FAULTY FREMANTLE

Up to twenty freshers are getting their first taste of College life by being forced to accept unsafe and substandard accommodation in the Fremantle Hotel.

A report on the hotel by the College Estates Section revealed that rooms were riddled with dry rot and rain water was seeping into rooms on the top floor through the roof. The damp in some rooms was so bad that mould and fungi was growing on the walls.

The poor state of repair of the Fremantle was bought to the attention of Michael Arthur, Student Services Officer, as early as July. Mr Arthur asked the landlords of the Fremantle to make the necessary repairs but nothing was done for four months. With the start of term rapidly approaching College put further pressure on the landlords by threatening to withdraw from the Fremantle and eventually hurried repairs were made.

Mr Arthur settled for what many people involved with the Fremantle see as a totally botched job. A number of cosmetic repairs were rushed by the landlords in just two days. The damp and dry rot had merely been painted over and alterations to the roof were next to useless.

Matters were so bad that last week ICU President

Gaynor Lewis did not want students to be put into the rooms. However she was persuaded against her better judgement by Michael Arthur to rent the substandard accommodation to students desperate for somewhere to live.

The hotel was leased to College last year by the Astor Hotel group with the knowledge that there were a num-

ber of faults. Despite this the Hotel was taken because it was felt that it provided reasonably cheap and convenient accommodation for students. It seems the gamble has not paid off with some quite serious structural faults coming to light.

An authoritative source in the Estate Section said that the cosmetic repairs made by the landlords would not last more than a few weeks. The approaching cold weather and rain would restart the same problems.

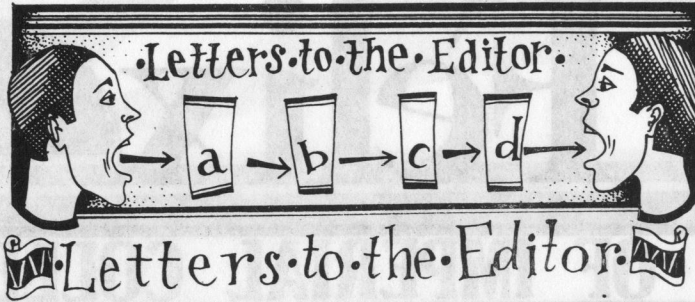

Slug Speaks Out

I am writing concerning the IC Union Handbook which I have just read. To clarify matters to the recent arrivals at College, to whom the Handbook was sent, the Handbook Editor was Adrian James, the previous news editor on FELIX. I would hope he has not benefitted from the excellence of reporting and intrigue for which FELIX is always advertised. I suspect that a large part of the Handbook was not edited by Mr James but written



by him, and through this, the emphasis and accuracy of the information, when related to the medium may be questionable. I would refer you to the article on bars: re Southside "Most students take their drinks to the Upper Lounge." This is an obvious factual inaccuracy when calculated on pure numbers; if however it refers to Mr James' friends then that is conceivable. Re the Union Bar: "This is where most of the heavy drinking in College goes on. On Barnights (organised by CCUs and various College drinking clubs) this place should be avoided. At all other times it is bearable." Digest for a moment; I will return to the inaccuracies but first to the emphasis. This College has seen a dramatic decline in the standard and fortunes of the Union Bar over the past five years. It used to contain many people on every evening and was full at least three times a week. The bar's quintessential flavour was generated by the number of people and the character of those people who used it. This does not mean that barnight behaviour was the norm for every night, nor would one wish it to be so; though it was certainly not the place for those wishing to discuss the aesthetic properties of a pile of bricks over two hours and a half of bitter shandy.

The decline has been due to the increase in pressure on students related to work and employment, the increase in entrance standards and hence the change in the balance of characters (not individuals but types) at College and the bar management. The various relative influences of these factors I leave to other people. I feel we would do no one a service by dissuading them from entering the Union Bar; as a student bar the union is entering its death throws, and as such we should encourage its resurrection, by increased custom. I would suggest the very times Mr James advocates attendance, when it is

populated by workmen, scaffolders, builders, estates and a few 'train spotters' perhaps the odd orchestra, is the very time to put people off; if they have received the understanding that this is the better side and true nature of the Union Bar. I would concede that occasions such as bar nights are also not to be treated as the average or the best. Let the Union revert to the full, lively knock-about bar that it was of yesteryear; releasing the others to serve the customers for which they were intended.

