

AUT OUT

The Association of University Teachers (AUT) and the National Association of Local Government Officers (NALGO) will be holding a day of action on January 15 which will take the form of a national strike. The AUT, which will be striking for the first time in its history, is dissatisfied with the inadequate funding of Higher Education: its action is intended to express the strength of its members' feelings on this issue. NALGO members are striking in support of their flat rate £14 per week pay claim and against the 5.2% which they have been offered.

The AUT is calling on all members balloted to withdraw their labour, and therefore not take lectures next Wednesday. Pickets will be on duty, but will be instructed not to try to obstruct entry to the College. Rather, they will try to persuade non-striking colleagues of the justice of their cause. So as not to be disruptive, the AUT has also informed the College of the strike, allowing them to re-arrange interview schedules.

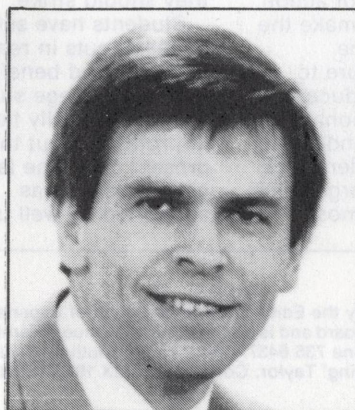
The Government has plans to cut the budget for universities by 2%pa over the next five years. Professor Frank Leppington, President of ICAUT, has said that such a cut would have serious consequences for Higher Education as the universities could not maintain the quality of education without increasing, or at least static, university funding. This, he said, was indicative of the way the present Government undervalued education. He hoped that next week's strike might persuade Tory ministers to ease financial restrictions.

ICU President Carl Burgess has expressed his support for the AUT's campaign. In a motion to be put to Tuesday's ICUGM, he will ask students to support the strike by not attending College on Wednesday. He feels that in an issue which will directly affect the education of future students, ICU has a duty to support the teachers action.

NALGO, which has members in the libraries, in Student Services, and in Sherfield, is demonstrating against a pay offer which is 1.7% below the rate of inflation and 2.3% less

than the rise in average earnings. NALGO members who are employed by universities earn considerably less than their counterparts working for private industry or in the civil service. This is due to the limited amount of money which the universities can afford to set aside for their secretarial and administrative staffs. A member of IC NALGO suggested that the College's high staff turnover was due to low pay levels. Employees leave to higher paying jobs after an unusually short time, forcing College to find and train new staff who need time to learn their jobs. Unless they were paid a wage which was in line with the work that was being done, a static, experienced staff could not be expected.

The strike will have limited support from the other two

main campus unions, ASTMS and NUPE. ASTMS has agreed not to cross picket lines or to work with any AUT or NALGO section, while NUPE will be working to rule on Wednesday.

Is That All?

Student Grants are to be increased by only two per cent (a £42 increase on the London grant of £2165) for the academic year 1986/7.

Education Secretary, Sir Keith Joseph announced the changes in the House of Commons on December 16. The Government is also preparing to withdraw certain benefits which are currently available to students, although they may increase grants by an additional £36 to compensate students for the loss of benefits. Students will not be able to claim any unemployment or supplementary benefit during the short vacations. In addition, students who live in halls of residence will be banned from claiming housing benefit during term-time. The Government is also intending to curb claims from students living in private flats from next June.

IC Welfare Adviser Lesley Gillingham is particularly concerned that students living in the College's head tenancies may not be entitled to housing benefit. It is not clear whether

these residences would be classed as halls under the proposed regulations. If housing benefit is withdrawn, the flats in Lexham Gardens, in particular, will become too expensive for most students.

The plans to reduce the benefits payable to students were outlined in a DHSS press statement earlier this week. Some of the proposals are covered in the government's white paper on social security. The DHSS has also brought out a consultative document which deals with the projected changes in housing benefit. Wednesday's Guardian reported that the Government intends to make it illegal for students to claim any benefit on flats or houses which they are not occupying.

FELIX contacted the Department of Education and Science on Wednesday and spoke to Press Officer, Richard Duckenfield. He said that the changes will save around 45% of the money spent on having benefits paid to students.

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Benefit Update

Welfare Assistant, Lesley Gillingham, follows up her last feature on benefits with an update for those of you who bothered to apply. If you have an questions contact Lesley in Student Services.

Anyone who has submitted a claim for benefit over the last year (1985) should read the relevant section of this article.

If you are experiencing difficulties with any benefits, please call into Student Services and see Lesley, the Welfare Adviser.

1. Unemployment benefit

Anyone who read the article at the end of last term in FELIX and submitted a claim for Unemployment benefit in the Christmas vacation will have realised that trying to claim this particular benefit could, and probably did, prove difficult due to eligibility rules. As long as you had paid enough National Insurance contributions in the relevant tax year(s) you should have had no trouble in submitting a claim. If you applied and have received a giro — well done! If you have not heard, or have been disallowed, call into Student Services and let us check for you. Decisions

have been wrong in the past and appeals have been successful. Immediate action is required as only a limited amount of time is allowed in which to make a claim. Please bring evidence of your claim and any correspondence with the Unemployment Benefit Office.

2. Housing benefit (vacation)

It is probably too early to worry if you have not heard about your Christmas vacation claim but if you have heard nothing by the beginning of February, call into the Student Services Office. The "chasing up" procedure can then begin.

If you are claiming from Hammersmith and Fulham and have already submitted a claim for term-time and did not receive form HB8 from the benefit office, call into Student Services to get one. It must be submitted immediately, otherwise your Housing Benefit will not be reassessed and you will not receive any extra money for this vacation.

3. Housing benefit (term-time)

Most people will have received an assessment. If you haven't or you think you have been wrongly assessed, check. Write to the Housing Benefit Office requesting a breakdown of the assessment. Without this, nothing can be checked. If you disagree with the breakdown or think that you have been forgotten, call into the Student Services office and we will phone for you.

4. Housing benefit (pre-1985-86)

Anyone still waiting to receive money or assessment for last academic year, particularly from Westminster Housing Benefit Office, should contact Student Services immediately. It is still possible to appeal especially in the light of recent decision concerning one student's claim, in which the Housing Benefit Office insisted that his file had lapsed due to the length of time his claim had

been outstanding, eventually his file was re-opened and reassessed! If you think you may have been forgotten and you made a claim over six months ago, call in. We need to act asap.

Supplementary benefit and Certified Housing Benefit

Students who stayed in London over the Christmas vacation and claimed supplementary benefit and certificated housing benefit - how did you get on? Of particular interest to Student Services are claims submitted by students residing in Halls or Houses over the vacation.

