A Long Road


Strike action disrupted Imperial College on Wednesday, 4th December as manufacturing staff halted work in protest about the proposed sackings of security and messenger staff. They also lobbied the College's Governing Body, which will take the decision whether to implement the controversial plans (see Felices 917, 918 and 919)

The whole college closed down except for the QT snack bar in the Junior Common Room (JCR), and Southside bar, both of which are owned by the College. Most laboratories, libraries and computer terminal rooms were also shut or severely restricted by temporary security measures.

Most students seemed unaware of the action and continued to attempt work, but often could not due to library and laboratory closures. One student told Felix that 'the strike is a waste of time, why should they ruin my education?'. Another student, Daniel Lloyd Lucas, sympathised with the action but saw 'no point' in not going into College.

Sue Sharpe, secretary of the Manufacturing, Science and Finance trade union (MSF), said afterwards that the strike went very well and claimed that the 'College was quieter than Christmas Day'. Dr Alan Taylor Russell, chairman of the Association of University teachers (AUT), said he had no gauge of the strike response but the college was 'very quiet' that day. The Rector, Sir Eric Ash, said that he felt he was unable to comment on how effective the strike action had been.

The Governor's meeting released a statement on Friday stating that the period of negotiation would be extended for 'one week but not more than one month', and promising to consider any proposal that took account of Imperial College's serious financial

Rape A

The rape alarms in the ladies lavatories in the Union Building were found to have been turned off on Saturday night, after a woman was assaulted there. A female student found a man using the lavatory facilities and when he was asked to leave he attacked her. In response a rape alarm was pressed but no alarm sounded, after which the woman concerned managed to remove her assailant and take him down to the Union Bar.

Subsequently a dentist's appointment card was discovered which was believed to belong to the attacker, identifying him as Mr Dean O'Broin, born 23 March 1969. He is also thought to be part of Cardiff University Rugby Club.

A test on the rape alarms following the incident showed that three of rape alarm plungers were broken and would not work if they had been turned on. The Duty Maintenance officer was called to investigate, but felt that no work could be done to repair the system at the time due to the possibility of false alarms.

Deputy Head of Security Terry Briley commented that it 'was not directly his responsibility' but security should know 'what we've got, where we've got it and whether it works.' Mr Briley contiued that a review of all alarms in college was taking place. Mr Briley could not comment on how long it would take to repair the Union rape alarms.

Loans

There are still no firm plans to restart student loan interviews after Christmas. A member of staff in the grants and fees office told Felix that interviews had been 'fully booked until Christmas' and that the demand for interviews was 'greater than expected.' She added that 'no interviews are being booked into the new year'. At present there are only three interviewers to cover every student interested in applying for a loan. She advised students interested in applying for a student loan to telephone them after Christmas.

Alarmed Biology Relocation?

Two fire alarms went off in Tizard. Selkirk and Falmouth Keogh halls of residence last Wednesday during strike action by College staff. Security staff must check any building before fire alarms can be switched off and residents can reenter. Temporary security had to be called, along with the fire brigade, when the first alarm went off at 6.45 pm. Another alarm sounded at 7.45 pm and temporary security were again required to restore order.

Although no-one was hurt, Southside residents complained that narrow staircases and the two main entrances to the four halls could have been blocked if panic had broken out. Dr John Hassard, Southside warden, said that the halls were a 'death trap' and questioned whether, if there had been a real fire, the residents could have been evacuated so easily.

Dr Hassard added that security 'didn't cope' with the situation on Wednesday and are in the wrong place to monitor the building if a fire does break out. He commented that there had been several arson

Debt Due

College Administration is 'negotiating' with Hill Samuel, the merchant bankers, over the date of the repayment of a £10.72 million loan. According to the IC accounts, published recently, the debt was to be repaid on 31st December. Mr Terry Neville, IC director of finance, told Felix that the date 'has been extended a number of times already.'

Mr Ian Gillet, Safety Director, said he could not comment specifically on the incident last Wednesday, but said that due to the strike action the fire brigade would have been called to any fire alarm immediately. He said about fire safety in Southside was well within legal requirements and 'should be alright' if students obeyed fire alarms and did not block open fire doors

roll over debts' and that 'there was nothing evil about borrowing money or paying interest. Industry does it all the time.' The Rector added that paying off interest and not the £10.7 million capital is 'only a problem if you have a leasehold - and Clayponds is freehold.' The estimated cost of such a project is about £40 million, of which slightly less than half would come from ICR. The rest of the funding would have to be raised by the College and Sir Eric said in his letter that 'the chances of success' would be ascertained 'probably by Easter.' It is thought that the new building might be built in the space between the Science Museum and the Biochemistry and Chemistry building.

*Parts of Biology - not all - would be associated with the new centre, Sir Eric told Felix, and in the letter it states that this would 'allow a major increase in student residences' in the Beit Quadrangle. He said that there was 'a better than evens chance of pulling it off' though discussions were still at an early stage.

What does a CCU do?

Each of the four Constituent College Unions (CCUs) are run in a similar way to Imperial College Union (ICU). There is an executive committee (exec) responsible for the day-to-day running of the Union and its affairs. This is made up of about eight people, but the top three, President, Vice President and Honorary Secretary are perhaps the most notable since it is they who wear the regalia and make up the top of the committee. The Exec is itself responsible to the General Committee (Gen Comm) which is made up of about thirty people who are all representatives of an area of the college, be it Departmental

Representatives (Dep Reps) or club chairmen. All the departments of the college are represented by both their Dep Reps and Society Chairman. The Gen Comm is the main policy making body of the Union and all major decisions have to be passed by it to progress any further.

