

Union in Dispute

Arson Alert

A fire started in a lift in Southside at about 2.00am last Saturday is being treated as arson by the Police. The arsonist is beleived to have lit a small bonfire of plastic beer skiffs in the lift at the bottom of its shaft.

A letter from Dr. John Hassard, warden of Southside Halls, said forensic police beleived that had the fire been discovered five minutes later it would not have been put out. As it was, one end of the building was filled with plastic fumes. 'According to one police expert Southside would have been lucky to escape without some people dead' it was noted. Residents are said to be 'furious' at the lack of safety in the hall, including faulty break-glasses, missing fire extinguishers and only one security guard instead of the agreed two.

Mr Terry Briley, of IC security, said that the event was 'in no way accidental... the toxic fumes could have carried off residents'. The Police are still investigating the incident and Mr Briley told Felix that he hoped peer pressure would bring the culprit forward. 'I would be grateful for any information', he said.

Daniel Shields, the treasurer of the Social, Cultural and Amusements Board (SCAB), has resigned after a dispute with the Union. SCAB is one of the major sub-committees (MSC) of the Union, and the executive of each MSC must sign a document in which they are held liable for fiscal losses incurred by the MSC's constituent clubs. Without a SCAB treasurer, no SCAB society can buy equipment or deposit money. Some societies have refused to give cash to the Union until their banking priveleges are returned to them. Societies

Linstead Food Fight

Student residents in Linstead Hall are complaining about the price of their evening meal, provided by the hall. The warden, Dr Jan Bradley, told Felix that she considered the meals to be much better than last year, although the students do not feel that the improvement in quality merits the 40 pence price increase imposed. The meals now cost £2.95.

The warden said that students are not able to opt out of the system if they wish to eat a meal ouside the hall. They have no means of recouping the money lost on these meals, and their meal is cooked regardless. According to a recent poll in the hall, about 25% of the food is wasted during the term because of people not being there to eat it. The students have an option of taking a pack lunch with them, but this option is only offered on Wednesdays and Fridays. They would much rather be recompensed

with money.

The residents have sought redress for this problem by sending complaints to College administration. Dr Bradley said that students 'are not getting terribly far with the administration,' and according to one student they have 'contacted everyone possible.... and sent loads of letters,' but have been given the 'run-around'. affected include FilmSoc, Jazz and Rock Club, the Orchestra, the Operatic Society, and the Dramatic Society.

Mr Shields claimed that Union bureaucracy held back his role as treasurer and during a heated SCAB meeting yesterday, both Mr. Shields and Jonathan Griffiths, Union Deputy President, defended their positions. Zayeed Alaam, SCAB chairman, hoped that Mr. Shields would act as treasurer until a replacement could be found and that he could be persuaded to withdraw his resignation.

Zoe Hellinger, Union president, has offered a compromise, in that Mr Shields can write his own declaration and submit it for approval to the Union. Mr Griffiths told Felix that he had not heard of this, and that as all other MSC treasurers had signed it, why should Mr Shields be different? Steve Newhouse, Chair of the Social Clubs Committee (SCC) told Felix that he had not been asked to sign the document, and nor had his treasurer, Mark Randall.

College Day

As you will have seen from last week's Felix article, the working party on the college day submitted its final report to Board of Studies last Wednesday. Although the contained report no recommendations, it did contain details of a framework for a day which involves starting at 9.00am, lunch at 12.00pm, finishing at 6.00pm. Therefore the whole day will be increased by one hour. Along with the framwork a set of guidelines were included which effectively prevented departments from increasing the workload by limiting the number of contact hours in a day. It also recommended that the longer day need not be taken by all departments, those which have no timetabling problems can choose to have a day running from 10 'til 6 or from 9 'til 5. As was not reported last week (!?) the Board of Studies did actually pass the working parties framework along with the relevant guidelines. However, the agreement is that no decision on timetabling can be made until the students in each department are consulted. That means that a staff student committee will be able to negotiate the method of use taken by each department.