The government's white paper on the social security review makes it very clear that the government is determined to prevent students claiming supplementary benefit and unemployment benefit in the short vacations and housing benefit if living in college halls of residence. We need to know how many people were successful in these claims so we can see how many students are really going to be affected by the change in the regulations. These new regulations should be implemented by September 1986.

If you are having difficulties with benefits of any kind or would like more information on what you are eligible to claim for, at present, see Lesley in the Student Services Office.

Bot-Zoo

Dear Editor,
This term there has been much speculation concerning the future of several Union rooms, including the Lounge and the Bot-Zoo Common Room. We would like to put the record straight in accordance with information given to us by Professor Anderson.

The Bot-Zoo Common Room has been allocated to the Department on account of requirements for space connected with new research contracts and grants. The research space is to be used to create a new molecular/immunology infectious disease unit to work on problems of parasitic disease in developing countries. The room known as the Lounge was to be allocated to the Department to be divided into a seminar/common room and a lecture theatre. This now seems unlikely but room(s) in the Union Building area are still under consideration for use for the Biology Department by the College.

As members of the Department and of the Union we feel that any Union room will be more used by students if part of it becomes a new Bot-Zoo Common Room than if it remains in its present use. We apologise to those who work hard on the Lounge being the only party room in College. However, much space in the Union is wasted, especially on the first floor. The Bot-Zoo is fairly unique in College, being a common room used by many staff and students, as well as people from around Beit Quad, and is essential to the undergraduate, postgraduate and staff community of the Department. The queues in the Bot-Zoo twice a day testify to this.

Mr Burgess's present arguments are simply serving to delay a decision and mitigate against the undergraduates and postgraduates in the Department and College by causing a break in service when the Bot-Zoo closes in March.

It seems unrealistic for Mr Burgess to consider that the Department will allow a room in which it intends to invest cash, in order to create a civilised common room and lecture theatre, to be run by the Union in view of the general state of Union rooms. The College can in the end act without Union agreement. We would therefore suggest that the best interest of the greatest proportion of students would be served by a speedy agreement to concede some use of the Union as soon as possible, if not the Lounge. The interests of students are also not being served by Mr Burgess misleading them by stating that they can prevent College doing anything in the Union Building.

Hamlet Havoc

Dear Sir,
I am a resident in a single room in a flat in Hamlet Gardens. Recently, I received a further rent bill for £75 in addition to the one I paid at the beginning of term. On approaching the Students Services Office. I was told that this is due to my not being charged for the Christmas vacation in my first bill. Yesterday, I also received yet another bill, for £145, which, I am told, is for the Christmas vacation rent, plus an extra £5 a week which the Student Services Finance Department neglected to charge me, as they billed everybody for living in a double room, instead of finding out the true facts. Had they done so, they would have realised that seventeen people in Hamlet Gardens are living in single rooms. Alternatively, if it was necessary to obtain the rent money as soon as possible after the start of term, why could they not

explain the situation in a covering letter with the first bill? Then we could have budgeted for this extra rent.

On informing student services that I could not pay this bill until after Christmas I was told that my total bill in the first week of next term would be £595 ie £450 for rent until the end of the Easter term and £145 as outlined above. This would leave me approximately £120 with which to survive the second term; it would have to cover purchase of tube pass payment of gas and electricity bills, together with essentials like food etc.

Whilst I do not object to paying the extra when I can afford it, I do object to the general lack of communication, and, it appears interest by the Student Services Finance Assistant. I ask student services to ensure that errors such as these cannot occur again and, also that we are informed as to the true situation should this farce be repeated.

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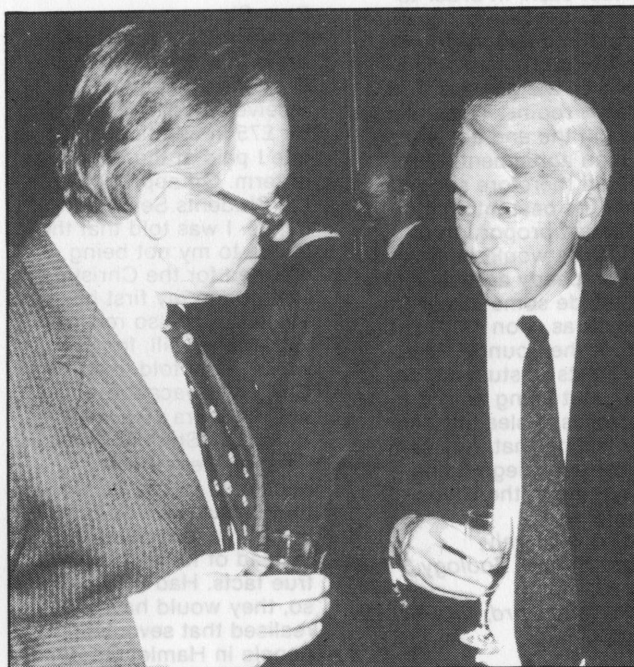


Hard Core Only

Resignation

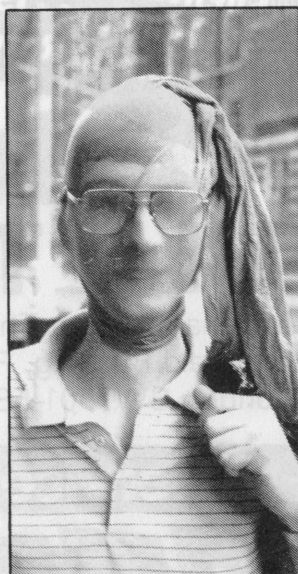

Pissed

A sizeable contingent from IC was present in Central London this year for the traditional New Year celebrations. A number of people, including our reporter, met in the Queens before proceeding to Trafalgar Square. As has been usual for the last three years, the fountains were shut off and there was a large police presence. Nevertheless a large (although smaller than previous years') crowd indulged in the usual good spirited merry making and the police adopted a 'softly softly' approach. What's Brewing

FELIX investigates research being carried out in the Chemistry Department of Imperial College into the humble cup of tea.

Tea and coffee are the two most popular hot drinks world wide; so it seems surprising that while a great deal is known about their chemical composition, much less is known about the processes involved in brewing.

Dr M Spiro of the Chemistry Department at Imperial College has been looking into the kinetics of tea and coffee infusion; that is the rate at which water soluble constituents are extracted from the tea leaves or coffee particles during brewing. Since some types of tea and coffee can contain as many as three hundred different chemicals, the research focuses on the extraction of the more important constituents such as caffeine and the aflavins, (which give tea it's red colour). A series of experiments have investigated the way factors

such as temperature, size of particles, pH, and stirring can influence this process.