Each CCU gets its own money and is financially autonomous (that means it looks after itself). Apart from St Mary's, all the money comes in one lump sum from ICU (about £15,000 although it does very slightly for each CCU). It is then up to the CCU's Finance Committee to decide what to do with it. The large majority goes to the Clubs and Societies, particularly in sporting activities such as rugby. The remainder is spent on Union Entertainments and other special expenditures such as the commemorative shields and pots

that each union keeps.

The CCUs are essentially arms of ICU, each of the CCU Presidents is a Vice-President of ICU and sits on that Executive Committee too. They not only act in passing on information from ICU but also in feeding back opinion from the more localised catchment of the individual college. This is probably the most important role of the CCUs as far as ICU is concerned since the sabbaticals have little day to day contact with students whereas the officers of the CCUs are still studying and are much more in touch with what the students want.

If you don't know who your CCU officers are then find out, track them down and have a chat-what do you think of the college day, security strike, etc, etc. The best place to find them is in their CCU office at lunchtime.

Jazz Café

For those of you who have yet to set foot out of Knightsbridge/ Kensington, probably one of the trendiest places to visit and hangout is Camden Town. Before I formed the band I spent, like, three or four years busking round Europe, that's what I did, it's the only other job I've ever had is busking. I left school after 'A'-Levels, I had a lot of fun busking, but it's hard work, and the money's grim, you live hand to mouth, so I wrote these songs, and found the musicians, and that's it and we got just like a massive live following, and every record company under La's. I think they're something special. But slagging other bands off is dead unproductive.

What do you think of the current music 'scene'?

Shite. It's grim, isn't it? Grimly fiendish. Do you have any favourite

bands at the moment?

Err, no. I like older bands, Van Morrison, Bruce Springstein, The Jam, The Clash, The Waterboys, Billy Bragg. I don't think there's any real personalities left in pop music, so we're trying to put a little of that back into it, and that's the main thing, a bit of vibe, a bit of life and a few good fucking tunes. **Do you have your eyes on the**

Do you incorporate politics like that into all your songs?

No, I just write completely naturally, just whatever comes to mind, like Raid The Palace was written in ten minutes, I just like spewed it out. A lot of the songs in the set and on the album are going to be love songs. They just come out, it's just natural.

How long do you see the band lasting.

Well, it's difficult, but we hope it's going to have some sort of longevity, that's why we won't conform to any musical trends, because trends die out. If we don't do that, if we just stick to our guns, sooner or later the pendulum's going to swing round to our way of thinking.

Freddie Mercury

One of my best friends is a massive Queen fan, and I always really really hated Queen, and he got tremendous ribbing, he had the piss taken out of him all the time, 'cause I thought they were shite, pompous rock, and like Freddie Mercury was such a posing bastard, but when he died, I realised that I didn't actually hate him, I don't like a lot of other music more, I just thought it was so sad, and he was so brave, admitting that he was dying of a disease you shouldn't be dying of. I think it's so grim, and tragic.

Do you think Queen will be Christmas number one?

Why not Queen, I mean, he did it for twenty years, and if Freddie Mercury hadn't been a rock 'n' roll star he probably wouldn't be dead now. I hate Queen's music, but I've mellowed in my attitudes towards them as people. We've had people slagging us off because they couldn't understand why we had a violin, and a Hammond organ, we've had people say that we're shit because of that, but you've got to take that on board, as a socialist, and you've got to give everybody a fair crack of the whip, except for grebos and Tories.

So you don't like the *Levellers* then? I thought they'd be one of your influences.

I've never heard them. A lot of people have said 'you sound a lot like the Levellers', but they've never been one of my influences.

Do you think that the Hammond organ's a bit of a cult thing?

The organ itself is a pain in the arse, because it's so big. They're a pain to transport, but nothing else sounds like them, and ninety percent of bands who say we've got a Hammond haven't, they've just got samples. It's just so natural. It's cool. We'll still have it in ten years, they'll probably have moved on to glockenspiels or something.

Tell me about the album.

The album is out in March, and no word of a lie, it's fucking great. There's a track called Megalomania, that'll be the second single, that's going to be the end of January.

The 35th London Film Festival came to town during mid-November, loaded with over 200 films from all around the world. Well, so many films so little time, and not enough dosh. There are big names, including *Point Break* and *Frankie and Johnny*, but the jewels of the Festival are probably obscure productions.

Let's kick off with what must surely have been one of the best films at the festival—*Urga*, directed by Nikita Mikhalov. *Urga* is a French-Russian co-production, filmed in Mongolia. Mikhalov weaves a goofy tale in which little of consequence ever comes to pass. And yet it captures the imagination like few other films I have seen. It really is a strikingly beautiful A treat for Hindi film fans must have been the appearance of demigod Amitabh Bachchan, interviewed by the rather bland Derek Malcolm from the Guardian, Bachchan did his best to enliven the audience. Ah, but Amitabh, we must surely be eternally thankful for your very presence!