Returning to the accuracy of the quote, I think I understand those to whom he incorrectly alludes as 'drinking clubs'; though it is certain they have never organised a 'bar night'. If they had, and half of that which is attributed to them was true, coupled with their perceived false reputations, it would have been an event which might have caused a holocaust to worry even CND. Further, with the RSMU's preference for Southside, I doubt that most of the heavy drinking is now done in the Union.

To those reading the Union Handbook I would suggest caution in accepting Mr James' view of College and would encourage them to find out for themselves, with an open mind.

Mick Gets the Boot

Rape Alarm

The Executive Committee of IC Union has overturned a decision by Deputy President Christine Teller to charge a £4 deposit for all rape alarms.

Union Council policy is to issue rape alarms to any woman who wishes to have one. Since there was no provision in Union funds for this kind of expenditure, Miss Teller decided to charge a £4 deposit to those requiring a rape alarm. The deposit would be refunded when the rape alarm was returned.

The objection at the Exec meeting was raised by Mike Stuart Guilds President since he felt that her action was going directly against Council policy.

Miss Teller will now not be ordering any more rape alarms since she feels that she cannot find the money to pay for them.

There have been ten cases of rape and violence against women reported over the past fourteen months in Notting Hill, a mere two miles from College. Most alarmingly three rapes have occurred in the last eight weeks.

Police activity has been stepped up in the area, but this may, unfortunately, mean that the rapist may change his territory. So far the police only have a vague description of the 'Beast of Kensington'. His victims could hardly be described as careless about security, so there is extra reason for extreme vigilance.

The rapist's acts have certainly struck a real fear and anxiety in the women of Notting Hill. Let us hope he is soon caught.

Linstead Hall Warden Dr Richard Clarke and Subwarden Raj Chandra are pressing College to reconsider what they believe is an insensitive and rigid application of rules over the messengers system.

They are dismayed that a month ago the Hall messenger, Mr Mick Saul, was suddenly transferred to the Beit Quadrangle. Mr Saul had been Linstead messenger for the last year. Dr Clarke said that in this time he had done an excellent job. His efforts not only saved the Wardens and Housekeeper considerable amounts of time, but made the students feel very much at home.

Mr Saul was moved in a periodic reshuffling of responsibilities in the messenger service. This is a regular procedure according to the Chief Security Officer, Mr Geoffrey Reeves, so that each messenger has detailed

knowledge of at least three buildings, therefore ensuring that a satisfactory service can be provided during holiday and sickness periods.

The timing of the move is unusual in that messengers are normally moved every two years; Mr Saul was at Linstead for just one year.

Linstead Hall is different from other Southside Halls, with its own bar and catering facility, a factor that Dr Clarke feels that College has not fully appreciated.

Mr Saul undertook a number of extra voluntary duties which would not be expected of a messenger but are nevertheless essential for the smooth running of the Hall.

So a demanding lady who has found the first week a little overwhelming, although it wasn't "so much chaos and shambles as I'd been led to believe."