One interesting result of their work is that the rate of infusion does not increase with stirring. Although this might seem surprising, it is consistent with traditional recipes for tea making which suggest there should be little or no stirring during brewing. However, one factor that does have a large influence on the process is the particle size, with finely divided tea or coffee having a greatly enhanced rate of infusion. The rate is actually dependant on the inverse square of the radius of the coffee particle, or the inverse square of the thickness of the tea leaf. Other experiments looking at the effect of varying pH show that for some components like the aflavins the rate is

influenced, but for others such as caffeine it is not.

The research has been able to show that the rate-determining step for the brewing process involves diffusion of caffeine through the bean or leaf coupled with diffusion of water into the solid. In the future Dr Spiro hopes to use a computer simulation study to gain a better understanding of this process.

In 1982 this work was featured as part of a Tomorrow's World programme, but as the date was April 1 many viewers believed it to be a hoax. It was however quite genuine! The Brooke Bond and Ty-Phoo tea companies who have provided sponsorship for this research obviously feel that this type of objective characterisation, when compared to the use of tea tasting panels, is important for their future

developments. They hope that the production of a quality instant tea for vending machines or transport catering will be made possible.

In the food and drinks industry ginger extracts are used to flavour a number of products including ginger beer and ginger cake. At present simple traditional extraction methods are used to prepare a soluble ginger extract from ginger root. Dr Spiro in conjunction with a large firm is currently making a system study of possible new solvents, and the optimal conditions of time and temperature required to produce the ginger extract. One of the solvents to be studied is supercritical carbon dioxide. It is already used to produce decaffeinated coffee, and is popular with medical authorities who are concerned about traces of solvents that are at present found in some foods.

Dr Spiro's work is providing information which is of use to the food and drinks industry in the short term. In the long term this work could well have wider applications in the extraction of soluble substances such as medicinal drugs, dyes or foodstuffs, from all kinds of biological materials.

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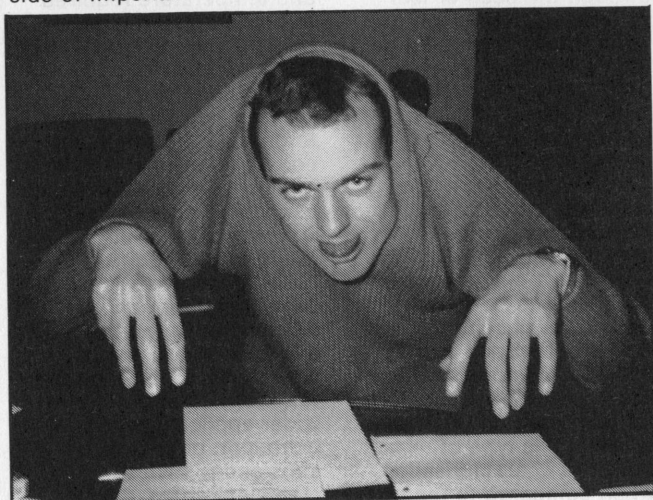
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Below the BELT

The new manager of the Union Bar is Moore Lyttle, a quietly confident Irishman with a wry smile and a positive attitude to the the future. He's faced with a stiff task, to turn a floundering and damaged bar back to it's rightful place as a main social centre in College. There's a lot at stake, especially financially, and since last Friday the money at risk is yours.

In films Irishmen are usually portrayed as either loudmouth drunks or born entertainers. Moore Lyttle definitely fits most easily into the latter category, thankfully he has the landlord's knack of putting his customers at ease and serving beer at the same time, something sadly lacking in recent weeks. He's not a stranger to Imperial either having worked regularly in College bars for a few years culminating in 1981 with a six month spell as manager of Southside Bar.

Ironically he now finds himself in direct competition with Southside which he readily admits is a larger and more comfortable bar with the great advantage of a ready made market. In comparison the Union is small and fairly isolated and has lost many regular customers during the turmoil of last term. The Union Bar used to take more money than Southside but the Southside bar has been extensively modernised over a period of years while the Union has been treated much less favourably.

Part of the unwillingness to invest in the Union can be blamed on it's reputation as

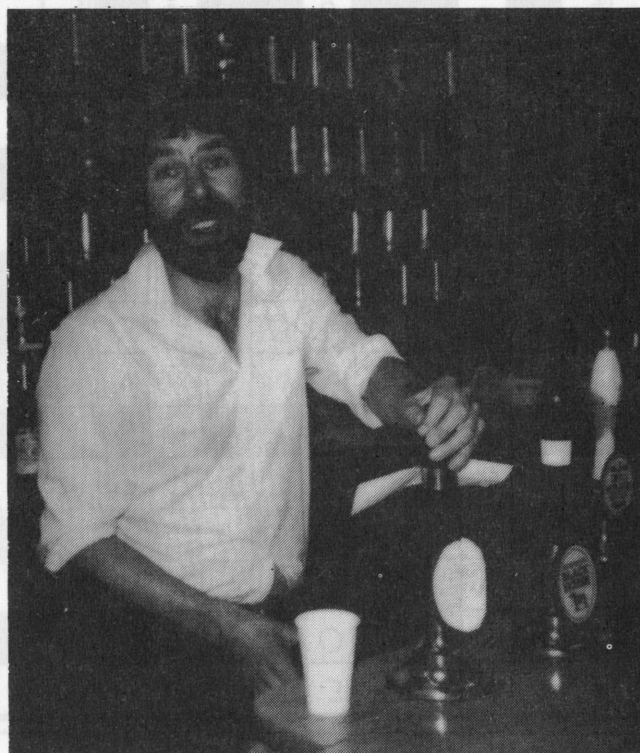
a haven for heavy drinkers which in itself has lost many customers. The bar does rely on the CCU bar nights, the drinking and sports clubs and after dinner drinkers to bring in money but Moore agrees that it cannot survive on these events alone. While acknowledging that the College has many 'active' drinkers and that tradition is particularly important to the bar he also feels there is a limit to the behaviour that is acceptable and most clubs recognise this and control their own members if they step out of line. He sees the Union as a noisy, lively bar which could never have a lounge bar atmosphere. However, there is a second bar in the Snack Bar which will initially open on Wednesday lunchtime and evening and does offer greater comfort and space. It is hoped that this bar can be expanded but the extra staff required can only be paid if the bar takings justify it. STOIC are currently preparing to install a television in the Lounge which will show videos in the evenings and it is hoped a microwave oven can be reintroduced shortly to provide hot food throughout opening hours.

The changeover has been particularly hectic in both arranging to order supplies and in tidying up the bar and this has required a terrific amount of effort. Moore particularly thanked Martin Parsons and the refectories staff for their help, particularly in employing extra staff to get the bar into shape, and also the staff of all the other College bars for their help and advice. Moore is obviously fully committed to the job in hand but the changes that need to be made all require to be justified by money across the counter. Why not go for a drink in the Union's Union Bar tonight?