A lot of film critics (yes, we had spies in the Press Tent) voted Raise the Red Lantern as their favourite, and so did I (Su). This new film from Chinese director Zhang Yimou resembles his last, acclaimed, film (Ju Dou) in the way that both of them depict how women were suppressed under the patriarchal Chinese society during the early 19th Century. The story is set in the reputable Chen clan this if it were not for 'Life on a string'. Compared with *Raise the Red Lantern, Life on a String* is not as commercial, but viewers will certainly be captured by the stunning photography offered by director Chen Kaige. It's about the magic of believing and the emotional struggles of being highly respected. The film, however, over uses symbolism, but this is really nothing compared with the magnificent scenarios. For someone who wants a feast for their eyes.

If Martial Arts is your favourite thing, then Once Upon a Time in China should not be missed. It's a typical action-packed film from Hong Kong, with surprisingly, political and satirical undertones and is about the legendary

The Grass Arena is a real gem and certainly looks like a real film. With an unusual lifestory, some outstanding performances and a neat direction, this film stands out miles ahead of

film—Mikhalov making full use of the undulating Mongolian landscape and adding his own flighty images and dreamscapes.

In a lesser league, but very much knowingly so, stands Nicholas De Jacob's *The Refigerator*. A spoof horror movie complete with morality twists, it concerns the all consuming desires of a refigerator (i.e. the American or capitalist way of life). Eileen and Steve Bateman move into their apartment in a seedier part of New York, hoping to 'make it' without falling into all the associated traps of 'success'.

But very quickly Steve and Eileen are changed by the city, and their relationships are distorted by the aforementioned appliance... (coming to an ICA near you).

Two films from which one might have expected more were John Sayle's City of Hope and Errol (Thin Blue Line) Morris's The Dark Wind. Sayle's film (which may be compared unfavourably with Do the Right Thing) tackles the issue of race relations in a crumbling American city. The film tends to ramble since Sayle insists on representing every member of the community and thus diluting the whole effect. Morris's film just fails as a good thriller.

A guy on top form, though, was Paul Cox, with his follow-up to *The Golden Braid—A Woman's Tale*. The film deals unsentimentally but with complete passion with the advent of old age.

Mira Nair's superb debut (Salam Bombay) was followed up by her Hollywood debut—Mississippi Masala with tons of groovy music, excellent script, big names (well, Denzel Washington) the film should do very well at the box office.

Cantonese hero who has been portrayed in more than 90 Hong Kong films since the late 40s. Brilliant entertainent and it's already a box office smash in Hong Kong.

This year's Spanish box office hit (according to the producer himself), is also in the Festival. Lovers (aka Amantes) revolves around a young officer's relationship with his fiancee Trini (Maribel Verdu), who is still a virgin and his landlady Luisa (Victoria Abril), who offers him wild sex and love. Eventually he surrenders to Luisa and kills Trini to help Luisa to kill his fiancee. But then this is a real life story. Victoria Abril was awarded best actress in Berlin for this film, though in my opinion, Maribel Verdu offers a more remarkable performance. The Dutch film An Indecent Woman is another erotic drama who tells the affair of a married woman with a stranger. The special point of the film is that the story is told from the woman's point of view, and therefore there aren't any moral judgements which are always expected in other films.

There are also some made-for-TV broadcast films including The Lost Language of the Cranes and The Grass Arena. The former is about a family with a gay father (Brian Cox), who is a university lecturer and has been in the closet for many years, his secretive wife (Eileen Atkins) and their son Owen (Angus MacFayden). Strong performances are offered, particularly Brian Cox, when he is confronted with the truth that his son is also gay. The story however becomes a bit hilarious when the father deliberately invites his young, straight colleague to dinner films offered, including Aux Veux Du Monde and Merci La Vie, both of which feature the up and coming actress Charlotte Gainsbourg. A special mention about the film Aux Veux Du Monde (directed by Eric Rochant) is that its main character is one of the best anti-heroes portrayed in film history so far. He kidnaps a school bus and thinks this will impress his girlfriend! The kids in the film offer a livening atmosphere to the film.

Something that has to be said about the Festival is that there are many substandard films like *The Soultaker* and *Liquid Dreams*. The only good thing about *The Soultaker* is its quotes: 'Led Zeppelin was wrong. There is no stairway to heaven'. It's even a compliment to say it's a piss-take of *Ghost*. *Liquid Dreams* has some stylish decor, but is let down by a poor script.

Enough bad words said about the quality of the films chosen. Here are some other films which have not been covered, but have very good hypes during the festival:

'No-one likes a bat,' but it was as a bat (die Fledermaus) that Dr Faulke was disguised, had rather too much to drink and was left to sleep it off under a bush by his 'friend', Eisenstein. The Doctor was then left to return home publicly in costume to much jeering. This is the story of his revenge...

Eisenstein is due to be incarcerated for five days on a charge of insulting a ticket inspector whilst his wife's ridiculous courter is perched precariously on the sill outside waiting for his moment to

leap into his sweetheart's arms. Eisenstein's wife, Rosalinda, is perplexed by her sonorous suitor, but seizes her chance for a night with him by allowing her maid, Adele, the night off to visit her 'dying' aunt. These deceits are just a ploy, by all, including Eisenstein, to secretly attend the ball that night held by Prince Orlofsky. As may be supposed, much comic foolery and deception ensues as husband and wife unknowingly flirt with their partners and assumed identities flow as freely as the champagne.