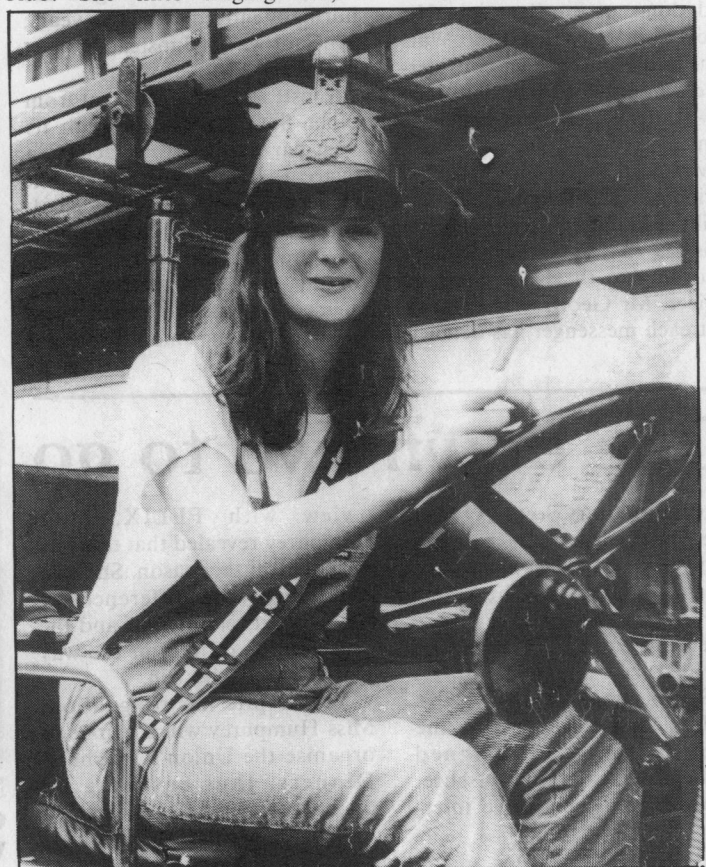

WRITE of REPLY

Dr Simon Perry Chairman of Refectories Committee writes in reply to the criticisms of the College refectories in the IC Union Handbook.

Nobody ever seems to consider the *problems* posed by cooking and serving something like 500,000 meals a year. Dozens of nationalities and religions, changing eating habits, kitchens and refectories designed 30 years ago for supplying breakfast, meat and two veg twice a day. Finding staff to work highly irregular hours and seasons. All within a framework of keeping prices down in an age when all the 'traditional' subsidies have disappeared.

Despite this, the *demand* for meals at Imperial College necessitates *four* main student refectories, at least twice as

many as any other London college. This permits a degree of variety which it is hoped to improve significantly during the coming year; firstly, with freshly cooked pitta-bread kebabs and salad (Union), cooked to order omelettes and grills (Southside evenings), more varied sandwiches and filled French rolls (newly refurbished JCR Buttery); secondly, by appointing (we hope) an additional chef—a man with seven years experience in one of the most world-famous London Hotels, C-----s.

Notwithstanding, you may not like the first College refectory you eat in—then try the next! If you don't like any of them, please tell us why (constructively, svp). The staff/student suggestions and complaints committee (contacted in writing by way of the wall-mounted boxes in refectories) considers every comment or criticism and, whenever practicable or appropriate, takes action on your behalf.

It is only natural to try outside eating places—different surroundings, different styles of food, even for the exercise. Nonetheless, the College Refectory system is run entirely for the benefit of staff and students; it is entirely reliant on *your* support. Please try it; after all, can the eaters of 500,000 meals a year be entirely wrong?

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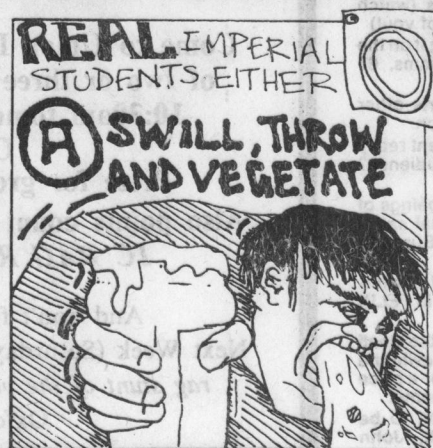
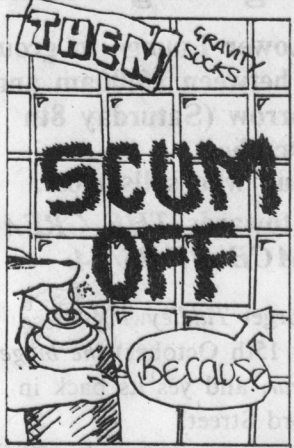

Bluebells ring in New Year

The New Year's Party is never an easy gig for any band with a large proportion of the audience being at the venue for the first time and still suffering from culture (or lack of culture) shock. Dancing does not come easily. Also this was the best organised New Year's Party for at least four years with both bands competing against two discos and other entertainments which also attracted large crowds.

Support band Magic Box had come from Scotland looking for a record deal. Although their music was highly danceable almost everybody stood still and their similarity to Simple Minds in both sight and sound may well work against them in the future. Nevertheless they received a deserved encore.