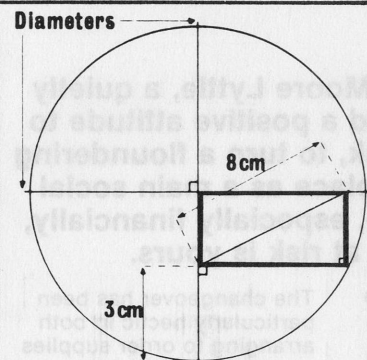


Christmas Conundra Revealed.

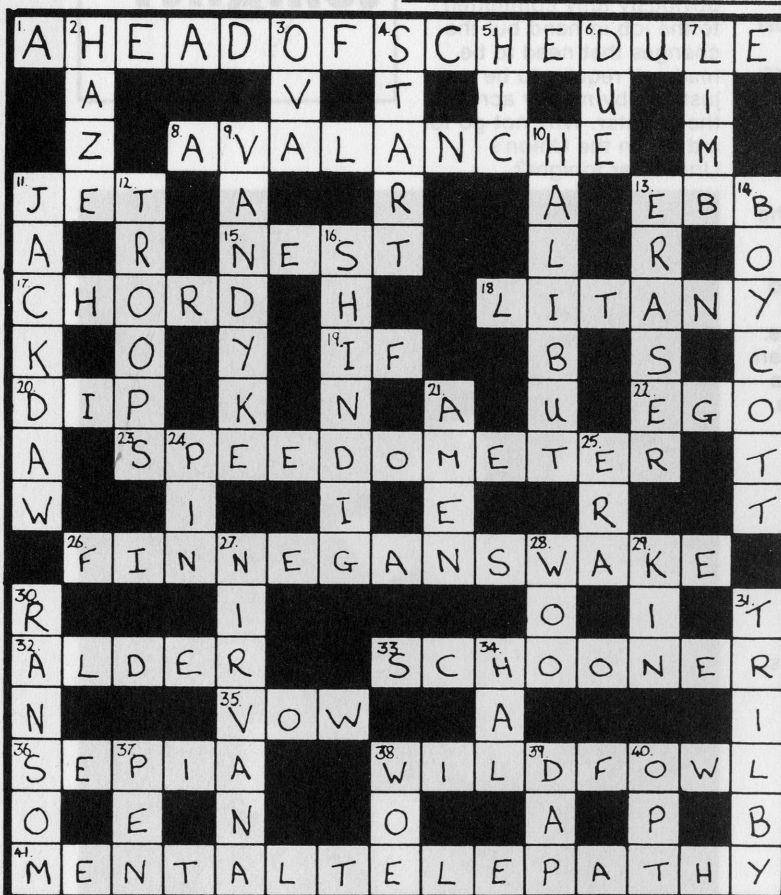

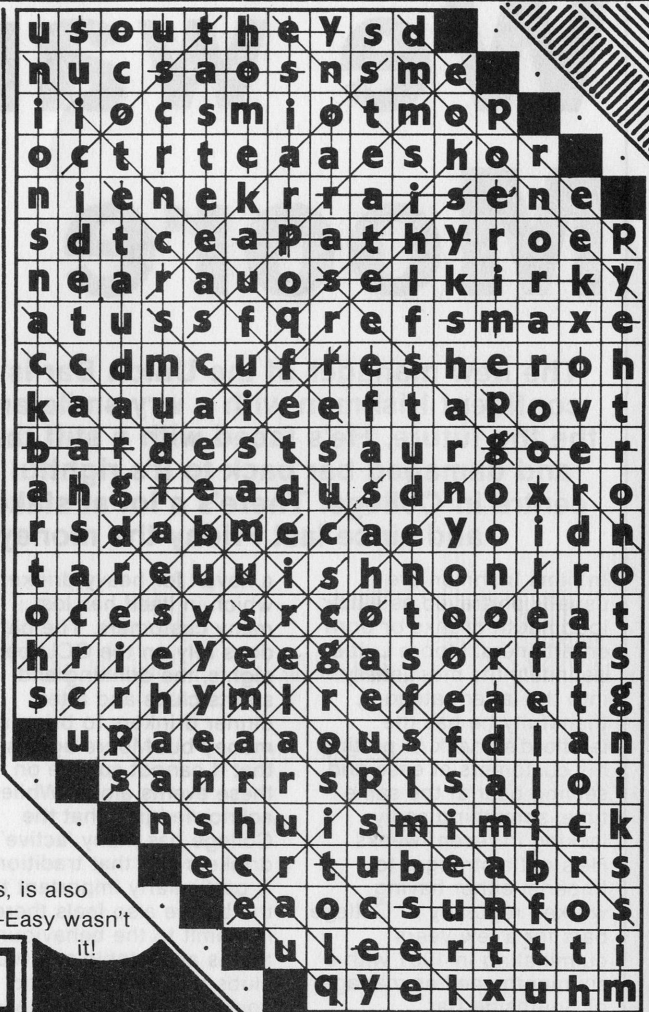
YOU'VE BEEN HAD!

The trick here is to realise what the sentence (or sentences) are about. This can be done simply, by reading the end of the passage:...had had had pleased the teacher. The last four words make sense, they are a past tense verb 'had pleased' and an object 'the teacher'. To complete the sentence, a subject is required. The beginning of the passage is a long way back, and there are no other nouns than those in the first three words. 2) William, while Alan had had 'had', had had 'had had'. 'Had had' had pleased the teacher.

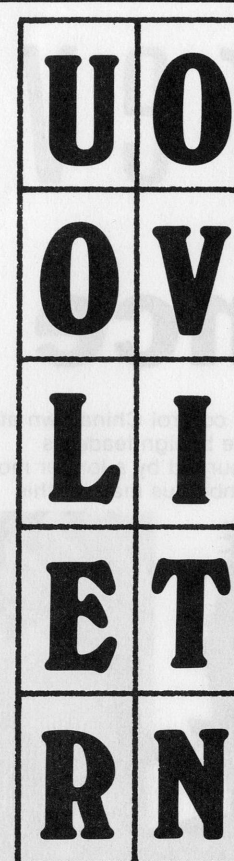
Don't forget those capital letters!



Firstly, look at it from Ann's point of view. Her last statement indicates that she has narrowed it down to two possibilities, one of which has a one as its second figure. There are 31 perfect squares from 13 to 1300 which gives far too many possibilities, so it must be a perfect cube. The perfect cubes between 13 and 1300 are: 27, 64, 125, 216, 343, 512, 729, 1000 of which 64 and 729 are perfect squares. The answers to the first two questions must have left two of these. If it was less than 500 and a perfect square this would leave just 64 so those weren't the answers Ann got. Less than 500 and not a perfect square gives three possibilities and is also wrong. 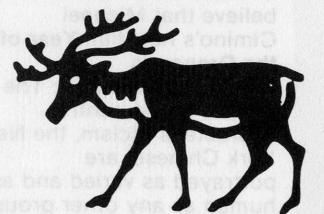

Hon Porn's Night

At the end of last term, RSMU Rugby Club held their Hon Porn's Night. RSMU President, Dave Pearce justifies the club's decisions to hold the event.