The production is everything that stars are born for. Feathered chorus-girls abound as does the glitter and, of course, the champagne. The audience do not escape this pantomime. The Prince's pet gorilla certainly startled most people in the front rows. Fenella Fielding (yes, that's her real name) provided an enlightening interval course in 'How To Prepare Apfelstrudel' (...and here is one I prepared earlier, with the obligatory wine - or was it Wien?) and we were cajoled through a game-show board into wearing masks. It was only to hide our identities and prevent incrimination following the particularly wild party that ensued. Some dreadful character, having thrust empty bottle into every nook and cranny of a figurine's anatomy, had gone so far as to graffiti a moustache and glasses on her fair form. As may be imagined, everyone drinks plenty of alcohol and becomes VERY good friends.

To a London student a market is a lifeline: cheap food, clothes and inexpensive presents can keep you going when the cash refuses to. To make the most of your one day travel card we tour London's best known markets.

Portobello Road is situated near Notting Hill Gate Tube Station and is most famous for its antiques market. This is held on Saturdays and due to its fame is also packed with tourists.

The antiques market is at the south end of Portobello Road sells a range of tacky 'antiques' and silverware at reasonable prices but cashing in are buskers and other tourist stalls. This part of the market is also crowded with pickpockets, so be careful!

The further north along Portobello road you go, the more like an ordinary market it becomes, selling fruit, veg and second-hand clothes. At the top of Portobello road the stalls merge with those from Westbourne Grove market. The atmosphere is good but if you look anything like a tourist, prepare to be ripped off.

Portobello Road also has the Electric Cinema half way along, as well as 'Strange Attractors', a shop dedicated to the art of chaotic mathematics. The market is open every day except Thursday and so is always good for a visit.

Mr Matthews compared the PLO with the African National Congress (ANC) and Yassir Arafat with Nelson Mandela; comparisons that are highly offensive to every African and indeed to every human rights sympathiser.

Israel is outside the Gulf, of course. It is somewhat ironic that the IC Anti-War in the Gulf Society should host speakers from the one organisation to support Hussein's invasion of Kuwait and should go to such lengths to condemn the only country in the Middle East to be Chinese Communist Party General Secretary:

'On behalf of the Arab Palestinian people, their leadership, and myself, I express the warmest, most sincere congratulations to you, dear comrade, on your appointment to General Secretary of the Comunist Party of China, and take this opportunity to express extreme gratification that you were able to restore normal order after the recent incidents in People's China. I wish you, close friends, more progress in your endeavour to achieve the hopes, goals, aspirations, stability and security of our friends, the Chinese people.'

And during the recent attempted *coup d'état* in the USSR:

'Congratulations...to the new and

legitimate leadership of the Soviet Union...success in your fight against the reactionism which has been present until today in the USSR and against imperialism.' (Corriera della Sera, August 22 1991).

Of course Yassir Arafat's support for brutal anti-democratic regimes around the world doesn't make him a terrorist. Neither does it in any way delegitimise him from being acknowledged as the only and true representative of the Palestinian people. The man of peace who recognised Israel's right to exist in 1988 and whose organisation, the PLO have given up their cowardly attacks on synagogue worshippers (Rome), kindergarten children (Metulla), athletes (Munich Olympics), American invalids (Leon Klinghoffer aboard the Achille Lauro) and so on.

I wish I could believe that the PLO has given up such actions. Unfortunately in several interviews since, Arafat has made his standpoint only too clear:

'I did not mean to renounce... Actually, I only repeated what our Palestine National Council had accepted...I am still now committed to what I said in Cairo in 1985' (Venice TV, December 19, 1988).

'The PLO will not stop the armed struggle. I did not ask anybody to refrain from military operations' (Associated Press, Kuwait, June 6 1989).

I would wholeheartedly agree with the IC AWIGS that it is the right of residents of the West Bank and Gaza to choose their own representatives. The PLO (in common with the Governments of all Arab countries) were not democratically elected. Until recently no Palestinian dared to oppose the PLO. Those delegates who met with Israel in Madrid live under death threat.

As long as Arafat will use the methods he used on Anwar Sadat of Egypt (Oct 6th 1981) or earlier this year to remove Salah Khalif, the former number two man in the PLO, he can claim to enjoy the support of all Palestinians.

The PLO are committed to the total destruction of the State of Israel. Quoting from their constitution, the so-called Palestinian National Charter:

'Commando action constitutes a nucleus of the Palestinian popular liberation. Palestine, with the boundaries it had during the British Mandate, is an indivisible territorial unit.

'The partition of Palestine in 1947 and the establishment of the State of Israel are entirely illegal, regardless of the passage of time, because they were contrary to the will of the Palestinian people and to their natural right in their homeland, and inconsistent with the principles embodied in the Charter of the United Nations, particularly the right to self-determination.

The Arab Palestinian people, expressing themselves by the armed Palestinian revolution, reject all solutions which are substitutes for the total liberation of Palestine and reject all proposals aiming at the liquidation of the Palestinian problem, or its internationalism.'

United Nations resolution 242 calls for the parties involved in the 6 day war to make peace and allows

double-talk, distortion and outright lies of the PLO


Israel to administer the territories it occupied in 1967 until a just and lasting peace in the Middle East is achieved. When such a peace is made, Israel is required to withdraw its armed forces from territories it occupied during the 6 day war - not from 'the' territories, nor from 'all' the territories, but from some of the territories. The withdrawal from the Sinai following peace with Egypt both proves that, having secured a peace treaty, Israel is prepared to compromise on territory, and fulfills all its obligations under International Law. The 1979 withdrawal from the Sinai, returned 90% of the land captured in 1967 to Arab sovereignty.

