And Maz knew just what to do!


She phoned the Health Centre in Princes Gardens immediately. Within seconds the receptionist had the answer.



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

A motion was defeated at the UGM on Thursday 6th October by manoeverings using a wild interpretation of the Union standing orders and the now famous Mines block vote. The motion sought to stop the Union selling pornographic entertainment. FELIX has been printing drawings and photographs seeking to provoke emotional replies and fill the letters page. Is it not about time we heard the rational arguments!

I issue a challenge to the Mines Union and to Imperial College Union to defend their position, not with boos and hisses from a 'Save Mines Action Squad' or misuses of the UGM standing orders, but in a formal debate chaired by Debsoc. I personally do not think they can succeed.

British society restricts the sale of pornography. Its laws do not allow anyone under eighteen to buy such material. Shops are not allowed to

exhibit such goods in their windows. The production and importing of pornography is severely restricted.

It is widely recognised that porn is degrading and even corrupting. Most debates revolve around freedom to buy and sell, not the consequences of doing so.

The debate within college, an unavoidable debate so long as Mines continue to sell porn, is whether the arguments behind the British laws are correct. It is not about the individual freedom to buy and sell this material. Students, along with all other British subjects over the age of 18, have the right to buy porn. It is about a democratic body selling pornographic enterrtainment. This means every single member of the Union is a party to its sale. If a Union sells pornography then the organisers cannot be held entirely responsible, for the Union is responsible and the Union is its members, you and me.

Once this is made absolutely clear, the 'fight for freedom' argument is dismissed and all of us are left with the question 'do I want to sell pornography?' To consciously say yes is to ignore the arguments put forward by all governments (including the present one) and this society in general. Your answer cannot be the same as the pornographic industry's as you personally do not benefit from the sales. The only rational motive can be that you wish to further the interests of the industry because it is good. You wish to tell everyone 'I am for porn because it is good.'

So long as Mines and Imperial College Union express their active support for this industry, then we as individuals do. So long as this situation remains we should do our utmost to change it. We should express in words what is expressed so well in actions, that our Union supports pornography.



CLINT EASTWOOD, GENERAL SAINT AND A CAST OF 1000

Well over one thousand people attended the Freshers' Ball last Friday as Clint Eastwood and General Saint played the best gig this College has seen for years. There were other bands, discos and films as well and our reporter Peter Rodgers who saw most of it. He only left when faced with the prospect of seeing Cat People for the third time.

There was a touch of everything at the Freshers' Ball: some good, some bad but nothing ugly. I'm afraid I missed the first band *The Primary* but reports were favourable. To make amends their debut single will be reviewed next week.

Crazeology had just toppled their keyboards when I arrived so the bassist (very out of date—cycling gear was featured in last month's FACE) told everyone they could dance because there was still bass and drums. Unfortunately the soulless sanitised sound didn't offer much temptation to do this and they lacked the imagination to inspire with their seemingly improvised sound.

However at least they were trying something new which is more than can be said for the *Blue Orphans* who stood in for the Watuzi Brothers at the last minute. 99% perspiration and 1% inspiration they may have been but genius they bertainly were not. Apparently quite a few A&R men from various record companies had come to see them but I doubt if they will be appearing on vinyl in the near future. An almost note-for-note copy of the Stones' '19th Nervous Breakdown' was one of the few highlights in their set.

This band played a JCR party during Freshers' Week last year but have been unable to find a record deal in the meantime. They included a version of Patti Smith's 'Because the Night' in their set and their punkish energy and vitality won them a well-deserved encore.

Clint Eastwood and General Saint weren't breaking up as the pre-gig rumour had suggested, they hadn't got lost beforehand as they said on the stage and it was a night to remember as FELIX promised last Friday.

Backing group the Inity Band took the stage around 12:30 and immediately

showed they could win over the crowd without the help of the front two. The beauty with reggae music when it's this good is that you don't have to have heard it before to enjoy it. The music is exuberant and when it's sung by a duo as dynamic as CE and GS it's unbeatable.