This is one of the more controversial issues in IC. I feel it is now time to reply to all those who condemned the RSMU for holding it.

It is a show which is organised by the RSM Rugby Club. It is held once a year and usually involves two female strippers and a number of pornographic films.

In my first year, 1983, 400 people attended—more than most UGM's—due to the interest caused by the controversy. In 1984, it was moved to an alternative venue due to certain opponents in IC failing to cancel it at the ballot box, inviting outside colleges to picket it and national press to report it. The Rector, then Lord Flowers, asked

the RSMU President to move it away from IC or cancel it, which he did. This year it went ahead as it had always been traditionally, quietly and watched by members of the RSMU Rugby Club.

Having explained the event and its recent history, I will try and summarise the objections. It is said to be sexist and degrading to women, because of their employment in sex acts on screen for a predominantly male market.

I agree that it is sexist, by definition, because it is made for a predominantly, but not wholly, male market. But that's not the point. If manufacture of bras is sexist as it caters for a solely female market. The point is, is it degrading

to women? Do the audience come away feeling that women are for sex only?

I feel not and for the following reasons: Firstly the audience do not watch it for sexual pleasure—that's difficult with dozens of others watching—rather the thrill comes from watching something socially taboo.

Secondly, sex is a natural act. Humans find it pleasurable, surely no accident of God. But at the same time you know that the feelings behind the sex on the screen are just acted and not real.

Fifthly, when I came away from such a night I didn't go and maltreat any women. I still have the respect that I went into the event with. Rather, I leave with a broader mind having seen the event and made my own mind up about it.

Realise this too, we in the RSM, feel very strongly that we decide what we do (within the law of course). We're not animals or imbeciles—we need 'A' levels as well. In the next few weeks there will be a questionnaire going round RSM asking Union member numerous questions including their view on Hon Porns.

No I don't think Hon Porns is degrading to women, but thank you for the controversy that has made me think, discuss and realise this.

Violence is golden.

The problem with making a film centred around a racist character is that it invites the charge that the film itself is so, particularly when the direction, script and camera angles force the audience to identify with the character. In spite of these facts I don't believe that Michael Cimino's new film **Year of the Dragon** is fundamentally racist. The victims of the central character's racism, the New York Chinese, are portrayed as varied and as human as any other group, and certainly not as a Fu Manchu, or any other, stereotype.

The racist in question is a New York policeman Stanley White, played by Mickey Rourke. White is arrogant, selfish and obsessed, but for all these faults he still proves to be sensitive and vulnerable. This wide range of emotions and characteristics are superbly portrayed in one of the best performances I have seen for a long time. Rourke is an actor who always appears to be suppressing a violent rage behind a gentle smile, someone who may explode at any moment, and as such is well suited to the role as Stanley White.

White is a Vietnam veteran brought in, as New York's most decorated cop,

to control Chinatown after the benign leader is usurped by a longer more ambitious man. In this

position he sees himself fighting the war again, only this time there is no jungle to hide in and this time he is going to win. He also comes into conflict with his superiors who at first refuse to believe that there is a problem, they don't want to make too much trouble; 'Life is about getting along', White's

with some impressive but not intrusive camera movements. I could talk a great deal about this film but space prevents me from saying much more other than that this is a film to see and think about.

The film world seems to be at a bit of a loss for major themes: space, and disaster

have been covered, but recently there has been a minor revival in the Western, and the latest example of this is the Lawrence Kasdan film **Silverado**. Some people have expressed the belief that this may well be the last big Western, if that is so then it's a fine swan song for the genre.

All the performances are excellent but I particularly enjoyed Kevin Kline's easy going cowboy and Linda Hunt's shrewd saloon owner, both of whom have wonderfully infectious smiles. I am tempted to say more about the hat as an icon in the Western, but I'd probably lose my readers, so instead I'll just say that this is a real Yee-ha film and I loved it.

Very briefly, because I want to pass over this one as quickly as possible, and because it doesn't even deserve the small amount of publicity that this review will give it, **Best Defence**. This film provides an interesting comparison with Lawrence Kasdan's because William Huyck, the director and co-writer of **Best Defence**, wrote the weaker of the Star Wars and Indiana Jones series of screen plays and Kasdan wrote the better ones. Thus when both are given free reign on their own projects the difference is unmissable.

This dreadful film also abuses the talents of two very funny people, Dudley Moore as the defence research scientist and Eddie Murphy as the tank driver demonstrating the weapon at a Middle Eastern sales drive. Passing over the suspect morals of the involvement that Murphy has in a war he stumbles on to I would however like to mention that dreadful script which is full of laboured double entendres and the sort of material that is about as funny as being run over by a tank. Go and see the other films instead.

Who Plays Wins.

Laughter and fun seem to be going out of fashion, gloom and despondency are becoming the rage, but not at the Vaudeville. Here, two masters treat their

audience to a true banquet of wit talent, melody and fun. **Richard Stilgoe** is not just a comedian, he is also a lyricist and musician. The combination of these three skills makes him a show man of great appeal. Some of his songs are simply hilarious, some are very sharp, they are all topical. **Peter Skellern**, by comparison is the personification of art. A gifted pianist and a songwriter of some note, he gets the opportunity to display his creativity on one or two occasions without interruption from

his bearded, bouncy friend.

The two of them fill the show perfectly. There is sufficient surprise in the repertoire to ensure that the whole audience is wrapped in concentration and there is sufficient humour to raise a laugh a minute. Stilgoe and Skellern work well together, their timing is perfect and contains an element that cannot be perfected by rehearsal. Whatever your education, you will laugh at them. They entertain the musical Maestro and the Social Worker alike—see them if you need cheering up.

B O O K S

Laughter At Carthage.

Michael Moorcock must be one of the most influential SF writers of all time. As editor of the magazine 'New Worlds' he helped establish the so called 'New Wave' which marked a definite reaction against 'fantastic future' and 'bug eyed monster' stories. Many currently well known authors owe their first break to Moorcock while his own voluminous output has helped greatly to dissolve the boundaries between what is and isn't SF. His latest book **The Laughter of Carthage** landed on my desk at the end of last term but because it is a substantial read it has taken me until now to review it.