Lieutenant General Thomas Kelly, the director of US Joint Chief of Staff, said during the Gulf War (Nov 5th 1991) that 'it is impossible to defend Jerusalem unless you hold the high ground...I look onto the 'West Bank' and say to myself 'If I'm the Chief of Staff of the Israel Defence Forces, I cannot defend this land without that terrain.''

What Kelly was saying is not new. A 1968 report by the US Joint Chiefs of Staff maintained that Israel could not be defended unless it controlled a major part of Judea and Samaria. And in 1988, 100 retired US generals and admirals, including some of the most illustrious in the American military, asserted that the territories were vital to Israel security.

Of course Messrs Wong and Schrag were absolutely right in stating that there have been more Palestinians killed in the last three years than Israelis. The PLO have clamped down hard on collaborators. In fact, over 500 Palestinians have been killed by fellow Palestinians. That is more than the total number of Palestinians killed by Jews and Jews by Palestinians since the so-called *intifada* began. They are right in saying that it is the State of Israel which should renounce violence and state terror against unarmed Palestinian civilians...perhaps they are referring to the way King Hussein of Jordan massacred 20,000 Palestinians in their uprising of Black September 1970 which Israel, along with all other countries that value human life, did condemn.

Israeli soldiers in Gaza, Judea and Samaria are armed with tear gas, plastic bullets and

watercannons, the same 'weapons' used by European countries to control football hooligans. Under the Geneva convention any occupying power has to maintain law and order in the territories it is administrating. Israeli soldiers have to contend with boulders, petrol bombs, daggers and in some cases, bullets. If, to safeguard their own lives, they fire live ammunition, even into the air, or are accused of indiscriminate use of plastic bullets they are arrested and courtmarshalled.

Jewish settlers have as much right to settle on Jewish-owned land on the 'West Bank' as they have to settle anywhere else in the world.

Any attempt to limit Jewish settlement on Israeli Government owned land would be an attempt to recreate the state of affairs in Arab countries today, and what was the state of affairs in Europe before the war, i.e. that of Jew-free zones, and Jewish reservations—ghettos, something no democratically elected Jewish Government could accept and be re-elected.


We should address ourselves to the plight of Palestinian refugees, and indeed to all deprived people.

The conference in Madrid will hopefully signify a new chapter, with Israeli Government officials meeting with Jordanians and Palestinians. It would appear that progress will be made towards some sort of compromise position mutually acceptable. If Jordan makes peace with Israel, territorial compromise is a serious possibility.

This is to be the last article on the subject of the Middle East that will be published in Felix this year. This includes letters. I understand that the whole issue causes strong feeling, but only amongst a small number personally involved people. It is precisely because of these two reasons that all 'debate' on the subject tend to be irrational, vitriolic, rhetorical and very, very tedious.

The Israeli-Palestinian conflict is far too complicated and too intractable for it to be given justice in a dilletante multisubject newspaper like this one. The only people who read articles like this one have almost certainly made up their mind and either completely agree or completely disagree. I don't honestly think the vast bulk of IC students could be bothered to read it.



Seasoning of Good Will

Spare a thought for the festive season's most prominent victim this Christmas.

The turkey is a relatively late addition to the list of factory farmed species, but now represents the largest 'growth industry' amongst meat products. Once considered a luxury, turkey has become a convenience consumer product, largely since it was discovered that with added colouring and flavouring it will take the taste of almost any kind of meat, and is cheaper to produce. In the 25 years up to 1988 annual turkey production in the UK increased from three million to 33.5 million. Last year the Christmas market consumed 16.5 million birds.

For those familiar with the conditions under which most table chickens are kept, the situation for turkeys is very similar. In the most modern units approximately 20,000 birds are reared in one building, partitioned into four sections of 5,000 birds. Typical stocking densities are 1.25sq ft per turkey up to 8 weeks old, 2.5sq ft up to 16 weeks and 3.5sq ft over 16 weeks. These cramped conditions are nevertheless slightly better than those for chickens. This is mainly because turkeys do not scratch around in the litter which will therefore degrade more rapidly. The litter is not changed once over the full 26 weeks.


The foul ammonia-ridden litter causes burns and ulcerations. 'Genetic improvements' have led to faster growing and greedier birds which are fed on a high protein diet based on soya and grains. Often the birds' skeleton does not keep up with this rate of growth, to the point that 80% of male breeding turkeys become lame, suffering irreversible diseases of the hipjoints. Weak individuals are frequently trampled to death.

Due to this highly unnatural environment, turkeys, like chickens, take out their frustrations on their neighbours. Left to their own devices, they will devour each other. Instead of addressing the central problem, the factory farmer simply adds to the cruelty. Turkeys are routinely debeaked at five days using a red-hot blade. Sometimes the upper mandible is cut back so severely that the nostrils are damaged. No anaesthetic is used and the process, even if carried out properly, is thought to cause immense pain both during, and for

a long while after. Breeding turkeys suffer the same agony a second time at 14-18 weeks. Where debeaking is not carried out, the birds are kept in near darkness in order to pacify them.

The modern genetically improved male turkey is so heavy and broadbreasted that it is no longer even capable of mating with the much smaller female. Insemination is now almost entirely carried out artificially, causing much pain to both sexes. At the end of their short 'commercial life' (a maximum of 26 weeks for a table turkey) the birds are transferred to the 'processing plant'. Simply being uprooted from such a fully controlled environment is a shock in itself. The fragile birds are insensitively packed into crates aboard lorries which sometimes offer no protection from the weather and which may travel unlimited distances.

