gross. Italy poured in an impressive \$108 million into the final count, with the next highest coming from China with \$70 million.



10. Toy Story 3

Worldwide gross: \$1,063,171,911

Why? Dubbed as a film that would make even grown men cry, this was one of the best reviewed films of 2010 (Rottentomatoes places a 99% fresh rating), as well as the highest grossing film of 2010 (both in the States and internationally). The kids loved it, and frankly, so did the adults, with many young adults reminiscing the days they watched their first two Toy Story films as children back in the 90s. Everyone loves and trusts Pixar to come up with something witty and heart-warming time and time again. Also benefitting from the 3D push, it had very little competition (if at all) in its first two weeks (Jonah Hex, Grown Ups, Knight & Day), in which the film generated \$250 million in the States alone.



9. Pirates of the Caribbean: Dead Man's Chest

Worldwide gross: \$1,066,179,725

Why? The Curse of the Black Pearl was such a huge hit that greenlighting sequels couldn't have been a difficult decision - and with the full cast on board, only success was in store for this immediate sequel. Its 2006 opening numbers, \$135 million, was a record-setter, smashing Spider-man's 4-year reign at that point. It ruled the top for three straight weeks, and was the fastest film to earn \$100 million, \$200 million and \$300 million back in 2006 (all these records have since been smashed but for a non-3D, nonsuperhero themed picture, this was quite an achievement seven years



8. The Dark Knight Rises

Worldwide gross: \$1,084,439,099

Why? The Aurora shooting might have put a bit of a dent in the North American box office numbers (this one falls \$90 million short from its predecessor in the States) but any film with words "Christopher Nolan" and "epic conclusion" was bound to make a boat-load of cash and it did. with its top foreign market coming from the United Kingdom with a final tally of \$90 million + (2nd best of 2012). Its rather long running time (165 minutes) as well as its dark, depressing undertone were not at all off-putting it seems, and very loyal online fanboys (there are lots) were ferociously attacking anyone who had a bad word to say about the film.



3. Avengers Assemble

Worldwide gross: \$1,511,757,910

Why? Raking in \$207 million, this holds the record for the best North American opening. Ever since the first couple of *Iron Man* films convinced Marvel to pursue something bigger and bolder, every film before Avengers Assemble (Thor, Captain America, The Incredible Hulk) has been hinting at a possible massive group project. Finally hitting the screens in 2012, Joss Wheon of Buffy/ Angel/Firefly fame certainly did not disappoint. Undoubtedly the biggest movie event of 2012, a long list of records were smashed, although it didn't fly as high as some were anticipating (i.e. didn't reach number 1 internationally). But being number 3 is still incredible, and with a seguel on the way, perhaps that can aim higher.



2. Titanic

Worldwide gross: \$2,185,372,302

Why? From this point on, we're only dealing with films that have crossed the TWO billion dollar line. Only two films have done so, both directed by the same man, James Cameron that show-off. Well, where to start with this one – there was the Leo-fever, where women worldwide couldn't get enough of its leading star, Leonardo DiCaprio, there was that song 'My Heart Will Go On', the tragic love story, plus the final spectacular hour of where the ship sinks, killing a whole load of people along with it. This holds the record for spending the most number of consecutive weeks (15) at the number one spot in the North American box office, and even in its 3D re-release. people loved it – 15 years on.



1. Avatar

Worldwide gross: \$2,782,275,172

Why? It's the same pattern with James Cameron – there is a lot of talk surrounding his new project, because it's so ambitious. A trailer is released, everyone hates it and guarantees that his latest big-budget epic will tank severely and won't make any money. And yet once released, he's the king of the world. (Unadjusted for inflation), no film in the history of Hollywood has crossed \$700 million in America, and neither has foreign gross crossed \$2 billion, until Cameron came along with his blue Na'vis and took over the 2009 Christmas season with his new film. Despite stiff competition from Sherlock Holmes and Alvin and the Chipmunks, audiences just could not be kept away from what would become the biggest film of all time.

Letty (Rodriguez) died. She died right in front of our eyes when she was shot after a car-flip. We know it, the characters know it, but running out of fresh new ideas to carry on with the popular vehicular franchise, they have decided to bring her back from the dead. But rest assured that this isn't the most absurd thing you'll see in the film. See, The Fast & the

Furious series isn't exactly known for its credibility: the more it embraces its stupidity and its tight, succinct structure, the better.

And to be fair, having Rodriguez rock up out of the blue isn't all that bad, since she was an invaluable original cast member - plus as a strong grounded female, she gets to go up against ex-MMA fighter Carano in one memorable, merciless fist-fight taking place in the London Underground of all places. She's also a great excuse for Dom (Diesel) and his gang to come back into the racing game, even though they promised to leave this life behind after the birth of Brian's (Walker) baby boy.

Turns out Letty is caught up in some illegal activities with notorious international criminal Owen Shaw (Luke Evans) who is waging "vehicular warfare" against the good guys. He drives a fancy, modified racing car with a neatly equipped trick of flipping over any car that races towards him. And it's Dom's job to bring her

back, since she's "family". That f-word gets tossed around so much here that by the end of it all, you'll get pretty sick of hearing it, especially since it fills up so many chunks that needlessly slows everything down as a

With so many good guys turning up to form a united front, it's the main antagonist who has hardly any room for himself. Evans, although an effectively smooth-talking baddie, never has the chance to flourish. As a former-SAS you'd think he has more to offer than some driving moves and aside from a brief showdown between him and Diesel, all Evans has to do is to deliver some smug dialogue, something he has no problem with handling.

Each good guy has something to bring to the film: Tyrese Gibson and Ludacris are mostly there for comic relief (some hits, some misses), Sung Kang and have a love story going on, Dwayne Johnson and Diesel flex their muscles, Walker is the eye-candy for the ladies who doesn't have much to do in the end, whereas Rodriguez and Carano show that girl-fights can be as brutal, if not more, than boy-fights.

It's over-crowded and overlong, and the Rock's grossly enlarged arms deserve their own end-credit mention (would NOT like to look at those under IMAX conditions), but any film that pairs up Diesel and Dwayne Johnson for a smack-down is bound to be enjoyable - which is exactly what this is all about. Forget about logic, forget about how two race cars can slide and glide around the busy, busy central London (Piccadilly Circus to be precise), the point is, "they've got a tank" - and that's really all you need to know.

And for die-hard fans of the franchise, rest assured that the sixth outing will not be this crew's last, as the big cliffhanger in a post-credits scene shows us, there is one more vengeful antagonist for Dom to deal with, played by a charismatic actor who is very good at what he does




It's worrying how very few jokes

St Mary's put to the sword

In a near-repeat performance of his previous match as captain, stand-in skipper Vignesh Venkateshwaran led a squad with a depleted batting line up to a 58-run victory over a muchvaunted St. Mary's side who had recorded some big wins of their own leading up to this match.