A single book is not sufficient to fully understand Moorcock's writing and so, as this is something of an advert for the man's books, I shall ramble on a bit. Many of his books form parts of a

series and in addition there are a number of themes and characters which run throughout his work. However for complex reasons, books, chapters and events are not always in an order which could be described in any way as chronological. Furthermore characters may often be completely different people from book to book. This applies particularly to the Jerry Cornelius series of books which are perhaps his most unconventional writings. To describe Michael Moorcock's work as variable is something of an understatement and to fully catalogue it would be a substantial job, but among the better titles **The Elric** series and **The Oswald Bastable** trilogy are worth reading.

Laughter of Carthage is a relatively conventional novel which with its predecessor **Byzantium Endures** forms part of an on going series chronicling one Colonel Pyat. The two books should really be read in order as **Byzantium Endures** contains a short introduction which explains something of how the character arose and the nature of his memoirs.

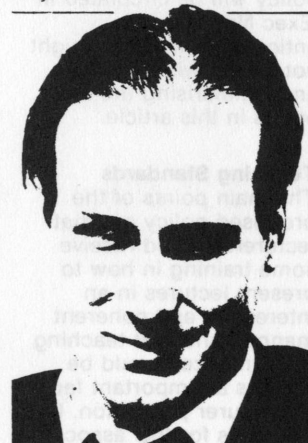
Pyat is born on the 1st January 1900 in Kiev and is brought up by his mother and bohemian friends in the pre and post revolutionary turmoil of

Southern Russia. His life and travels take him through a cross section of modern history as he formulates fantastic schemes and revolutionary inventions whilst continually failing on the verge of greatness due to his peculiar personal qualities. **Laughter of Carthage** picks up Pyat's story as he is fleeing Odessa in 1920 on a steamer round the Black Sea and then across Europe and America up until 1924.

Pyat is a compelling character whose story seems to be connected in some allegorical manner to the moral history of twentieth century civilisation. He becomes involved with many important movements and technological innovations whilst never achieving the fame he believes he deserves. Pyat is a genius, a liar, an addict, an egotist, a racist and a bigot who engenders fascination rather than sympathy. He is also a survivor and a visionary. Pyat's dreams and his view of world history as a battle between the mythological influence of Byzantium and Carthage seem in some way to be an attempt to explore the way societies are drawn to logically ridiculous philosophies such as fascism. On another level

entirely, both Pyat and the character of Mrs Cornelius, who appears regularly, will be familiar to anyone who has read the Jerry Cornelius books. Seemingly yet another Moorcock cryptic connection.

Laughter of Carthage is published by Flamingo and costs £4.50 in paperback which seems a lot for a paperback to me, but then again book prices generally seem extortionate these days.

You might have imagined that, being a students' union, IC Union would have policy on academic affairs. However, you would be wrong. Human rights in Chile may be well covered, but the Union doesn't have a view on teaching standards, examinations, course content, etc. Hopefully this situation will be put to rights at next Tuesday's Union General Meeting. Of course the full text of the proposed new policy will be circulated in 'Exec News', but in anticipation that this might not be too widely read, I am summarising the main points in this article.

Teaching Standards

The main points of the proposed policy are that lecturers should receive some training in how to present lectures in an interesting and coherent manner, and that teaching performance should be seen as an important factor for lecturer promotion. It also calls for the 'associate lecturer scheme' used by the Physics department, whereby two or more lecturers collaborate on each lecture course rather than leaving it to just one person, to be extended as widely as possible.

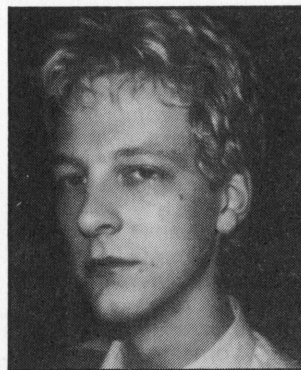
Course Content and Design

In theory, most students are allowed to do some Humanities options as part of their course. However, there are often obstacles placed in the way of doing them, such as timetable clashes. Also, the marks given for such courses are often unrealistically low given the amount of work involved. There should be a realistic provision for humanities options in all courses, and the proposed new policy is pressing for this.

The introduction of the MEng degree is the most important new development since four year courses started. Its introduction is to be welcomed, even if it is rather belated. But the College still has much more to do before four year courses get the recognition from industry that they were intended to have.

Examinations

The proposed policy calls for all courses to offer September re-sits or supplementary assessment, at least for those who fail in the first year. A large

number of students who presently have to have a year off would then be able to carry on into their second year. In departments where re-sits are held the failure rate is noticeably lower.

Women Students

There are two problems when it comes to recruitment of a higher number of women students to IC. First, more effort must be made in schools to ensure that girls are not discouraged from studying science subjects, particularly at the age of thirteen or fourteen when they make their choice of O-level subjects. The new policy will press for action by the College, along with other universities, to improve school liaison at

this level.

Second, this College needs to improve its image so that it can attract a high proportion of those women who do apply for science and engineering courses. This is as much a Union problem as one for the College authorities, indeed it is a problem which deserves consideration by all staff and students here—we can all do our part to improve IC's image in this respect, and the proposed new policy recognises this.

So What?

I feel that as students we should be putting forward ideas about how university education can be improved. In the past those that have been advanced to College by Academic Affairs Officers have been those that appealed to them personally, rather than a Union view. Hopefully by having Union policy on the subject our views will have more weight. At least I hope it will lead a few more students to think about academic affairs, and if you disagree with parts of the proposed policy or you have other ideas that you think should be included then come along to the UGM and let us hear your views.

Women's Officer

At the end of last term I was co-opted on to the IC Union Council to act as Temporary Women's Officer. What, you may ask, does a 'Women's Officer' do, and why am I doing the job?

Everyone at IC must be aware of the very low percentage of female students here—this causes many problems for some of the women here and almost all of us would like to see the situation change. There are many people at College who feel isolated, lonely, intimidated, angry, or just bored with the social atmosphere fostered by the unequal balance of the sexes. This isn't to say that plenty of people don't fully enjoy their IC social life, but most would agree that more women around the place would be a good thing. This is never going to happen as long as IC keeps its terrible image and its unbalanced atmosphere which a significant number of women (and men) find

totally off-putting. Many post-graduate women, especially, are appalled at the contrast between IC and their previous college.

There are ways in which the union can improve the atmosphere here; by introducing a positive non-sexist policy to rid college of material which most women and many men find offensive, whether it be articles in union publications, posters or rag mags, by following up, quickly and effectively, individual women's complaints of sexual harassment by staff or students; by making it clear that if more women are to come to IC, attitudes within the union will have to

change to make the place less hostile towards them. The Women's Officer can not be expected to do this single-handedly; she will not be there so that all women's problems can be dumped into her lap; but she will be able to remind and persuade other council and executive members to take action when necessary. She will be available for individual women to discuss particular problems and hopefully will follow these up and give advice as appropriate, she will organise schemes such as the distribution of rape alarms, self defence classes and so on. She should also work in conjunction with the college senior women's tutor and the student counsellor.