At the processing plant turkeys are hung upside down by their legs

on a shackle line, and taken on a conveyor belt system to their deaths. The law allows turkeys to be hung in this way for up to six minutes. An average breeding male at the end of its 'useful' life weighs 60lbs, equivalent to an eight or nine year old child.

Eventually the birds reach a stunning apparatus. This usually consists of a water-bath charged with a low level electric current. Some ten to thirty seconds after immersion in the bath the birds pass on to the (usually automatic) throat slitter, before finally being dropped into a scalding tank.

There is widespread concern that many birds are not adequately stunned. Even though immobilised they may still be sentient. Low voltages of 80 to 90 volts are used deliberately because producers argue that birds do not 'bleed out' properly if they die before their throats are cut. Slight differences in size or minimal movement by the birds can prevent them from being stunned at all. For the same reasons the throat slitter may miss altogether, or cut across the skull. With more than 1000 turkeys passing through each hour, the back-up killer is unlikely to notice all of these 'accidents', which are, to varying degrees, everyday occurences. It has to be assumed that thousands of birds came to an agonising end in the scalding tank.

Intead of wrestling with your conscience over the roast this Christmas, why not try one of the alternatives? The most ethical solution is, of course, the traditional vegetarian yuletide feast—the nut cutlet. For those of us not prepared to go so far, there remains the option of free-range turkeys. Though most suffer the same painful end, the quality of life leading up to this moment is vastly superior.

Most supermarkets do at least stock frozen free-range turkeys at Christmas. The most highly respected brand for free range poultry at the moment is probably 'Label Rouge' from France.

The 2nds were back at Harlington on the following Saturday. They maintained their unbeaten run of seven matches by defeating


Conquering VI



Free Condoms

The Imperial College health service is one of four local general practices taking part in the Riverside Health Authority 'Free Condom Scheme'. Usually, condoms can only be



this summer period due to the lack of summer jobs adding to the toll imposed by the poll tax and the loss of housing benefit. Commenting on this issue Mr Ruis said that 'The so called compensation for the loss of housing benefit (ie Student loans) does not really address the issue.'

Over the summer a group called Academics For Free Speech (AFFS) produced a four page A5 leaflet promoting their anti-semitic views. Covering the findings of Fred Leuchter, an American expert on execution, it claimed that the mass extermination of the Jews during World War II could never have happened. Felix was informed of the existence of the leaflet after a local newspaper in the north east of England called our office to find out if we had any knowledge of the production. On the back of the leaflet a credit claimed that it was Printed and Published by Academics For Free Speech, Imperial College, London.' Terry Briley said that 'Special Operations', one of the Governments security departments, were interested in the case as it was tantamount to 'an incitement of racial hatred'. Sir Eric Ash commented that 'There are a lot of nutters at Imperial College, but I cannot believe that it came from here.' amongst other things.

The Mechanical Engineering building was evacuated yesterday at 5.15pm after dangerous levels of hydrogen sulphide gas were produced in the drainage system. The drains were being cleaned by a private company who poured 93% sulphuric acid into them to clear a blockage which reacted with matter that produced the dangerous gas. The building remained empty for 8 hours. The ever tight accommodation service has decided to supply bed linen to home students no longer. The decision was made by College accommodation management who instructed Housekeepers to sell linen packs to home students. Originally, overseas students were also to be sold linen but after the intervention of Jonathan Griffiths, Deputy President, this decision was reversed.

£12,000 of College kit was stolen in one evening together with other things. Jill Gibbons has been appointed as the new Union Bookstore Manager.

Time put aside for clubs or societies may also be cut or moved to inconvenient times. A first year chemistry student, Stephen Dorman, was seriously injured during an attempt to kidnap the Royal College of Science Union (RCSU) mascot last Thursday. The accident which involved a vehicle being driven by a City and Guilds Union member ran over Mr Dorman's leg and caused a compound fracture. An ambulance was called and the Police interviewed the witnesses to the event. After being taken to hospital the leg was operated on twice. The incident has called into question the current state of mascotry at IC and preceded a meeting on the subject. It is expected that from now on mascotry between the CCUs of the College will take part upon campus only. The Police have reported the driver for reckless driving and driving without due care. Mr Dorman asked the Police not to press charges and said that people in his view took mascotry far too seriously.

Student loan applications have risen since last year and has caused a long waiting list for interviews currently lasting up to November 25th. Last year students across the country borrowed an average of £338 under the loan scheme, but to date 30,000 people have applied for £570 or more. The Government has viewed the increased up take of the scheme as an acceptance of the idea but Tony Cullen, Assistant Registrar said that this year 'student loans are a fact of life', whereas

The suspect was searched but the Police found no illegal substances, and he claimed that 'it was a joke'

Violence flared outside Southside last Saturday when four people attempted to leave the bar. Helen Roberts said that she had left the bar with three friends and been confronted by about ten men. The men hurled abuse at Ms Roberts. and her friends and then attacked members of her group. One of them suffered injuries of the face and stomach and the other was pinned to a car and punched in the back.

