Christine Taig

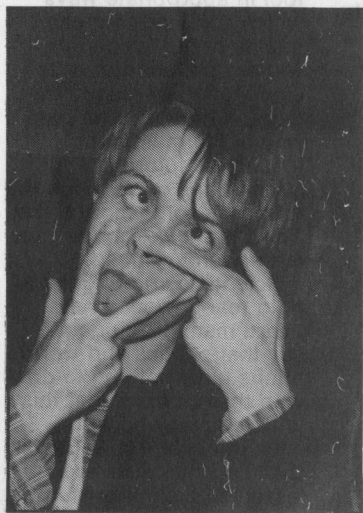
Christine Taig will be next year's Imperial College Union President. She beat J Martin Taylor after reallocation of the other three candidates votes. Jackie Pierce is the new Deputy President and Dave Colley is the new Honorary Secretary.

The election for President was close. Before reallocation Ms Taig had 566 votes, Mr Taylor had 332 votes, Chris Stapleton had 192 votes, James O'Shea had 121 votes and Paul Merckx (aka Dobbin) had 90 votes. Mr Merckx was thus eliminated. After the second reallocation Mr O'Shea was eliminated and Mr Stapleton was eliminated after the third. The final reallocation left Mr Taylor with 476 votes and Ms Taig with 681 votes.

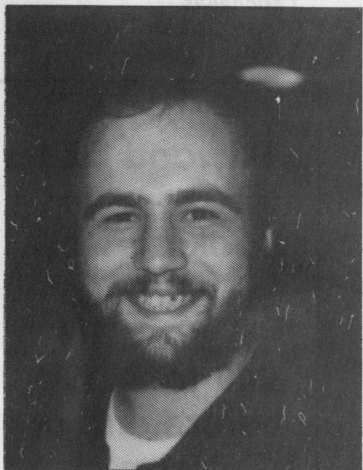
Ms Taig told FELIX last night that she was 'reasonably surprised' with the result. She added that she did not think in a years time people would think they made the wrong choice. She said she was disappointed with the low turn-out bearing in mind the work put into publicity by the candidates.

Ms Pierce won the election for Deputy President comfortably. She received 967 votes while Paul Shanley received 164 votes. The election for Honorary Secretary was won in an equally comfortable way. Mr Colley received 825 votes compared with Michael Newman's 280 votes.

Ms Pierce told FELIX that she was 'over the moon, John'. She looked forward to 'a good working Union next year'. Mr Colley said he felt 'really good'. He said that 'I now have to get down to doing the things I promised in my manifesto'.

This was apparently inevitable due to the shortage of the time before the next working group meeting.

Luke is also correct to say that he does more work towards Academic Affairs which I appreciate is very constructive. Most of what I do is talk to students and think, trying to isolate more fundamental problems which cannot be immediately tackled. If you think, this sounds ill-defined and waffley, that's because it is! There should be an example of this elsewhere in this week's FELIX (and others in previous issues).

Finally I would like to say that Jane Ryder has had nothing at all to do with my opinion of Luke.

I disagree with this.

Technology is not autonomous or neutral, it is directed by the values of society. Factories were not created because technology demanded them, factories were created to control people and their work, and the technology developed to strengthen this control.

Technology has been developed in such a way as to take power away from people (both in capitalist and communist countries). It has been directed to make weapons. It has largely been controlled by people that will not feel the effects of resource depletion or pollutions.

As scientists and engineers we must use that tool in appropriate ways which can lead to greater quality of life for people, without pollution or over-exploitation of resources. Rag Trip Success

The Annual RCSU North and Middle England Rag Tour took place over this weekend and raised an estimated £1,500 for charity. Seventeen people, two coaches and over four thousand Rag Mags set off on Friday morning and took in 12 Universities over the four days including Leicester, Nottingham, Manchester, Liverpool and Birmingham.

The highlight of the tour was the Bradford Beer Festival at which over £100 was raised alone. However

The Rag Mag was officially banned by both Leicester and Loughborough unions with one seller being physically thrown out of the Union Building. So far only one complaint has reached the Union Office from the University of Aston who were concerned about the aggressive selling tactics used and the sexist/racist content of the Rag Mag.
