
Moonie Blues

Members of the Unification Church, the Moonies, have been canvassing in the College area this week. Calling themselves the 'Collegiate Association for the Research of Principles' (CARP), followers of the cult were seen trying to recruit students outside the Mechanical Engineerig Building on Tuesday and Wednesday. They have now been banned from College premises by security.

The Unification Church is an umbrella organisation funded by the Korean millionaire Sun Myung Moon, and operates under at least 60 different names throughout the world. The movement has been widely criticised for using brainwashing indoctrination techniques and exploiting young people. The headquarters of the Unification Church are at Lancaster Gate, on the other side of Hyde Park. CARP also has premises near Gower Street.

No other London College contacted by FELIX reported seeing the Moonies in recent years, although IC security confirmed that they were sighted regularly in South Kensington at this time of year.

ICU President Carl Burgess described the Moonies as 'bad news' when he spoke to FELIX on Wednesday. He said that

they were a highly dangerous organisation who professed to offer students a release from the drudgery of work, but in fact only brainwashed them. He warned that people who joined the cult were separated from their family, deprived of their belongings, and frequently ended up 'psychologically damaged'. Mr Burgess said that the leader of the Moonies was a comman who was feeding on the insecurities of various people to fill his own pockets. He added that they were very adept at brainwashing techniques.

Mr Burgess had spoken with people who had attended meetings, and said that they had received a severe psycholgical battering. 'It is in our best interest to remove the moonies from our property' he concluded.

FELIX Move Latest

College administration have still not reached a final decision over the plans to move the FELIX Office to the north side of Beit Quad. FELIX Editor Hugh Southey, Business Manager J Martin Taylor and Union President Carl Burgess had further discussions with College Secretary John Smith last Friday. Mr Smith accepted the arguments against the move, as presented in the paper submitted by Mr Southey two weeks ago. He was still concerned, however, that to use the kitchen area behind the Lounge to accommodate the space needs of the Biology department, instead of moving he FELIX office, would put the Union in a vulnerable position.

Mr Burgess later confirmed that Mr Smith had agreed that to move the FELIX office might be an 'expensive usage of money which would be better spent elsewhere'. Mr Smith is still investigating the cost of the move.

Professor Anderson, Head of the Biology Department, spoke to FELIX about the move on Wednesday. He said that he had applied to College for more space for Biology, but added that how this space should be allocated was not directly his concern. He said that his department was receiving external funding for research into molecular parasitology and specifically into developing new diagnostic techniques and vaccines to help combat infectious diseases in the third world. He explained that these diseases are still the major

cause of mortality in developing countries.

To accommodate the new research program it will be necessary to expand the existing laboratory facilities. Professor Anderson stressed the importance of this research work, and added that it would be best to keep facilities together to avoid any need of duplication. He did not feel that for Biology to takeover the Lounge kitchen area instead of the FELIX office and Beit Hall TV Lounge would be very satisfactory. Professor Anderson added that in his own view the proposed move of the FELIX Office seemed like a good deal for the Union.

What's A Hallworth

Dear Sir,

I am grateful to Mike Stone for his critical report on Student Houses at Evelyn Gardens (Ref. 24 January issue of FELIX). His remarks afford me the welcome opportunity of underlining the general difficulties facing this office over the maintenance and improvement of College Residence Stock.

The unavailability of public funds, the dearth of competent contractors and skilled tradesmen, the high density usage of the accommodation coupled with the mis-use of property and equipment by the residents are the main sources of the dilemma. An additional problem at Evelyn Gardens has been the absence of the Housekeeper through illness which severely affected the on-site communication, coordination and supervisory qualities. Given that this list is only partial, the question of priorities is in some

ways the most vital one of all. The prime reason for concentration on the external maintenance repairs and redecorations of the Student Houses at Evelyn Gardens was to prevent further deterioration of the crumbling fabric. The suggestion that external appearance is the priority for expenditure is therefore substantially inaccurate.

May I also point out that the observations made by Mike Stone are typical, standard criticisms which I am happy to counter from expenditure on Residence maintenance and improvements. In 1984/85, £436,000 was spent on Houses as against £159,000 spent on the Halls. The total spent on external works was £130,000 (Houses-Evelyn Gardens) and £35,000 (Halls · Southside). The remaining sum was wholly expended on internal maintenance and improvements.