A disgruntled College employee threw a beer barrel through the window of a car last Wednesday and later trashed the car owner's office in the Sherfield Building. The crime wave continued with theft of personal items, a Naga computer processor worth £1800 from Civil Engineering, a resuscitator and phials of amyl nitrate ('liquid gold') from the College ambulance, four bicycles and an attempted theft of a motorbike.

The Imperial College Union Careers Fair proved to be popular with the 70 or so companies that attended this week. The majority of the companies, including Price Waterhouse, Rolls Royce, and British Telecom, thought very highly of the event which had an estimated attendance of 5,500 students.

Holbein House residents are complaining of the state of disrepair of its accommodation including the furniture and fittings. One postgraduate student said that 'we are expected to live like squatters'. The College plans to close the hall at Easter for the rest of the year. Mr Graham Daniels, Residences Area Manager, said that he is considering Holbein a priority case and will be initiating a project to 'rectify major faults in showers' but admitted that faults cannot be fixed over-night, a point proved in Holbein for at least the last seven years.

Imperial College's Caroline Fox, Director of Personnel, unveiled a document on the College's Equal Opportunities Programme which

'last year they were more of an option'.

Doctor Keith Barnham of the Physics Department has announced the results of his research in to an improved solar cell. In the improved cell thin layers of semiconductor material only 50 atoms thick are added to the surface to form 'quantum wells' which trap higher energy electrons than normal. The process is so effective that a cell with 50 quantum wells is twice as efficient as one with 30.

The Rag total is now £12,700 and many people are suffering because grants from Local Education Authorities (LEAs) are late. More thefts occurred including another Naga computer, and still no connecting evidence has been found.

915¹ November

A fire started in a lift in Southside at about 2am last Saturday is being treated as arson by the Police who investigated the incidence. It is believed that this incident is the third attempt to cause a serious fire in the building in the same location and possess a serious threat to the inhabitants of the hall. A letter from the warden of the halls. Dr John Hassard said that if the fire had been discovered five minutes later it would not have been extinguished. In this instance one end of the hall was filled with smoke from burning plastic. Residents are said to be furious about the lack of safety in the hall which is a culmination of faulty fire alarms, missing fire extinguishers and the presence of only one security guard.

A dispute has arisen between some of the clubs and societies treasures and the Union because of a document that they must sign making them liable for fiscal losses incurred by their organisations. One treasurer has resigned and three other people have yet to sign the document which also includes the head of each group.

Following the accident last week during a mascotry attempt all vehicles are banned from being used during such an event. A meeting of the CCUs about the incident concluded that since vehicles are 'harder than even rugby players' they should be totally excluded from mascotry. Various other changes have been made to make the matter more of a sport rather than a battle and improve the situation rather than to end it, as proposed in a letter from Sir Eric Ash.

Welfare week was a flop. C+GU attended the Lord Mayor's Show and Kate Dalton was elected as their

new Hon Sec. Violence broke out at last Friday's 'Rain' gig and Graham Lawton, Ents Chairman, put this down to a long running dispute between people attracted to bar extensions when events had been planned.

916^{Friday} November

Imperial College has been forced to back down on it's proposed changes to the College Safety Council responsible for Health and Safety at work in all areas of College. The changes which meant overall voting control lay with Management nominated representatives only was found to be technically illegal under the Government Health and Safety regulations. The procedure was severely disliked by the trade unions within college who threatened to break away and form their own safety council. Management said that the council only 'advised' the Rector so any changes had no real effect. This reaction was hotly contested by the unions who declared that 'Safety is not negotiable'.

At the UGM held yesterday less than 30 students attended posing the thought that 99.6% of the student body are totally content with the operation of the Student's Union. The Government announced the Council Tax as replacement to the Poll Tax. Police reported dodgy LSD tabs spiked with strychnine and the C+GU blood donation session attracted 109 donors.

917^{Friday} 15 November

Security guards, messengers and car park attendants currently employed by the College are to be replaced by a private firm, it was announced by Gordon Marshall, Director of Estates. In a letter sent to staff by Mr Marshall he stated that due to a 'need to modernise systems' the College was proposing to 'contract out of the whole of this area of operations'. Derek Dollard of the Manufacturing Science and Finance Trade Union (MSF) called for the unions to 'shut down this place on the day of the Governing Body meeting (4th December).....subject to the result of a ballot, of course.' No consultation has yet taken place with the unions or staff and although the proposal is now open to discussion for a period of one month it was stated that College is unlikely to change it's decision, according to Marketing Director Steven Newbold. Staff may be redeployed within college or the University of London, allowed to take voluntary redundancy or have compulsory redundancy forced

upon them. Sue Sharp, ICMSF Secretary, said of the situation that 'it didn't look hopeful.

The Fire Brigade were called out last Friday when Departmental Superintendent, Colin Rogers, set off a fire alarm to clear the Mechanical Engineering Building. Mr Rogers was manning the messengers desk while a trade union meeting was taking place and set the alarm off to clear the building prior to locking up for the weekend. Sherfield security was not informed of his method before-hand and assuming a real/alert called the fire services. Mr Rogers told Felix that 'he did not think anything when he saw the fire engines, since fire engines are continually driving up and down Exhibition Road' and added that on reflection he was 'acutely embarrassed' and would 'do it better next time.'

The final stages of the Claypond site is to be sold to Imperial College Residences PLC (Impress - a BES scheme) when building is completed in about two weeks. The Rector announced that he intends to guarantee accommodation to women for the whole length of their study, even if they live in London.