The Bluebells are also Scottish and play a much more straight forward version of rock'n'roll with two guitars and plenty of harmonica and tambourine. Thankfully they beefed up their sound from their last single, the Alan Tarney produced *Sugar Bridge* (Tarney also produces Leo Sayer and Cliff Richard) which on record was as sweet and insubstantial as its title but live was given a much more satisfying and boisterous treatment.

Tarney was brought in when their first two singles *Forever More* and *Cath* failed to get beyond the lower reaches of the Top 75 but his production methods were no more successful and their debut album, which is due for release early in the new year, will be produced by Colin Townley (producer of Costello's *Pills and Soap*).

A welcome change of pace was *The Patriots Game*, a song by Dominic Behan (brother of the late Irish author Brendan) about a young man joining the IRA. Sung in a slow and regretful voice it is a moving case of disillusionment when the ends don't justify the means.

Although receiving a better reaction than the support, the band were obviously disappointed by the audience whom they later said were "a bit dead".

Their main drawback is that they just want to be a pop group. This has virtually become a two-horse race between the coiffured and costume pop of England and the much more talented sound of young Scotland.

Ironically signed to London records (formerly Decca) the Bluebells are well on their way to success with an American tour coming up. They're signed to Warner Brothers in America and have gained much experience supporting Elvis Costello and Nick Heyward.

Catch that Train

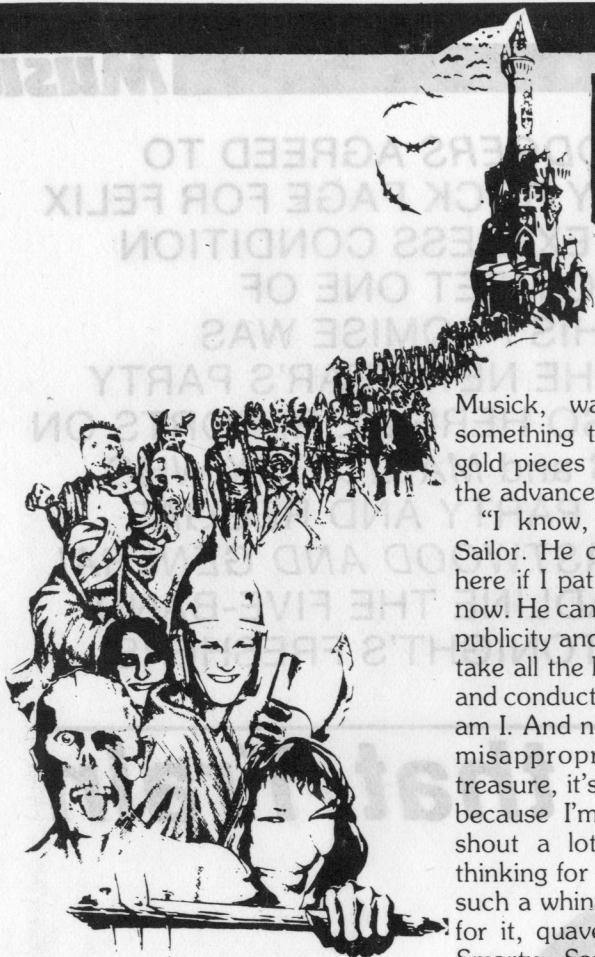

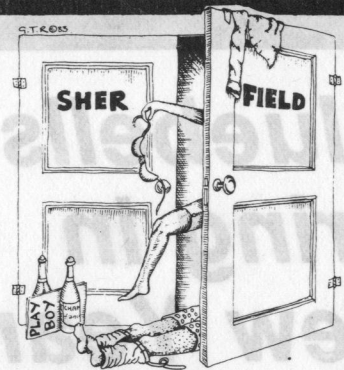

Refectories

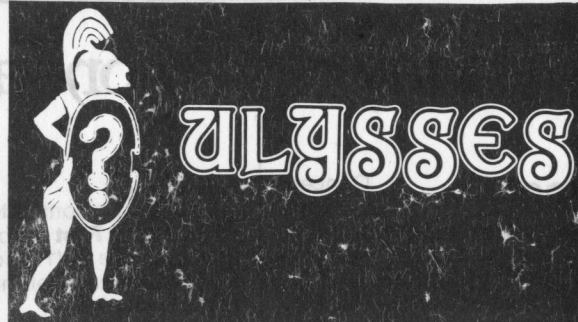