The performance was not totally reggae and that was its only fault: rock influences such as the extended build-

The band have been together for around five years now and released two albums on the Greensleeves label: Two Bad DJ and Stop that Train—although they are now being courted by some of the majors. Last Friday was the first date in a nationwide tour and considering they have already reached the stage where their audience is principally white, been one of the headliners at the Brockwell Park peace concert in front of about 40,000 people and possess songs of the popularity and calibre of 'Another bites the dust' it can't be too long before they're too big to play Imperial College again.



Walkabout London was born in a pair of comfortable shoes on an afternoon of excruciating lab work. I set off with no very obvious end point in mind, ie went WALKABOUT. Armed with this column you will discover undreamt of bits of London, visit the odd museum or picture gallery, find a source of cinnabar green artists' paint, the best espresso coffee in London and much, much more!



In the midst of theatreland lies fashionconscious fitness land. Between the craft stalls and buskers of the redeveloped Covent Garden Market, and the amusement arcades and hot-dog stands of Leicester Square, run Long Acre and Floral Street. They are the natural habitat of stylish street athletes and a happy hunting ground for people-watchers and flaneurs alike.

Aerobics

Medical evidence has shown, so we are informed, that there is a need regularly to work the heart up to a 'training zone' level: 150 beats a minute-and to maintain this level for around 15 minutes: this is 'aerobic' exercise. It's all about sustained effort, rather than the short bursts of 'explosive' movement involved in squash or in fast-moving team sports, which are primarily anaerobic. "Regular aerobic exercise is one of the best ways of keeping our body in an optimum condition"-I'm quoting, sitting crosslegged on my bed, where I've been firmly planted for the last three hours doing nothing more strenuous than drinking coffee and scribbling-I'm full of good intentions! 


What to do at sunset?

The culturally inclined select from a wealth of books on the performing and visual arts, collect picture postcards from regional galleries (15p), and catch up on missed exhibitions with British and international art exhibition catalogues.

Night owls have more fun than just

shopping at the Covent Garden General Store, open till midnight Mon-Sat opposite Covent Garden tube. Baskets, Moses-sized or miniature (from 20p), will accommodate all purchases. Café-style china jostles for shelfspace with enamel mugs and coffee pots. Paper, in rainbow colours, is sold by weight—loz sombre grey envelopes (27p) to camouflage exuberant yellow paper (18p for 10z). Albany Orchards Original English Jelly Beans are justly as brightly coloured-try lime green or raspberry pink, at 55p for 100g. The amateur barman will find everything necessary for the well shaken cocktail, down to the essential paper parasol.

Those more intent on consuming than producing might, at this point, retire to Giordano's Antipasto Bar. Tehre, indulge in a Harvey Wallbanger or Tequila Sunrise; all cocktails are £1.50 during the 'Happy Hour', from 6:00-9:00pm Mon-Sat. After an exhausting day spent acheiving fitness and clothing the new-look, lean-line body, Giordino's plate of assorted salamis, served with crisp salad and fresh bread seems very modestly priced at £2.50.


An understanding with the Scout movement allows us to use their huts, so our weekends away are cheap and reasonably comfortable.

Are you a woman younger than 40? If so you are invited to have a German measles blood test at the Health Centre......

In the summer of 1983 there was a marked increase in the number of cases of German measles in the UK. The importance of this relatively trivial disease is the effect it has on the foetus of a woman who contracts it in the first three months of pregnancy. The baby may be born blind or deaf or with a heart abnormality or any combination of these.

Once a woman has immunity to the disease it is very unlikely that she will contract it again. Many women may have been immunised against the disease at the age of 12 or 13 and many others may believe they have had it and so be immune. Unfortunately there are

other virus infections which may appear indistinguishable from German measles and some women mistakenly believe they have had the disease. A simple blood test can determine whether you have rubella (German measles) antibodies and thus are immune from further infection.

If you are not immune you may be immunised with a single injection with no serious side effects. You should not have this injection in early pregnancy or within 3 months of conceiving. An ideal time to have it therefore is at a time when there is no chance of you becoming pregnant. All women under 40 are welcome at the Health Centre for such a blood test and immunisation as necesary.

Please come to see the nurse on Wednesdays or Thursdays between 9:30 and 11:30 am for the rubella blood test. You will be informed within 2 weeks whether you have immunity or whether immunisation is indicated.




If these are your problems then the Track and Field Athletics Club will work wonders for you.



Making 82