918^{Friday} 22 November

The Rector, Sir Eric Ash, fielded questions from students and staff in an open meeting yesterday. The Rector was accompanied by Angus Fraser, Gordon Marshall, John Archer and Steven Newbold, all from the College hierarchy. People asked about the financial stability of the college which was described as 'stable' although the reserves were 'zilch' and they questioned the replacement of security staff. The Rector would not be pressed on this matter and would not pass it on to any of the other directors. He said that student numbers countrywide should be increased and that some working through college was a good idea, as in the States, adding that student benefits over the summer

were diabolical.

Staff members of the major trade unions have voted for strike action on the date of the Governing Body meeting on the 4th December to protest against the colleges proposal to contract out security and other services. Many academics have begun to support the dispute and some, including Professor Bruce Sayers, Dean of City Guilds College, have sent letters to Angus Fraser, Managing Director, and the Rector.

Following allegations of drug peddling in Bernard Sunley House a janitor faces disciplinary proceedings. Two students have also been suspended pending the result of their tribunal. The warden of the hall, Linda Donegan released a statement about the incident and added that it was her duty 'to safeguard the welfare of the students in my trust and also the reputation of the College'.

919^{Friday} 29 November

Imperial College Union decided at an EGM yesterday to support the strike by trade union members on the 4th December. The College did not see the point to this action and the Rector commented that it was 'rather bizarre' that students felt they could achieve anything by not going to lectures. Further letters have been sent by academic staff on the matter and discussion continues between the various groups - see news in this issue.

A door to the Union Building was completely removed by three members of the Royal School of Mines Union by ramming it with a British Rail trolley, during the night of a bar extension marking the end of Rag Week. The cost of the damage is estimated at £400, some of which is hoped to be reclaimed from the three students.

Steve Farrant and Paul Thomas were cautioned by Police during the Nude Kamikaze Parachute Jump event for Rag. Natwest announced that their customer service area would be expanded and refurbished. The drug disciplinary actions continued and Freddie Mercury died.

Arab Eats Babies

Dear Adam,

I am worried by the increased number of pro-Israeli students in college who are feeling threatened. First there were Gaby Pell's repeated expressions of concern over the invitation of a PLO speaker to a college event. Furthermore, an incident on Thursday 28th November made me realise the scale of the problem.

While manning the Friends of Palestine stall in the JCR, as part of the international week organised by OSC, I was thinking about some research I am currently doing.

'This is in Israel' I heard someone say. I raised my head and saw a young student (seemed like a fresher) holding up a hand embroidered bookmark and waving it in my face. By the time I had managed to blurt out 'sorry?', he was asking;

'Are you claiming this?' For a fraction of a second I thought he was talking about the bookmark...''cause if you are, then I m very distressed!'.

Then it all fell into place. The bookmark, which was no longer being waved around, had Jaffa embroidered on it, with two Palestinian flags either side of it. He was concerned that our society took the stance that Israel should be destroyed, and that even the parts of Israel recognised by the UN, like Jaffa, should be taken over by Palestine.

By that time one friend had offered to call him an ambulance, while another suggested that he saved his breath until the peace talks resumed in Washington. He left, presumably as distressed as he was at the start.

What he had failed to notice was that the whole exhibition avoided political stances, especially in the current state of flux in the Middle East, and concentrated on culture (crafts, music, food etc) and the human rights issues, such as health, education and imprisonment without trial. (The offending piece of material, which was promptly removed, was part of the Medical Aid for Palestinians catalogue, a charity for which Pauline Cutting was working when she was in the Palestinian refugee camps in Lebanon.)

That being our objective, which I think the exhibition achieved, we did not want discussions with distressed students on the day, but I think the issue must be raised, in the interest of student welfare in the college.

A couple of points to Mr Pell, before I reveal the frightening truth.

1. You say that the PLO has never been voted for by the Palestinians, could it perhaps be because the Occupying Israeli government, in all of its love for democracy, has not allowed elections?

2. You say '... that in the large majority of cases, the killing of Palestinians has been carried out by their own kind, for collaboration, rather than by Israelis.' In a situation of military occupation, such as was the case with German forces in France throughout World War II, what do you suggest is the percentage of deaths of civilians due to suspicion of collaboration, 50%? 70%? 90%? Even the, stupid as your unconfirmed statistic may be, had there been no occupation by Israel, do you not even entertain the thought that the life expectancy of a Palestinian may have been slightly higher?

3. Under military occupation law in the West Bank and Gaza, a 12 year old boy may be jailed for no reason, and most have been. The current Israeli prime minister is a self-confessed terrorist. Given those facts, I suspect that being imprisoned in Israel has little to do with the murder of innocent civilans.

4. As regards the reestablishment vs the creation of a state, don't be such a pedantic git. You can argue till you are blue in the mouth that there never was a Palestinian state. The fact that there have been Palestinians, as a majority of the population for longer than there has been a state of Israel in the region. This does not make Israel non-existence, it is here now as a state, with UN recognised borders.

Wake up, and forget the dogma that you have been spoonfed. Israel was not established solely on some legitimate claim, and divine promises; people had to be murdered or forcibly removed from their homes, politicians manipulated, and UN peace negotiators blown up. Let us face the reality of the situation, and save the whole region further bloodshed. Enough of those stupid historical arguments.

As for the frightening truth about our claims, and the distress they cause, you can make the obvious conclusions from that piece of embroidery. It can only mean one thing.

Judo Injustice


Dear Adam.