Most importantly the Women's Officer will represent all female IC students, the post being similar to that of the post-grad rep. This doesn't mean only representing the 'active feminists' or WIST members at college! I shall be contacting all women students soon (no mean task—the percentage may

be small but that's still a lot of people—so this may take some time!) but in the mean time if anyone has comments, criticisms, questions or ideas as to what the Women's Officer should be doing please contact me via the Union Office—leave a note or use the intercom as I'm in the building most lunch times.

As to why I'm doing the job at the moment at the last UGM, it was decided that the post of Women's Officer should be created, and that she should be elected by all female students and have full speaking and voting rights on Council, the body which makes most of the decision on Union policy. However, because of the Union constitution this post won't be official until it has been approved at two consecutive UGMs. Until this happens the executive and council thought it sufficiently important to ask somebody to start doing the groundwork for the permanent post. Having been at the UGM I volunteered to do the job and as nobody objected too strongly, here I am.

Now seems a good time to reflect on what happened during the first term and to look ahead to this coming term. I think the first term went very smoothly and yet again we provided the best, and best attended, JCR parties. We shall be having a few more this term, including the infamous 'Mines Review'. Thanks to all those who helped and came along to the Hon Porn's night in Foreign Students Week—most of us are still wondering what all the fuss is about!

The big event this term is the Camborne weekend on Feb 8—in fact it's probably the most important weekend of the year. We're hoping to take 3 or 4 coaches full of teams and supporters, so make sure you join us for the trip of a lifetime. Towards the end

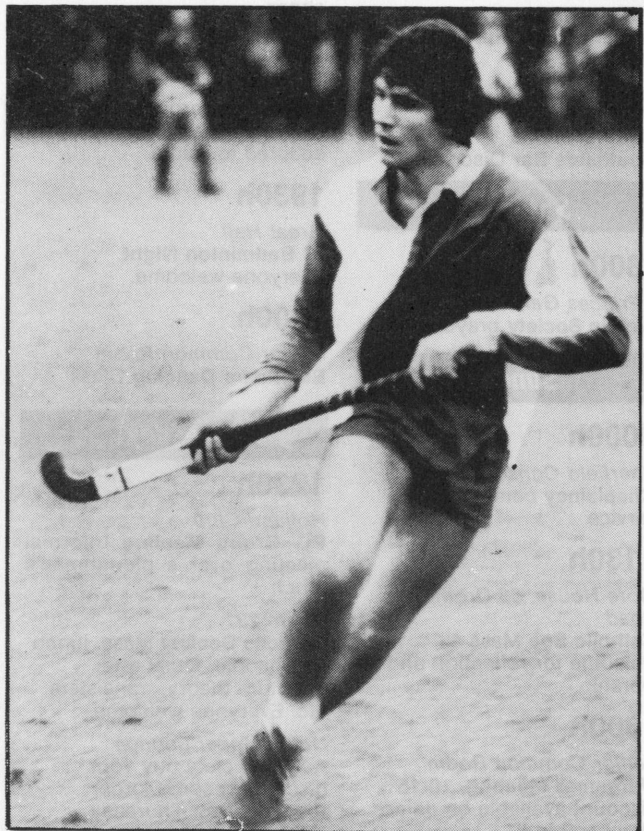
Cricket

Now is also the time between getting your grant cheque and finding you've got £25 to last for the rest of the term. So perhaps like me you'll be going out on your annual shopping trip, or maybe now is the time you can finally afford that imitation Cappel Dimonte doobery holder you've always wanted. Anyway good luck to you as you prop up good old capitalist society, bless its cotton socks (£2.99 at Sparks & Mensa). The object of this is not to pontificate on what to buy — if you want a pair of diamanté shin pads that's your problem and I've not got the faintest idea where you'd get them. What I would like to suggest is that you stock up on whatever you need for the next couple of years in case, as reported nationally this week, the student grant is

cut by £1100 as a result of housing benefit changes.

Both are political thrillers. *Defence of the Realm* concerns a journalist apparently stumbling on a parliamentary sex scandal which then leads to something nuclear. While *Orion's Belt* is a Norwegian story which starts with some dubious goings on in the arctic. Both these suggestions stem partly from seeing the brilliant but

occasionally OTT *Edge of Darkness* on BBC1, compelling stuff but is plutonium really like that?!

Such is the appeal of secrecy, or is it the danger of secrecy? The field of official secrecy is the subject of an event at the Friends Meeting House, Euston Road on Tuesday 14 January to be addressed by a mega-cast of public figures including David Steel, Roy Hattersley, Ralph Nader (who he, ed?) and Clive Ponting. *The Secret Rally* is part of a Time Out-sponsored freedom of information campaign and it is suggested tickets are bought in advance.

Ennals Quits in Star Wars Protest

Richard Ennals, the Research Manager of the Computing Department and logic programming coordinator for the Alvey programme, has resigned in protest at the SDI project. Mr Ennals, a key figure in the Alvey programme which is researching into the next generation of 'super computers', announced his resignation at the British Computer Society Debate on SDI.

Mr Ennals is concerned that SDI will not be feasible and fears that the Government will push for a greater military stake in Alvey, using the funding review due in 1988 as leverage. He explained in a Guardian interview that 'the intention of all the designers has been to produce powerful systems for civil use.'

Professor Bruce Sayers, head of the Computing department, commented that the Alvey project's funding depended only on 'how well the project was going' and that extra money would come from industry if the governments funding were reduced.

Mr Ennals is also concerned that, following remarks made by Defence Secretary Micheal Heseltine during Commons questioning, work on SDI will take resources away from Alvey. Mr Heseltine, although 'enthusiastic' about Alvey was unable to guarantee that SDI would not divert resources from the civil work on Alvey to military work.

Colleagues have described Mr Ennals resignation as a 'very brave move'. Professor Sayers said that the resignation would 'have no effect' on SDI or Alvey and added that a new appointment had already been arranged.



Healey 'Progressing'

Andrew Healey, the chemistry student who was admitted into hospital with Thallium poisoning last term, was reported to be 'progressing' and 'in much better spirits' earlier this week. Mr Healey has been in intensive care in Charing Cross Hospital since Friday November 22.

The Philip laboratory, where Mr Healey had been working, has remained closed since he was taken ill. Police are still investigating the incident.