Last weekend saw ICU Rag raise another thousand pounds or greater for charity, as was managed in the three weekends previously. The amount raised, £1,330.76 came from two independent collections.

The first was on Friday afternoon when students from IC headed off into the prosperous part of the city on the City of London Pub Crawl. It was shown that the decision to. collect from the city's business community in the afternoon was a wise one, when at the end of the day £655.72 had been raised for UNICEF, the United Nations

Children's Fund. The day's top collector was Tamsin Braisher who raised £270.78. Her collecting partner, Stuart Rison, attributed this to 'the rich businessmen putting the money in her Rag Can instead of mine saying that they'd rather give it to the girl with the nice legs!'

The second collection was on Sunday, when students, all in fancy dress, went amongst the buskers in Covent Garden Market and raised £675.04 for ICU Rag's chosen charities. This year these charities, who also benefit from the money

raised during Rag Week, include Multiple Sclerosis, BIBIC, WWF, Turning Point and a selection of Local Charities.

These two collections were then added to by the £83.53 brought back by a team of three selling old Rag Mags while on a week's tour of Britain's other universities. This takes the weekend total to an amazing £1,413.87, making the overall total for the year so far a staggering £14,146.64. Last year Rag raised in the region of £32,400.

There are three more major collections before Rag Week:








Is it more blessed to praise than to slag off? If the truth be known I enjoyed the concert more than most for the sheer melodicity of it.


World of Twist — Quality Street

Boyz 'n' The Hood

Boyz 'n' the Hood is the debut film written and directed by 23 year-old director John Singleton. Born and raised in the South Central Los Angeles ghettos, this also provides the subject matter for the movie. The film is based upon the coming of age of three boys subjected to the drugs and violence that comes with the territory, and the friendship that develops between them. works in Western society and provides some of the means and the hope to escape from the situation.


Hunting of the Snark





Selective questions distort sense

Re. The College Day

As chairman of the working party whose report was discussed by the Board of Studies on 23 October, may I correct some factual errors in the report in your issue of 25 October?

1. We (the working party) reminded the board that 'last session student opinion was strongly opposed to an extension of teaching hours' (which shows that we were aware of the various referenda), but said that 'we know of no systematic expression of students' views this session.'

We also wrote that 'students (and indeed staff) will need to be consulted about the details of the implementation'. Your selective quotations distort the sense of what we wrote.

2. The main reason for considering the change was to make it easier for departments to arrange the choice of subjects that many students want and/or need. Last session, the board was inclined to make the change, but deferred a decision until it had the best estimates that could be made of the cost.


3. The Managing Director, who assured us that the cost would be 'next to nothing', is Angus Fraser; Gordon Marshall is the Director of Estates.

4. The board did not defer a decision until 11 December or any other date; it decided that the new hours will operate from October 1992 (subject to various conditions stated in our report), and that each academic department should consult its own students about the introduction of the new hours.

Sports centre

Dear Sirs,

I am writing to you to draw your attention to events concerning the Sports Centre over the past six months.

Firstly the plans for the rebuilding of the Sports Centre and Southside Gym were not made available to the South Kensington Sports Committee until the architects had presented version 6, despite the fact that the South Kensington Sports Committee is the body set up by the Governing Body in 1968 to be the management committee of the sporting facilities at South Kensington. The brief given to the architects by Valerie Straw still has not been made available for discussion or comment despite the fact that it is obviously of interest to the SKSC and originally included the removal of the Rifle Range. This idea was only scrapped after I suggested that Valerie Straw look at the college's obligations under the 1954 Landord and Tenant Act and the 1938 Defence of the Realm Act.

Secondly at the joint meeting of the college athletics committee and South Kensington Sports Committee the architects plans were finally shown and a great deal of disquiet shown to the proposed changes. The reasoning behind these changes, we were informed by Gordon Marshall, was 'to appeal to the middle-aged executive' and when I pointed out that the Sports Centre was for the students here, he said 'Oh, I am sure they will like it as well'.