Concerning the problems with contractual labour, there is little point in increasing College supervision when we are surrounded by so many self-appointed Clerks of Works who appear to be experts in just about every trade in the building profession. It is little wonder that the workmen themselves are so often confused and bemused or should I say amused by it all.

I hope these few comments, hurriedly written, will at least serve to encourage Mr Stone to speak to his Warden, read my reports on expenditure and improvements and also to follow the example of FELIX and visit this office to find out more thoroughly and fairly what constructive steps are being taken to alleviate the concerns that clearly are so close to his own heart. 

Academic Affairs

Professor Blow of the Physics Department will be the special guest at an Academic Affairs open meeting next Wednesday. As chairman of the newly formed Undergraduate Studies Committee, he is closely involved in the College's current review of teaching methods.

'The meeting should be a valuable opportunity for student representatives from all departments to find out what this important new committee is up to, and to put forward ther own views', said the event's organiser, IC Union Academic Affairs Officer J Martin Taylor. The meeting will also consist of a training exercise for Student Reps and a general discussion on academic affairs and the Union's work in this field. Mr Taylor hopes the event will become an annual one if this first attempt is a success.

The meeting will be held in Civ Eng 201 from 1.45pm until about 5pm, with Professor Blow being present for the first hour. All Academic Reps are particularly encouraged to attend, although the meeting will be open to any interested student.

Facts And Figures

The Undergraduate Studies Committee is sending questionnaires to various groups in College as part of its review of teaching methods. IC Union has undertaken to survey students on its behalf to find out how much time they spend doing academic work, both timetabled and private study, and on social activities. The questionnaires are being sent out to Academic Reps for a pilot survey, and a general survey of all students will be carried out within the next few weeks. It is hoped the information gained will enable student workloads to be moderated since some departments are felt to overwork their students.

Slow Response

Liverpool University Guild (the students' union) are still awaiting a definite reaction from NUS to their refusal to pay their affiliation fees. They have collected over 2000 signatures supporting their action. Mr Andy Wilkinson, the Deputy President of the Guild, spoke to the NUS Regional Convenor on Wednesday last week. He later told FELIX that he was expecting to receive a final invoice and felt there was a possibility that Liverpool's delegates might be refused admission to the next NUS conference in April. Mr Wilkinson thought the decision to withhold half their fees may become an issue in the forthcoming election for union sabbaticals.

SWAPO Talks

Shapua Kaukungua, UK representative of the South-West African People's Organisation (SWAPO) addressed an IC Anti-Apartheid Society meeting in the UDH on Tuesday.

It was in 1966 that the United Nations terminated the South African mandate to govern Namibia, said Mr Kaukungua, and this decision was confirmed by the International Court of Justice in the Hague, which declared the continued presence of South African forces in Namibia illegal. He stressed the importance of the Western support in the continued occupation of his country, pointing out that Britain obtains about half of its uranium from **Rio-Tinto Zinc's Rossing** mine in Namibia.

Gossip

Observer diarist, Peter Hillmore, gave a talk for WellSoc on Monday. Mr Hillmore spoke for half an hour on the rôle of the gossip columnist, on journalism and on the newspaper industry. Regarding the morality of the gossip column, he said that only people in the public eye should be mentioned and ended with the phrase 'never shoot a pigmy with a howitzer'.



Eight Of The Best

IC Rector Eric Ash launched boat club's new eight on Friday. The boat, surprisingly also called Eric Ash, has already won competitive races since its controversial purchase at the start of the academic year. In a short speech the Rector told a small audience that he had done some sculling during his time as a student at Imperial.

Boat club goach Bill Mason also announced plans to run rowing courses for sixth formers in the summer vacation. It is hoped that this will attract good rowers to the college and help with the club's attempts to attract sponsorship.

In On The Act

Students living in private accommodation under a licence may be able to get their rents reduced by up to 50% following a ruling by a Sheffield judge last week. Pete Mardon, a law student at Sheffield University, argued that he and his two flatmates enjoy the protection of the Rent Act even though a licence they signed with their landlord seemed to strip them of protection against excessive rents, unfair eviction and bad housing conditions. The students applied to their local rent

officer, hoping that a 'fair rent' would be set below the £17 per week they had agreed to pay. Taking his cue from a House of Lords judgement last year, Judge Cottan ruled in favour of the student's claim.