Prof Attacks Funding

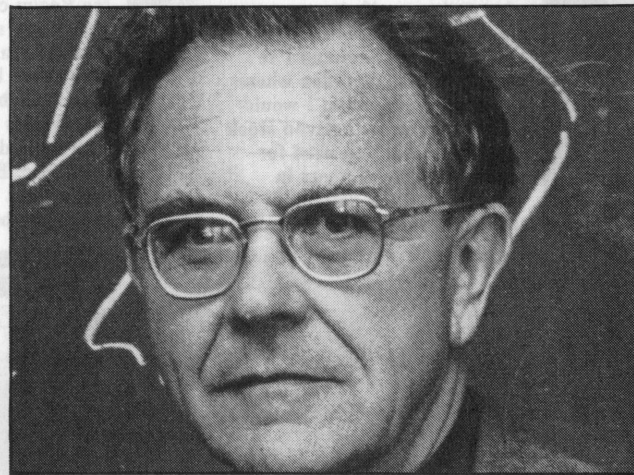
Professor Sir Geoffrey Wilkinson, head of the Chemistry Department, criticised the poor funding of research and teaching in Britain when he was featured in an Observer article on December 29. Professor Wilkinson, a Nobel Prize-winner, said that funds were insufficient to train students in the numbers required by industry. He cited the Chemistry Department at IC as an example; only £220,000 was left after salaries had been deducted from the department's budget of £1.2million. He was also quoted as saying that a ludicrous proportion of the country's basic science budget was spent on nuclear physics.

Professor Wilkinson described the acute lack of funds for research students as 'very worrying' when he spoke to FELIX on Tuesday. He said that the situation was particularly bad in chemistry, where costs are high because of the large consumption of materials, especially oil based chemicals. At IC the chemistry department

accounts for around 50% of the College's expenditure on materials. In addition the SERC provide only 1/3 of the cost to the department of each research student, a figure of around £2000.

Professor Wilkinson confirmed that there was

too much emphasis on research into high energy nuclear physics. He said that this work was not likely to be of much commercial benefit, and added that teaching core sciences should be a priority.

Phew, What A Scorcher

The full extent of plans for the Union Building were revealed in a document which came into the possession of FEELSICK earlier this week. The document, a memo prepared by John Smith for the College Secretary's Planning Group, was accidentally mailed to Student Services by Mr Smith's bungling minion Michael Arthur. From there it was passed to our reporter by Union Spy, Dave Parry. Both sources asked not to be named, but because we like to think we are going to work for the Guardian, we shopped them.

In the memo Mr Smith outlines radical proposals for creating more space in the Union Building. He intends that the Union should move all its facilities to the space left at Harlington after the gravel has been excavated there. The Union will be taking up residence in several houseboats and an old barge in the lake formed by the gravel excavations. To compensate for the loss of all but one of its sports pitches, College will buy the Union a large number of table tennis tables and intends to resurface the Queens Lawn with Astroturf. In the estimated three year interim period between now and the completion of landscape gardening at Harlington the Union is to be temporarily housed in the nuclear reactor at Silwood. Production of FEELSICK will be contracted out to Eddie Shah's printworks at Wapping. It is thought that, like Mr Shah's paper, FEELSICK will not be printed in colour.

The large amount of space released is to be used by Nirex, who are currently looking at proposals for sites to store medium and high level radioactive waste. A spokesman that at the four other sites they had encountered strong local objections, but the College administration had been very receptive to their proposals. It is believed that Beit Hall will not have lead shielding installed, but will instead be incorporated into the Biology Animal House, for study of the long-term effects of radiation on students. Use of the radioactive material will also cut drastically the fuel bills for the Beit Building.

Concessions were made by College to the Union in the course of negotiations. Free colostomy bags are to be made available to students from the Union Bar to aid incontinence

problems in sabbaticals. Also, places on Aeronautical Engineering courses will be made available to those sabbaticals who wish to run for ULU Presidency.

Carl Burgess and Dave Kingston said they were "very pleased with the deal". ICU Council has been cancelled for the next five years as Quentin Fontana felt that further discussions within the Union would prejudice the issue, and that the matter of the Union moving was "too trivial to warrant discussion at Council".

College Secretary, John

Smith was unavailable for comment on any of the above proposals, as he was busy arranging the purchase of a yacht on which to retire to Barbados. The Rector, Eric Ash said that he had not been informed of the matter by Mr Smith, and that Mr Burgess was "too incoherent for anyone to understand what he was talking about" when they last met.

On behalf of the Union, Mr Burgess said, "I feel this is a very advantageous move for the Union. All I've had in return is load of grief. Students really piss me off."

Fergie Denies All

Fergie has denied all knowledge of being engaged to Prince Andrew, in an exclusive revelation to FEELSICK yesterday. Fergie told FEELSICK at a press conference at the tiny Kensington flat, "He never proposed to me. There's absolutely nothing between us. It's a complete fabrication."

Pretension

So I went to see Peter Greenaway's **A Pee and Two Ones**. This film must be really good, because I didn't know what the hell was going on half the time. Complexity and pretentiousness are the two major influences in cinema these days; this film has both, with most moving scene being when Natasha Kinski banged a kipper against wall while reciting passages from Salinger's 'Catcher In The Rye'. It was a sympathetic treatment that truly summed up the human condition. However the best acting performance was given by Baron von Ostwald's truss, and thoroughly deserved the Oscar for Best Supporting Role.

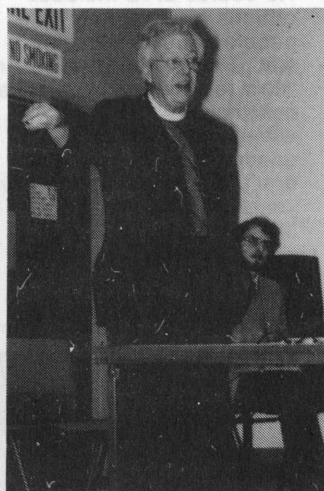

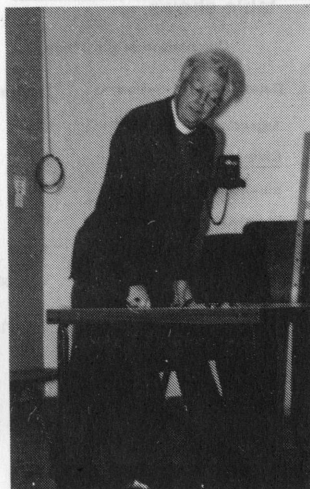

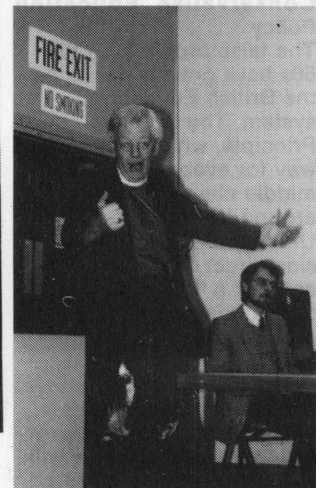