Because of a lack of time the paper tabled by Valerie Straw on new admission charges and membership had only a brief airing. When I questioned the need for a 'membership' charge and that the revenue gained thereby would be better and fairly raised by rather than MD is rather petty. The sentence may be ambiguous, but it isn't wrong.

4. True. This is a factual inaccuracy for which I apologise. In our defence, we tried to confirm the story with a number of people including the Union Office none of whom were in. The story was based on a slightly out of date document, but none of us are prescient so without independent confirmation mistakes are made.

increasing existing charges using the existing structure the only reply I got which could be considered as having the same argument as the counterargument was 'well, I like it' (membership). When Harry Knutton (C.A.C. chairman) decided a meeting to discuss this membership issue would be necessary and would be called in September, Gordon Marshall said 'we are going to do it anyway'.

I have written to the Rector twice on the issue of 'membership' at the Sports Centre and the only reply on who is empowered to make such decisions, Valerie Straw as facilities manager or the Governing Body's Committee, was that the college had not *yet* broken the law.

The final straw of this saga is the cancellation of the joint CAC SKSC meeting on Monday 28th October by Valerie Straw to allow a complete rethink on the plans. I thought that it was the job of the secretary, John Vandridge-Ames to convene and cancel meetings not hers. It may be coincidence but another architect, Mr Geoffrey Darkes of Geoffrey Darkes Associates, a well respected and award winning practice, was due to have his feasibility study and plans tabled at this meeting. This means that when the final plans are decided upon there will be very little discussion because the deadline for contracts etc is the end of December, if work is going to start in the summer of 1992.

I am willing to make available both architects plans and all other correspondence on this matter in my possession to any interested party. *Yours faithfully*,

Accident Prompts Week Vehicle Ban Wilts

All vehicles are to be banned from mascotry, it was decided on Monday. A meeting of various members of the Union and Constituent College Unions (CCU), including the executives decided that since vehicles are 'harder than even rugby players' they should be totally excluded from mascotry. The meeting was arranged before the motor accident reported last week, but it has figured largely in their proposed future rules for mascotry, designed to improve the sport rather than ending it, as the Rector, Sir Eric, had proposed in a letter.

Two other major changes are also mooted; firstly, mascots should be put on inviolate display in college departments. This means that they may not be stolen in a raid, but must be taken to a minimum of two CCU events por term, and secondly,

during rag week the mascots will be taken out every day. If stolen they will be returned by midnight to register one 'capture'. These will be totalled at the end of rag and a mascot exchange effected (when they will be inviolate). The most stolen mascot will be awarded an extra fine, payable to rag.

Other suggestions include a fixed sum for violation of a mascot. This would be scaled relative to CCU sizes. The RSMU is to be made inviolate since their numbers are depleted, and a complete set of rules are to be displayed in each CCU office. This would be designed to make sure participants realise that they are responsible for their own safety.

The proposals are to be discussed this evening (Friday) at a meeting of bearers, CCU Vice Presidents and CCU Presidents.

The King George's Park display has had music specially commissioned for it, which was successfully used in the Tooting firework display last Saturday. Both bonfires will be lit on the 5th November at 7.30pm with the fireworks starting at 8.00pm

Lord Mayor's Show

On Saturday 9th November, City and Guild College Union will be participating in the Lord Mayor's Show. This annual event marks the change from the old to the new Mayor.

The show will start at about 11.00am at London Wall and will follow a route through the City passing St. Paul's, the Guildhall and will stop at the Monument for lunch at approximately 12.30pm. The float will then return by a more direct route to the starting point.

This year's float has models of a communications satellite and a building from Canary Wharf. Traditionally, City and Guilds are allowed a float for free whereas the companies taking part have to pay. Access to the route can be obtained from either Moorgate, Bank, Mansion House or Monument underground stations.