Students living in London who currently hold licences are encouraged to apply for a fair rent to be set at the Rent Office of their local council. Further details are available from Student Services, and legal advice is available from Nucleus, telephone 373 4005.

Karate

Karate-Do is increasing in popularity throughout the world. However with this increase in popularity, certain misconceptions about the principles of Karate have arisen.

Most people if asked about karate, will think of the breaking of bricks and tiles, or of simple competitions where two people appear to attack each other savagely. Karate is none of these things in essence, and to practice it solely as a fighting technique loses the fundamental discipline and self-control that must play the predominant role. The training therefore encompasses etiquette and the spirit of humility, as well as devlopment of the fitness of both mind and body. The essence of karate techniques is 'Kime', meaning an explosive attack to an appropriate target, using maximum power, and originally comes from the Japanese expression meaning to 'Kill with one blow'. Due to obvious danger though competition rules make contact with an opponent illegal. How can this be reconciled? The target point is established in front of the opponents vital points, and hence the development of self control of forms a fundamental basis for Karate.

The history of Karate is a development from an art known as 'Tote', meaning 'the hand', which was a fighting technique developed in Japan arouond 1429. The Japanese Empire covered many of the islands in the South China Sea at this time Karate originated on the island of Okinawa. As no weapons were allowed by Japanese overlords, the Okinawans used 'open hand' techniques as a method of self defence.

There are many styles of Karate. The Shotokan style emphasizes 'power and speed'. Within the style there are three major aspects: 'Kata', 'Kumite' and 'basics'.

Katu are 'formal exercises' which consist of logical arrangements of blocking and striking in pre-set sequences. The 'Kata' promote physical development of bone and muscle. Additional benefits are fast reflexes and the ability to move quickly. 'Kumite' is the art of controlled free-fighting. 'Basics' are the fundamental techniques, punches, kicks and blocks which form the basics of the sport.

Progression and standard in the sport is measured by the colour of the belt worn. There are nine belts or 'kyn' prior to Black Belt (1st Dan). The changing of belts is called 'grading', which is a formal examination of an individuals ability. Ability is measured by performance in a predetermined Katu, sequence of basic techniques and fighting, the exercises vary with the 'Kyu' standard aimed for.

IC Karate club has been running successfully for several years; training on Monday, Wednesday and Saturday in Southside Gym.

Caeser Andrew is a permanent instructor for the Budokwai Judo/Karate club on the Fulham Road. This was the first club outside Japan to teach Judo. It was founded in 1918 and has produced a selection of Olympic, European and World Champions; for example, Neil Adams and Brian Jacks. Caesar has recently been appointed instructor to Eton College; where a new Martial Arts centre has been built.

The club regularly participates in competition. In the National Student Championships, held at Keele University, the club took 2nd and 3rd place in the Mens Team Katu competition.

Gradings are held at the end of each term, examined by a top instructor. He is the chief Instructor for Shotokan in Great Britain and Europe, Mr K Enoeda (8 Dan); one of the highest ranking Karetcha in the world and one time champion of Japan.

The club is fortunate enough to receive top class instruction and sponsorship for its Karate activies. Presently arrangements are being made for Geoff Thompson, four times World Champion, to visit the club.



Last Wednesday Mr Hazard visited IC to give instruction to IC Karate club. The training session saw Mr Hazard running the class through some basic techniques, placing a strong emphasis on good control, technique and especially 'Kime'.

When performing basic techniques the body should remain relaxed and tense only at the end of a movement, when contact is made. This tension is know as 'kime' or focus.

Towards the end, the techniques were put together into combinations, with Dave Hazard demonstrating how fluid and easy the movements can be. To finish off, a truly spectacular display was produced by Dave and Caesar Andrews (3rd Dan), IC's regular instructor. Starting with static kicks and punches, both quick, free-sparing ('Kumite'). This explosive aggression of their kicks and punches made you wonder if they were still friends!

Dave Hazard commented that: 'IC Karate club is one of the better clubs I've seen, and has an excellent display of discipline and attitude.'

Dave, 33, first achieved his Black Belt at the age of 20. Since then he has won many titles and medals as well as gaining overall third place in the World Championships in Japan (1977). He is now concentrating on teaching and sharing his experiences with his pupils not only in the UK, but all over the World; in places such as Germany, Holland and Turkey.



Generous'

Britain is 'much more generous' to its students than other developed countries, Sir Keith Joseph told MPs last week.

In response to growing anger at the announced 2% rise in grants for 1986/87 and the threatened loss of welfare benefits, he quoted figures produced by UNESCO, comparing amounts given out by seven countries as grants or loans for student support. The statistics show that Britian pays significantly more (£1367 per full-time student) than any other country on the list, ranging from Holland (£281) and the USA (£104) to practically no money handed out by the Japanese government for student support. Also mentioned was the percentage of GNP spent on student support. This varied from 0.25% (Britain) to 0% (Japan). These figures, however, date from 1982 at the latest. NUS Vice-President Welfare, Vicky Phillips, agreed that in many ways the British system was relatively generous, but made the point that 'This is something to be proud of rather than an excuse to go round chopping bits off it

Leaders of the NUS have for the first time been granted a meeting with a minister from the Department of Health and Social Security, Mr Tony Newton, to discuss the lack of benefits. Previous talks had been with ministers of the Department of Education and Science. and had been restricted to the issue of grants regulations. The NUS has planned protests against what it sees as Government policy changes which have not been fully debated, and warned that parents of present and prospective students are being antagonised.

Alternative Fabulous Green Paper

The Comittee of Vice-Chancellors and Principals and the Committee of **Directors of Polytechnics** have produced formal responses to the Government's Green Paper on higher education, expressing deep opposition to the document. Both committees claim that the Green Paper takes no account whatsoever of the needs of the nation in the next fifteen years. The Vice Chancellors'

'alternative' green paper contains a wide range of grievances, from the Government's 'blinkered view' and failure to realise the scale of the problems being faced, to the difficulty of running autonomous universities while ministerial and departmental intervention increases. The paper points out that if funding is cut below a certain level the quality of the universities' work will decline. It also criticises the Government's judgement on many issues, for example the raising of fees for foreign students. Another item of concern was the low salary level in universities which leads to problems of staffing and morale. The paper defends students' behaviour and rights, against adverse comments in the Green Paper.

Back To The Top

The CBI is running a competition to find '21 twenty-one year olds with a strong point of view on how to put the UK back on track to the top'

People who will be 21 this year are being asked to write 1000 words about the direction British industry should be going in. 21 regional winners will be selected and each will receive £500. An overall winner will then be selected who will win £5000. Entry forms are available from any branch of Lloyd's Bank.

Fare

Holders of the Young Persons Railcard will be able to get up to 80% discounts on 'Saver' fares as from tomorrow. British Rail have introduced an offer designed to increase business in a traditionally slack period.

Under the 'Fabulous February Fare' offer, 'Saver' tickets which usually cost up to £20 will be available at £4, those up to £40 will be reduced to £8 and any over £40 will cost £12. Low price tickets will be on sale every day in February, except between 1200 and

2000 on Fridays. From Sunday, BR is also reducing the charge for carriage reservations on intercity 125 trains to £3, and making more 125's available with this facility. Extra benefits are promised in May.

Violence Free

The National Anti-Vivisection Society has launched a 'Violence Free Science' campaign. The campaign aims to secure for students the right to choose whether they participate in dissection and vivisection. The campaign's organiser, Lorraine Walker, explained that many students were worried about the experiments they were being forced to perform. At present many students are penalised if they refuse to take part in experiments on live animals.

Record Jump

High Jumper Geoff Parsons broke the UK outdoor record by 4cm last Saturday when he cleared 2.30 metres in the Pearl Assurance National Indoor Championships at Cosford. Mr Parsons, a second year student in Mineral Resources Engineering, went on to attempt a world record of 2.40 metres and only narrowly failed to clear the bar at this height.

What Future



'What future can there be for a country which won't invest in tomorrow?' was the question asked of over 5000 Harrods shoppers who were given leaflets by IC demonstrators last Friday. Around 30 students, including ICU Deputy President Dave Kingston, attended the lunchtime protest, which was organised by External Affairs Officer Grenville Manuel

The leaflets cited the cuts in lecturers pay and student

grants over the last six years and attacked the Governments' proposals to prevent students from claiming certain benefits. It was stressed that money spent on higher education is an investment, essential for the country's future prosperity.

Mr Manuel later described the demonstration as a 'general success', adding that it had been very good humoured and that there had been no trouble from the police.
